

# FEDERAL JUDGE FOR OREGON

Washington, Nov. 21.—President Roosevelt today appointed Charles E. Wolverson, now on the Oregon state supreme bench, to be federal judge of the district of Oregon, vice Judge Chas. B. Bellinger, deceased. The appointment of Wolverson is said to be a compromise between the McBride and Bean forces.

Salem, Or., Nov. 21.—The appointment of Chas. E. Wolverson gives general satisfaction here. This will make a vacancy on the supreme bench of Oregon to be filled by Governor Chamberlain. The names of Jas. Hamilton, of Roseburg, Lark Bilyen, of Eugene, and Sam White, of Baker City, are mentioned prominently for the vacancy.

## GAVE SPRINGFIELD A JOLT

When the Portland excursionists were here the Register published what purported to be a railroad map of Lane county. This map showed a line being built from Eugene to Natron and thence east of the mountains. It is a curious fact that at the present time a line is being built from Henderson to Springfield, but none from Eugene to Natron. Why the paper published such a map entirely obliterating and ignoring Springfield is a matter of much speculation in the lumber manufacturing centre of Lane county.

Springfield is a city of nearly 1000 people, a manufacturing town with great water power, and the future has been destined for quite a railroad centre. Her interests and Eugene's are identical and there is no reason for the reflection cast upon our sister city.

## CHANGE IN TRAIN SERVICE

Important changes have been made on the S. P. trains on the Wendling branch. Commencing today the train running from Springfield to Wendling is changed to run daily from Coburg to Wendling. The train leaves Coburg at 8 a. m., Springfield at 9:05, and arrives at Wendling at 10:30 a. m. Returning the train leaves Wendling at 1 p. m., arrives at Springfield at 2:20 p. m., Coburg at 4:30 p. m. The train for Natron runs Tuesday, Thursdays and Saturdays, leaving Springfield at 2:40 p. m. and arriving at Natron at 2:55. Leaving Natron at 3:10, it arrives at Springfield at 3:25 p. m. Other trains on the branch remain as heretofore.
