A Splendid Exhibition Given Before a Record-Breaking Crowd --Umpire Got Sick and Fainted Away.

A record breaking crowd witnessed the baseball game yesterday afternoon between the Blues and the Shamrocks, which was the best exhibition put up on the local grounds since the season began. "Spike" Somers was mostly responsible for the victory by the locals, as the visitors were unable to connect with his curves for a single hit until the sixth inning, when three bingles scored two runs. Again in the eighth three more hits were made, but only one man made the circuit of the bases. After that inning the fireworks ceased and goose eggs adorned Roseburg's column on

Reed, for the visitors, pitched a fairly good game, but the heavy stickers in blue touched him up for eleven hits which netted five runs. Both teams played gilded-edged ball, only one error being credited to each side. Shortstops Briseno and Newell being the guilty ones.

Umpire Turner gave general satisfaction except for one or two decisions. There was considerable wrangling and one or two players on the local team should have been benched or fined, and would have been had the umpire done his duty. C. Oswill, of Roseburg was assessed \$2.50 for using abusive language to the umpire.

During the latter part of the eighth inning the umpire took suddenly ill and fainted away. Dr. D. A. Paine, who was among the spectators, administered stimulants and in a few minutes Turner pluckily went to work again and the game was resumed.
