## OFFICIAL COUNT COMMENCES

New York, Nov. 13. District Attorney Jerome's assistants, Sanford Perkins, this morning instituted the Doe proceedings in the Sixth, seventh and twenty-ninth assembly districts in election fraud cases. The proceedings are said to be the result of new evidence obtained by Superintendent of Election Morgan's men, who this morning sent several subpoenas to the district attorney's office. Great secrecy is maintained. A grand jury resumed its inquiry into the election frauds this morning. Its witnesses being in attendance.

New York, Nov. 13.—The grand jury this afternoon returned eight indictments for illegal voting. Six were arrested on election day. Warrents are out for others. It is understood the grand jury has ordered indictments drawn. Those arrested are John Kroup, Albert Farar, James P. Grady, John P. Foley, James Mead, Thomas Brennan, Thomas E. It is reported Kroup has confessed, implicating one "higher up."

New York, Nov. 14.—The official count began today in each of the four states included within Greater New York. The lawyers for Hearst and Hearst's committee appeared before each of the boards to have the discrepancies in the tally sheets corrected and the protested ballots counted. The ballot boxes to be opened and the ballots be recounted in the places where there is evidence of fraud. McClellan fights to confine the count as closely as possible to the precincts of the official returns, which is what McClellan was elected by in 1900. A contest in the courts is inevitable. The forces of Mayor Jerome are active in preparing the prosecution of all perpetrator.

New York, Nov. 14.—The astorians

were filled with witnesses when the grand jury resumed the inquiry into the election frauds this morning. It is reported that a member of the election board of Murphy's district has confessed. Alderman Haggerty was rearrested this morning on complaint of assaulting a Hearst watcher. He pleaded not guilty, but was held under \$1000 bail.

## COAST LEAGUE LOSES PLAYERS

Cincinnati, Nov. 15.—The National Baseball Commission met in this city today to consider drafts and purchase from the Pacific Coast League. The following purchases were approved: By New York Americans, Pitchers Hitt and Whalen, of San Francisco, and Keefe, of Tacoma; by St. Louis Americans, First Baseman Louis Nordyke, of Tacoma. Drafts were approved by the St. Louis Nationals for infielder Bennett, of Seattle, and Catcher Byrnes, of Oakland.

## IN BEHALF OF SUFFERING JEWS

Butte, Mont., Nov. 15.—Jews and Gentiles at a mass meeting raised \$5000 to aid the suffering Russian Jews last night. A resolution was adopted asking Roosevelt to intervene to stop the massacres, and if necessary to send warships to Russia, as during the Rumanian massacres.

## WANT DUTY ON HIDES REDUCED

Washington, Nov. 15.—Shoe manufacturers, headed by Governor Douglas, of Massachusetts, called on the president this morning and asked for a reduction of the duty on hides.

### Another Turkish Joker

Paris, Nov. 15.—An ultimatum has been sent the sultan of Turkey. An international fleet is expected to concentrate at Hirsens about November 22.

## TAFT WILL NOT LEAD THEM

Washington, Nov. 15.—In response to an invitation of the Republican leaders of Ohio asking Taft to assume the leadership in that state he replied he was out of politics and so engrossed in his work that he had no time to even consider the matter.

## KILLED AT ANACONDA

Butte, Mont., Nov. 15.—R. T. Templeman and D. F. Haggerty were killed at the Washoe copper smelters, Anaconda, by falling from a sheet iron roof, on which they were working. Both were pioneers.

## RECEIVED JUST PUNISHMENT

Miles City, Mont., Nov. 15.—T. J. Newman, formerly a county officer, was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary for participation in extensive bounty frauds, as a result of which the state has lost several thousand dollars.

### A Royalty Junket

London, Nov. 14.—King George, of Greece, accompanied by a prince and princess, arrived this afternoon on a visit to his brother-in-law, King Edward. He crossed the channel in King Edward's royal yacht, accompanied by a squadron of British warships. He was met at Portsmouth by Prince Arthur and escorted to Windsor.

### Russian Capital Quiet

St. Petersburg, Nov. 13.—The city is reasonably quiet today, the police having dispersed the crowd of roughs in the Nevsky Prospect, who started an attack on the "intelligentsia." The fashionable quarter of Moscow seems deserted. An attack on students is feared today.

### BURNED

## Vladivostok Across the Big Pacific the Unfortunate

### Fire Started by Malcontents and Reservists—Looting Attended the Fire—Famine Threatens the People

St. Petersburg, Nov. 15.—A telegram just received from Vladivostok says the whole town and port was burning, the greater part of the place having already been consumed.

Vladivostok, Nov. 15.—The situation is desperate, the mobs practically controlling the city and looting is unabated. The flames are spreading and famine threatens the people. The vessels in the harbor are crowded with refugees who are afraid to stay ashore.

During the first day's rioting three hundred rioters, mostly sailors and artillerymen, were killed or wounded. The fire was started by malcontents and reservists.

## KILLS MAN IN SELF DEFENSE

Albany, Or., Nov. 12.—D. Hedges, a logger, was killed by William Eldler last evening at Detroit, Or., on the eastern division of the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad.

Hedges was a typical "bully" of the kind that terrorized Western towns in pioneer days.

He entered the kitchen of the Detroit Lumber Company, where Eldler was employed as cook, and began to abuse him in the presence of some women. Edward Rambo, foreman, interfered, and Hedges attacked Rambo. He was beating him to death when Eldler came to Rambo's rescue.

Hedges ran to the bunkhouse, secured a gun, and came back to kill Eldler, firing several times through the walls. As he entered the kitchen Eldler shot Hedges three times, killing him instantly.

### Alfonso Keeps Visiting

Vienna, Nov. 13.—King Alfonso, of Spain, arrived here today from Potsdam. The emperor and high officials met him at the station and drove to the palace through lines of troops along decorated streets.

## GOOD NEWS FOR PEASANTS

### London, Nov. 15.—A St. Petersburg dispatch states that it is the intention of the czar to soon issue a ukase granting to the peasants a large portion of the imperial domain which covers almost a third of Russia, and at present the property of grand dukes and the emperor.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 15.—Rojestvensky has been offered the command of the Russian navy, but has not answered.

### African Mine Accident

Johannesburg, Nov. 13.—A vertical shaft in the Driefontein mine collapsed today. One white man and seven natives were killed.

Pittsburg, Nov. 13.—The American Federation of Labor met today and the convention was formally organized.
