## RAILROAD TRAIN STUCK IN SNOW

### Green Fields Were in Sight of the Passengers.

### A Passenger Train Has Been Abandoned in a Snow Drift in South Dakota.

Sioux City, April 9.—For twenty hours a Great Northern passenger train has been imbedded in snow in a cut near McLean, Nebraska, while green fields were showing all around. A relief train was balked by four feet of wet snow, packed hard. A Milwaukee & St. Paul passenger train has been abandoned in a drift near Lane, South Dakota. Stock is suffering greatly.

## ANARCHISTS ARE PLOTTING

### Believed That They Are After the Life of Emperor Wilhelm.

Berlin, April 11.—The police today arrested several persons suspected to be anarchists. The police here and other European capitals have been warned by the Scotland Yard to maintain the strictest vigilance for persons going to Malta and other points which the Kaiser will touch. It is evident that conspirators are working at their headquarters in London, and in all probability a serious plot is afoot of which the English police have obtained an inkling.

## GERMANS AND HERREROS

### Met in a Fierce Combat—The Blacks Were Slaughtered.

Berlin, April 11.—A desperately fought battle between German troops and rebel Herrerros at Ougnanter, German Southwest Africa, is reported today. The Germans stormed the rebel position, which was a strong one, and were repeatedly thrown back. The attack was renewed, and after eight hours of stubborn fighting, the enemy was driven from their position. The Herrerros retreated to the eastward. The German loss was four killed and twelve wounded. The Herrerros were slaughtered by the wholesale, over 300 dead being counted on the battle field.

## BIG MINING DEAL MADE

### The Allen Mine on Rogue River Sold for \$750,000.

Involving a consideration of \$750,000, all but \$150,000 of which is actually cash in hand, the Allen mine, a copper-gold property, located on Rogue river, three and one-half miles south of Galice creek, has been sold by J. C. Allen, of Portland, and his associates to Charles d'Autremont, of Duluth, Minn., and others of a company of Middle Western capitalists, many of whom reside in Michigan. Mr. Allen retains a heavy interest in the mine and will be president of the new company. The deal is the heaviest mining property ever consummated in Oregon. Association with Mr. Allen in former ownership of the property were a number of wealthy residents of Cincinnati. Immense development is planned.

The property consists of 139.92 acres, all of which is patented ground. The deal was consummated through the efforts of Frank R. Roberts and W. T. Perry, of this city, both of whom are members of the Oregon Miners' Association. The mine is directly across Rogue River from the famous Alameda.

A new company has been incorporated under the laws of the state of Arizona which is known as the Oregon Homestead, Mining and Reduction Company, for the development of the property. Frank B. Roberts is vice-president and general manager and W. T. Perry, secretary and treasurer. The majority of the board of directors are Michigan and Minnesota people.—Portland Telegram.
