AMERICAN BANKERS MEET

Our Financiers Disgraceful Betrayals of Trust

Failures of Banks Attributed to Unwise Excessive Loans--Secretary Shaw Urges More Merchant Marine

New York, Oct. 11.—Secretary Shaw addressed the Bankers' Association today and urged something be done to increase the merchant marine. He said: "We will soon need new markets. The world comes to us for furs and raw mine products, but will not send their ships for factory products. This is not a popular move, but on completion of the canal it will make an equal distance from the eastern to the Western shores of the Pacific. If we are in position to use the canal we will get the worth of our money. Railroads had to be encouraged by the government before they multiplied, and the same holds good on ocean commerce. Many will say its the manufacturer, but if the manufacturer does not prosper, neither will the rest. We own the Philippines, which with a canal and merchant marine would insure the millions in trade opened by the Pacific."

President Swinney made his annual address. He attributed the bank failures of the present year to granting excessive loans to unsound industrial enterprises. He regarded the present national bank law as inadequate, and gave the administration's

view of "Frenzied Finance" as exposed by the insurance investigation, and said the investigation revealed the most disgraceful betrayals of trust placed with American financiers who were on trial before the country and world.

TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES

New York, Oct. 10.—Two cases of typhoid among the Chinamen were found by the police here today.

Washington, Oct. 10.—The "Woman in Blue," Mrs. Lucy G. Lee, of Massachusetts, L. I., who persisted in trying to call on the president at Oyster Bay last summer, was arrested at the White House by a secret service officer as she stepped into the corridor, and is in jail pending examination.

Houston, Texas, Oct. 10.—F. B. Gray, aged 40, cashier of the Commercial National Bank, committed suicide here this morning.

Cledo, Oct. 10.—Ramsey protested today against Gould as chairman of the meeting on the grounds that he is also chairman of the Missouri Pacific board. The bondholders took advantage of the law allowing them and stockholders each six directors. The roll call of stockholders was had to see who held proxies. Ramsey protested as fast as announced, and will make a contest in the courts to oust directors. Gould expects a long battle. Ramsey will use the cumulative system of voting proxies, and vote a sixth for himself, assuring him a directorship.

New York, Oct. 10.—In the second world's championship game here today the Philadelphia Americans defeated the New York Nationals by a score of 3 to 0. Both teams have now won and lost a game.

LANE COUNTY BOY INJURED

Corvallis Oct. 10.—Sylvester Armitage, a student of the O. A. C., was severely hurt during a class scrimmage last night and was unconscious for 12 hours. Armitage was running at full speed when he stumbled and his head struck a tree, almost dislodging his neck. He is now recovering. Young Armitage is a son of J. A. Armitage, who lives 4 miles east of Springfield.

TWO TOO MANY WIVES

New York, Oct. 11.—Accused of having had three young wives living at the same time, in the same flat building, Robert Banicker was arraigned this morning on a complaint made by two of them. The third was passed by him as a sister to the other two, who claim they supplied money for the third to travel.

ISSUED FRAUDULENT PAPERS

Portland, Oct. 11.—The prosecution finished its case this morning in the land fraud trial. C. B. Moore, former register of the land office testified he asked applicants for homesteads the regular printed questions. Cross-examined by Hiney, the fact was brought out by the witness issued claims when he was cognizant of their fraudulent character.
