In the series of baseball games which closed yesterday Salem and Eugene broke even, Eugene winning the first two games and Salem the last two.

Sunday's game, though characterized by rugged playing, was exciting throughout and took ten innings to decide the winner, Salem batting out a victory in the tenth.

Tempany, the Blues' new pitcher from Spokane, was batted out of the box in the third inning and Schofield took his place. The latter did not stop the bombardment to any great extent, however, Salem's sluggers placing their hits where they counted for runs.

A feature of the game was Strieb's long running catch of a foul fly. It was the best put out ever seen on the local diamond.

Regarding Tempany, he is a husky lad and has lots of strength and ought to throw a hard ball to hit, but it is presumed that yesterday was an off day for him. He did not show up well at bat, but made two or three difficult catches in right field after he was transferred to that position.

Umpire Jackson came in for a roasting from the grandstand for several bad decisions. To the spectator, it appeared that every time there was occasion for a close decision, Salem was favored. The score was:

Sweet's Elmira Sawmill Burned Caught From Brush Fires and Completely Destroyed Last Friday. J. P. Sweet, of Elmira, was in Eugene yesterday and told the Guard of the burning of the sawmill belonging to his son, J. K. Sweet, three and a half miles northwest of Elmira, last Friday afternoon. The mill caught fire between four and five o'clock and was completely destroyed, the loss being about \$1500, with no insurance. It appears that the fire was caused by the spreading of small brush fires nearby or else sparks from the burning brush piles were carried to the mill by the wind. No one was in the mill at the time the fire started, and by the time Mr. Sweet and others reached there the flames were beyond control. Mr. Sweet is yet undecided whether or not he will rebuild. It all depends upon the outlook of the lumber market. If he does rebuild, the mill will be double the capacity of the old one, or about 10,000 feet daily.
