Neil Cummins, the Cottage Grove saloon keeper, who was convicted by a jury in the circuit court last week upon the charge of seduction, preferred by Miss Mary Bartels, a young woman also residing at Cottage Grove, has, it is said, left the country and his bond of \$500 will be forfeited.
Wm. Landess and H. C. Madsen, well-known Cottage Grove citizens, were Cummins' bondsmen. It is said that he made it right with them before he left, concluding that it was much better to lose the money than to serve a term in the penitentiary, which no doubt would have been his fate had he remained here.
A motion for a new trial in the case was to have been argued before Judge Harris yesterday morning at 9 o'clock. No action along that line can be taken unless the defendant is present. Cummins did not show up and the matter was postponed. It was later learned that he had disappeared. The court adjourned last evening without declaring the bond as being forfeited, but at the adjourned term, which is to meet January 4, 1906, the money will no doubt be turned into the county treasury.

TANNANSEE'S
EXCITABILITY
H. Tannansee, a former proprietor of the Hotel Eugene, was known here of such excitable nature that this from the Oregonian will cause no surprise to those who know him:
"Because his daughter Ella came home at midnight, instead of 10 o'clock, as he had commanded, H. Tannansee, proprietor of a hotel at Fourth and Madison streets, created a rumpus in front of the city hall and was arrested on a charge of disorderly conduct. When his daughter arrived with an escort Tannansee chased her into the street, slapped her face and ran her escort down the street. The daughter's screams attracted a large crowd, one of whom telephoned to police headquarters. Tannansee, who contended that he had a right to do with his daughter as he wished, put up \$25 at the station for his appearance in court."
When Tannansee appeared in court the charge was dismissed, the court holding that a father may properly chastise his daughter for keeping company with a young man not to the father's liking and for staying out at a late hour.

PRIZE FOR PUBLIC SCHOOL PUPILS

The Oregon Society of the Sons of the American Revolution offers prizes to the pupils of the public schools of the state of Oregon for essays connected with Revolutionary history. Prizes of \$25, \$15 and \$10 will be awarded to the best three essays in the order of merit, on either of the following subjects:
1. John Paul Jones.
2. Woman's Part in the Revolution.
3. The Commissary Department of the Revolutionary Army, compared with the present.
The essays are limited to 3000 words, written in the student's own handwriting on one side of the paper. The essays must be accompanied by a certificate of the principal of the school attended by the writer, stating that the writer is a bona fide student of the school and has attended not less than four weeks of the school year of 1905-6. Each essay must be signed by the writer in his or her proper name and giving the postoffice address of the writer. Essays must be forwarded to Harrison G. Platt, Commercial block, Portland, Oregon, so as to reach him not later than February 1st, 1906.
In awarding the prizes the committee will be governed by these considerations:
1. Historical accuracy.
2. Manner of treatment.
3. Orthography, grammar, syntax, and punctuation.

HENRY ANKENY FOR GOVERNOR

It begins to look as though Chas. A. Johns and Dr. James Withycombe will not have a monopoly on the gubernatorial end of the Republican party ticket next April, for the people are that Henry E. Ankeny, Eugene, will shortly appear above the political horizon, says the Portland Telegram. Up to this time Mr. Ankeny and Dr. Withycombe have been only avowed candidates. It can be said yet that Mr. Ankeny is an avowed one, but it is certain the Eugene politician is figuring the place, and is likely to shy him for at any time.
Mr. Ankeny admits that his friends are urging him to get into the race. Just how far this will go toward winning Mr. Ankeny's head toward dome at Salem remains to be seen. If he makes the race, there promise to be a lively skirmish in the tricedered fight that will follow, should no other candidates take a stamp for votes. All three are strong men. Mr. Johns will run strongest of the Cascades and in spots up valley, where he spent the days of youth. Dr. Withycombe is strong all parts of the state, where he built up a wide acquaintance among the tillers of the soil, while Ankeny has an acquaintance that covers the entire state.
