Superintendent Miller is Arrogant Interest in the Proper Observance.

County School Superintendent Miller is sending out to all the school districts of the county a neat pamphlet published by J. H. Ackerman, superintendent of public instruction, titled "Arbor Day." The pamphlet is designed to furnish suggestive material for the proper observance of Arbor Day and to call attention to the importance of awakening an interest on the part of parents and pupils in the observance of beautifying the surroundings of our schools and homes. This year, April 15, comes on April 15, and by that time the weather should be settled so as to make such exercises being held.

FRUIT GROWERS WILL ORGANIZE

The meeting of representatives of the fruit growers of Lane county, after a long discussion Saturday afternoon of the various phases of the industry, appointed B. A. Washburn of Springfield; C. M. Denmark of W. O. Zeigler, of Eugene, a committee to draw up a constitution and laws. An association similar to the Willamette Valley Association will be formed. The capital stock will be placed at \$10,000, divided into 100 shares of \$25 each. The next meeting will be held Monday, April 4.
