E. P. Williams, of Lost Valley, was in the city today.

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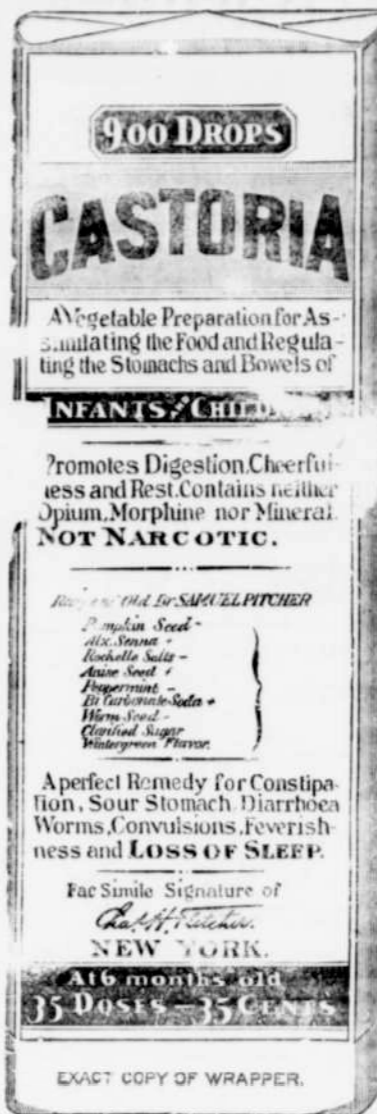
