

COMPLETE MEMORIAL PROGRAM

Outline of Exercises to Be Held May 29 and May 30.

Exercises at the Christian Church Sunday Evening and at the Cemetery Monday Forenoon.

The committee on Memorial Day exercises from the G. A. R. has made up a complete program, which is embodied in the following report: Sunday evening, May 29th at 7:30 promptly, the following will assemble in front of G. A. R. hall, the right resting on corner of Seventh and Willamette and form in line and immediately march to the Christian church and attend services held by Rev. McCallum and other ministers.

Monday Morning. At 9:30 a. m. Monday, the following line will be formed and at 10:30 a. m. sharp, proceed to the I. O. O. F. cemetery under charge of Post Commander Loomis and Marshal Hopkins with Frank Taylor and Comrade Fullman as aids; right resting on Seventh and Willamette streets, facing south in the following order:

Major Yoran and staff; Companies A and C and Spanish War Veterans; J. W. Geary, W. R. C.; J. W. Geary Post, G. A. R.; Ladies of the G. A. R.; Sons and Daughters of Veterans; school children; Woodmen of the World; I. O. O. F.; citizens, on foot; mayor and city council and school board and citizens in carriages.

Moving south on Willamette street to Fourteenth street, where the ladies and school children will be furnished carriages, and move in same formation east on Fourteenth street to A street, south on A street to cemetery, where line will halt and reform on foot, then move into cemetery. All horses and carriages will be strictly prohibited from the inside of the inclosure.

After ritual and other services at the G. A. R. lots, line will reform and proceed to the grounds of the Spanish War Veterans, where services will be held; from there the line will march to the private lots of the Woodmen of the World, and attend the unveiling of their monument. After services here, several carriages will proceed to the Masonic cemetery, where ritual services will be held over the graves of our departed comrades.

Returning from the cemetery the comrades will find a dainty lunch served by the ladies of the J. W. Geary Woman's Relief Corps at G. A. R. hall.

Monday Evening. At 7:30 p. m., sharp, the escort, Ladies of the G. A. R., J. W. Geary Post and W. R. C. and Sons and Daughters of Veterans will form in line in order as above noted in front of G. A. R. hall, the right facing the south and march to the M. E. church, where the following program will be rendered:

Prayer by Rev. Rowland. Singing by choir. Recitation by Harold Wells. Song. Lecture by Hon. R. A. Booth. Quartette-Patriotic song. Recitation by Mrs. W. F. Gilstrap. "America," congregation singing. Doxology. W. M. SHERMAN, Ch'n. HENRY HOPKINS, Sec'y. R. H. MILLER, Committee.

Note and Comment.

SUMMER EXCURSION SEASON

On Saturday next, May 21, 1904, the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad will inaugurate the opening of the summer excursion business at Yaquina Bay by running their first excursion of the season, the fifth Annual Rhododendron Excursion, from Albany, Corvallis, Philomath and all points west to Newport and return.

Tickets will be sold good going on Saturday and returning on Monday, May 23, 1904, giving two nights and one full day at the beach.

The rhododendron is now in full bloom, nature wears her best garb, the rigors of winter are gone and "Smiling Spring her earliest visit pays" to Newport and vicinity.

A low round trip rate of \$2.50 from Albany, Corvallis and Philomath has been made, giving every one an opportunity to enjoy a pleasant outing, gather water agates, rhododendrons and to disport themselves in the balmy breezes of the Pacific.

A large crowd of Southern Pacific officials and their friends will be with the excursion. The steamer "Roscoe" has been engaged and a trip out over the bar has been arranged for those who want to go for food fishes or give food to the fishes.

CIRCUS GOT AWAY AT 9:30

The attendance at the circus last night was quite large, notwithstanding the rain and mud the crowds had to go through to see the performance, which was cut short. The grounds were simply unmentionable, water standing in pools under the tents and everywhere. The mud was ankle deep and sticky as glue.

The circus men had enough experience in getting the freight wagons off the grounds to last them a lifetime. Nearly every wagon mired down in the mud and it was necessary to carry the equipments to the street by hand.

The work of moving and loading the show on the train was not finished until 9:30 o'clock this morning and it was the dirtiest looking circus outfit imaginable. The men were begrimed with mud from head to foot and the wagons looked like anything but circus wagons. The show went to Salem from here. H. S. Rowe, the manager, said that it would be impossible to give the afternoon performance there and that the time would be used in cleaning up.
