### JAPAN LOST A VESSEL

Torpedo Boat No 48 Destroyed While Removing Mine.

London, May 13.—Reuter's Tokio dispatches say that Japanese torpedo boat No. 48 was destroyed Thursday

while removing mines in Kerr Bay north of Tallen Wan. Seven men were killed and seven injured. This is the first war vessel that Japan has lost in the present war.

A RMY OF 70,000 JAPANESE Embarked at Chinampo on May 4th—Eighty-Three Transports.

Shanghai, May 13.—Advices state that a Japanese army of seventy thousand sailed from Chinampo on eighty-three transports on the fourth instant, destined for the Liao Tung peninsula and Tanko Shan. One transport alone carried 3800 men packed like sardines. No one was allowed to enter or leave the city prior to the departure of the ships.

Horrible Turk Still Killing.  
Constantinople, May 13.—The Turkish troops have been burning villages throughout the Sassoun district of Armenia, killing many inhabitants. The French, British and Russian consuls have been sent to Ezeroum in the hope of limiting the bloodshed.

Bill Rudolph Won't Be Hanged.  
Union, Mo., May 13.—The Bill Rudolph (Miserable Kid) hanging has been postponed indefinitely.

### ROSEBUD INDIAN AGENCY

Lands Will Be Opened for Settlement August.

Land Worth \$80 an Acre to Be Sold for \$3—Officials Will Conduct Drawing.

Washington, May 13.—President Roosevelt this morning signed the proclamation opening for settlement the lands of the Rosebud Indian Agency in South Dakota, at 9 a. m., August 8th. The proclamation covers 418,000 acres. The sales will go by lot, applicants registering their names with government officials appointed to conduct the drawing. The price asked by the government is three dollars per acre. It is expected fifty thousand people will register. Similar lands in Northwest Iowa are quoted at eight dollars per acre.

China's Attitude THE CHIEF DANGER
