

## WARRANT OUT FOR HOLY ROLLERS

**Apostle Creffield is Under a Serious Criminal Charge preferred By B E Starr.**

Saturday's Portland Journal: A warrant was sworn out this afternoon for the arrest of Josh Creffield, a "Holy Roller" high priest, by District Attorney Manning, on the complaint of B. E. Starr. The crime charged is a penitentiary offense. The wife of Starr, Donna Starr, is alleged by the husband to have fallen under the evil power of the "prophet," along with ten other women who have joined the Portland band recently organized by Creffield after his hurried exit from Corvallis.

Creffield is said by his followers to have laid claim to the power of Christ and to have cast an unholy influence over the women of his flock in the short time he has been in the city. Members of the "Rollers" in the city are being examined by the district attorney this afternoon and the high priest is being anxiously sought by deputy sheriffs.
