## EULOGY TO HON. E. R. SKIPWORTH

Resolutions Passed By  
Bar and Read In  
Court.

Court Adjourned This Forenoon  
Out of Respect to Mr. Skipworth's Memory--Cases Disposed of.

Daily Guard June 18  
The adjourned term of circuit court adjourned this forenoon until Monday morning at 9 o'clock, out of respect to the memory of Hon. E. R. Skipworth, a prominent member of the Eugene bar who died a few days ago. The following resolutions were read and ordered placed on the records of the court, also a copy be sent to the family of the deceased. Short eulogistic addresses were made by Judge J. W. Hamilton, L. Blyeu and Geo. B. Dorris. The resolutions:

"Whereas, Eugene R. Skipworth, a member of the Eugene bar, departed this life on Sunday morning, May 23, 1904, at his home in Eugene, Oregon, after a lingering illness of many months; therefore be it  
"Resolved, by the members of the bar of Eugene that we recognize, by his death, the bar has lost the services of an able lawyer, the inhabitants of the county an upright, honorable citizen, and the state a vehement, courageous advocate of all things believed by him to further the advancement and upbuilding of the people into ideas of good citizenship.  
"Resolved, That we sympathize with the family of the deceased in their inexpressible sorrow and our own regret to part with him as a brother at law.
