## LEE TRAVIS ARRESTED FOR FORGERY

### In Presenting His Claim for an Invalid Pension.

### Arrest Comes as Shock and Surprise to His Friends--Waived Examination Before U. S. Commissioner.

Attorney Lee M. Travis, of this city, was arrested this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock by United States Deputy Marshal Jacob Probstel on the charge of presenting forged affidavits in a pension claim for himself to the department at Washington.

Mr. Travis was taken at once before United States Commissioner J. J. Walton, where he waived examination. Judge Walton placed him under bonds of \$500, which were furnished.

### THE CHARGES.

In the complaint against Mr. Travis, F. N. Libby, of Portland, deposes and alleges as follows: That on Feb. 27, 1903, Lee M. Travis made a claim for himself for an invalid military pension. That he procured and transmitted to the commissioner of pensions at Washington, D. C., a forged writing in the form of an affidavit purporting to be subscribed and sworn to by E. H. Church, of Eugene, Oregon, before L. G. Hulin, a notary public of Eugene, Oregon. It is further alleged that Travis on December 16, 1903, transmitted to the commissioner of pensions a certain false and forged writing in the form of an affidavit purporting to be subscribed and sworn to by Dr. B. M. McKinney, of Eugene, Or. before Louis E. Bean, a notary public.

### RETAINED COUNSEL.

Mr. Travis has retained L. Bilyeu and A. C. Woodcock as counsel. When asked by a Guard reporter for a statement this afternoon, Mr. Travis referred him to his attorneys, who declined to say anything.

The many friends of the accused deeply regret that he is in trouble, but have confidence that when the case comes up before the federal authorities in September that he will be cleared.

Mr. Travis was first apprised of the fact that he was to be arrested today when a reporter showed him a dispatch to the Guard from Portland announcing the coming of the Deputy United States Marshal this afternoon. He was very much surprised at the announcement and at once made arrangements to secure attorneys. At that time he made the statement that he had applied for a pension on account of severe illness while a member of the Second Oregon Volunteer Infantry regiment in the Philippines, and which rendered him a physical wreck for a long time afterward. The writer and a large number of other young men of this city who were members of Company C remember that Mr. Travis was for a long time at the point of death with the fever while the regiment was stationed at Cavite. His friends cannot believe that he is guilty of forgery. Earl H. Church, who is named in the complaint as being one of the persons whose name was forged to the affidavit, could not be found this afternoon, so no statement could be obtained from him.

Mr. Travis is one of Eugene's best known and most prosperous young attorneys. He was nominated by the Democrats at the recent state convention for prosecuting attorney for this district, but he declined the nomination on account of his extensive practice and home affairs. He was only recently married.

### Methodist Conference Work.

Los Angeles, May 26.—S. J. Harbin was elected editor of the Epworth League Herald by the Methodist conference this morning. The delegates are demanding their release to return home, but there is much important

business still to be transacted. The election of the Methodist Book Concern agents and secretaries occupied the morning session. The consecration of the newly-elected bishops will take place tonight.

### Shot by a Convict.

Columbus, Ohio, May 26.—Guard Gearhardt, shot yesterday by Convict Green, died this morning.

### A Degenerate Convicted.

Portland, Indiana, May 26.—Robert J. Knox, former lawyer, society man and college graduate, was found guilty this morning of forgery. He will receive a two to fourteen year sentence. This will be his third prison sentence.

### Alaska Wreck.

San Francisco, May 26.—The Alaska Packer's ship Balclutha, which left here April 27 with several hundred whites and Chinese for the cannery at Alaska, went ashore May 16 at Goose Island, off Kobiak. According to information today all on board were saved. The ship will probably be a total loss. Part of the cargo may be saved.

### Embezzler Arrested.

Chicago, May 26.—The police are advised of the arrest at San Juan del Rio, Mexico, of Herman Haaff, an auditor of the National Corn Exchange who has been missing four weeks. The bank, according to the police, claims thus far to have found a shortage of \$17,000. Haaff will fight extradition. He has a wife and two children here.

## JUMPED FROM THE TRAIN

### H. Middleton, of Portland Became Suddenly Insane.

### Sprang From the Southern Pacific Overland Near Junction City, While Going at a Speed of 60 Miles an Hour.

Portland, May 25.—H. Middleton, a well known resident of Portland, while enroute here on the Southern Pacific overland train last night, suddenly became insane. When the train was near Junction City he terrorized the passengers with a cane and knife. He suddenly sprang from the train while it was going sixty miles an hour. The train was stopped and an ineffectual search was instituted, which was continued today.

Junction City, Or., May 25.—A man giving his name as H. Middleton jumped through a window of the northbound train here this morning. He was later taken to the city jail and relatives from Portland arrived up this afternoon to take him home. He is demented, and badly frightened several residents of this place. He had a ticket from Grant's Pass to Portland.

## JAPANESE CAPTURED KINCHOW

### They Are Getting Dangerously Near Port Arthur.

### Only Ten Miles Away--Heavy Fighting Near Dalny Toward Which Japs are Marching.

Tokio, May 26.—Dispatches this morning indicate that an attack by the Japanese on Kin Chow, to the rear of Port Arthur, is imminent. Powerful artillery is in position for an onslaught on the Russian defenses, consisting of thirty guns. It is reported that the Russians have evacuated Kai Ping, twenty miles southeast of New Chwang.

Chefoo, May 26.—The Japanese are now only ten miles from Port Arthur. Heavy fighting occurred near Dalny, toward which the Japanese force is marching.

London, May 26.—The Central News' Tokio correspondent wires that word was received there that the Japanese today stormed and carried Kinchow, to the rear of Port Arthur.

Berlin, May 26.—The foreign office has information that Russia recognizes the justice of the complaints of indiscriminate mine sowing, but will continue to use mines throughout the war, after which negotiations will be undertaken by the powers regarding their limitations.

### Jewish Palestine Movement.

Hamburg, May 26.—The Zionist's congress adjourned today. The central committee formally asked the Russian government whether it would be willing to support Jewish colonization in Palestine by influencing the Sultan to grant his consent to the ceding of land for that purpose. Russia replied affirmatively. The president also read a sympathetic message from the Kaiser.

### A Wealthy Suicide.

Chehalis, Wash., May 26.—Henry C. Foote, a wealthy member of the Tacoma firm of Bartlette, Foote & Co., and an officer of the Chehalis Condensed Milk Company, suicided with a small revolver last night on the roadside near Chehalis. The cause is unknown. The body will be sent to Chicago for burial. His wife and son are in New York.

### Son of Father Dead.

Paris, May 26.—Allister Evans, son of the late American dentist who assisted the Empress Eugenia to escape from France, died today as the result of pistol wounds. Whether self-inflicted or not is not yet apparent.

### Aiding Yazoo Sufferers.

Yazoo City, May 26.—A train load of supplies arrived this morning for the fire sufferers and homeless. The

fire adjusters will settle soon, relieving much distress. The banks opened temporary quarters in tents this morning. The original estimate of \$2,000,000 loss holds good.

### Bombarding Kin Chow.

Tokio, May 26.—An attack on Kin Chow began early this morning. The main assault is directed against the heights on the south of the castle with artillery in a commanding position. The casualties are not reported. The Russians, after the Japanese captured the castle, retired to the southern heights, which the Japanese force attacked and carried.

### TOW BOAT

### EXPLOSION

### About Fifteen Men Killed at Louisville, Ky.--Boiler Blew Up.

Louisville, Ky., May 26.—The boiler of the tow boat Fred Wilson exploded this morning, killing twelve or fifteen men and seriously injuring ten others. The explosion occurred off Riverview Park as the boat was about to tie up. The boiler was a large one and the detonation heavy. The crew was blown into the air, some falling into the river and others on the embankment, while those less fortunate were caught in the wreckage and killed instantly. The dead are Captain Price, Pittsburg, Pilot Medler, Mate Sykes, A. W. Kenney a Pittsburg insurance man who was making a pleasure trip, Engineer Shively, six colored deck hands and the cook and steward, white men. The boat was recently remodeled and valued at \$40,000. It was bound to New Orleans with a tow of coal.
