NEW BUILDING FOR THE CLUB

At a meeting of the trustees of the Eugene Commercial Club last evening Dr. D. A. Paine, who owns the building at present occupied by the club, submitted a proposition to erect a two-story brick block 64x80 feet in dimensions on the site of the club building, the entire upper floor to be used as the club's quarters. PURSUED WRONG COURSE

New York, Nov. 23.—Gerould Brown, head of the bond and mortgage department of the Equitable, testified today regarding the expenses of keeping the building in order.

Geo. Eldridge, vice president and president and actuary of the Mutual Reserve Life Insurance Company, testified that the company was formed in 1881 to do post mortem assessment business. He explained various forms of policies and reasons for raising assessments.

Hughes cited a decision of the lord chancellor in the House of Lords in a case against the Mutual Reserve in which the lord chancellor thought perhaps the ambiguity in the clauses of the policy was intentional and regarded them as tricky. Eldridge admitted he had pursued the wrong course early and was now paying for it.

London, Nov. 27.—The admiralty has not officially denied the report last night that the battleship King Edward had foundered at Gibraltar. It was stated that no information in regard to the supposed catastrophe had been received here.

PRISON RIOT IN MISSOURI

Jefferson City, Mo., Nov. 24.—At three o'clock this afternoon a riot broke out in the Missouri penitentiary. Warden Hall and Yard Master Gilvin were on the road to Leavenworth, Kansas, with Federal prisoners, who were ordered by the government from here to that place. Help has been called for from the citizens and they are responding promptly. The whole city is terrified by the three prisoners riding through the streets in a wagon, followed by the citizens firing. The prisoners in the wagon were holding the driver and citizens at bay with a 44 gun. As the report of the dispatch the prisoners fired at him, the bullet going just above his head. No one can shoot at the prisoners in the wagon without killing the driver. Captain E. W. Allison, in charge of the prison commissary, is reported to have been killed.

Jefferson City, Nov. 24.—The prisoners blew their way out with nitroglycerine, which they put into the big wagon entrance to the penitentiary. E. W. Allison is dead, as is also John Clay, a guard. Deputy Warden Seo is seriously shot. Only five prisoners escaped through the hole. Of these one was shot by a guard and the other four captured, one being shot through the wrist. The leader of the break was Harry Vaughn, one of the gang of crooks who some months ago had a desperate battle with St. Louis detectives in which several lives were lost.

DOG SAVED MASTER'S LIFE

Grant's Pass, Or., Nov. 22.—Edel Bligam, son of S. G. Bligam, of Willams, is congratulating himself on the possession of a brave dog, which recently saved his life from a she panther while he was hunting in the foothills of the Grayback mountains.

The dog first engaged the panther in a fir thickets, out of sight of the boy. Going to investigate, young Bligam was suddenly attacked by the animal, which sprang across his arm and gun, knocking him down. Then the dog sprang at the beast, drawing its attention away from the prostrate youth, who was able to put a bullet between its shoulders.

The panther then made off, screaming, but was afterward found, dead. Two cubs were also shot.

GOMPERS RE-ELECTED

Pittsburg, Nov. 25.—Gompers was re-elected president of the American Federation of Labor today. Upon the proposition to make the election unanimous Delegate V. L. Berge objected amid hisses. Delegate Barnes, Socialist, objected, but the acting chairman, Vice President Lewis, declared him out of order and declared Gompers elected unanimously.

James Duncan was chosen first vice president and John Mitchell re-elected second vice president. James O'Connell third, Morris fourth, D. A. Hays fifth, Daniel J. Keefe sixth.

NICHI BEI GINKO BANK ROBBED

Los Angeles, Nov. 23.—The Nichi Bei Ginko bank was robbed of \$15,000 in cash and negotiable paper last night. The robbers got into a store next door, cut a hole through a partition of the bank and then cut a hole into the rear of the big safe. There are no clues.

Cash secured, \$12,383.62; also \$900 in notes, checks and drafts.

To Buy 35,000 Books

Salem, Nov. 25.—About 35,000 books will be purchased in the near future by the state library commission and distributed among the 2000 school districts of the state. The money used in the purchase of these books was secured by the various school district literary tax levies and amounts to about \$15,000.

Leg Torn Off

Baker City, Or., Nov. 22.—Cash Watkins, an employee of Stoddard's lumber mill in this city, had his right leg torn from his body below the knee this morning by being accidentally caught in a revolving shaft. The injured man was found later by workmen lying insensible on the mill floor and taken to St. Elizabeth's Hospital. He is not expected to live.

TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES

Pendleton, Or., Nov. 25.—Boyd Redner, the absconding express messenger, accused of stealing a package containing \$1000 from the local office of the Pacific Express Company, has been located in Chicago. Sheriff Taylor this afternoon deputized Fred Korner, route agent of the Pacific Express Company, to go after the thief. A warrant has been sworn out by the company charging larceny. Redner was located by an address left for forwarding his mail to Colorado Springs, from which place he left his address in Chicago.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 27.—Judge Vandever this morning gave Barton's attorney until Wednesday to file a motion for a new trial.

Washington, Nov. 27.—The supreme court refused to save Mary Rogers, the Vermont murderess, from the gallows.

Washington, Nov. 27.—The president has approved the sentence of and dismissed Captain Alan Berry, Twenty-ninth Infantry, who, after a protracted trial by courtmartial at Vancouver barracks, Washington, was convicted of drunkenness on duty when a quartermaster commanding an army transport. Also of gambling when quartermaster and commissary of a transport, and of violating his pledge to abstain from intoxicants. He is ordered dismissed from the service.

Sedalia, Mo., Nov. 28.—Robert Brown, aged 16, died this morning from football injuries.

Gibraltar, Nov. 28.—The second British squadron that accompanied Admiral Prince Louis arrived from America this morning.

Washington, Nov. 28.—The president has definitely decided in favor of locks in the construction of the Panama canal.

Bloomington, Ind., Nov. 28.—A posse this morning surrounded and shot to death the negro who yesterday fatally wounded John Waltz.

Berlin, Nov. 28.—The Kaiser opened the Reichstag today. During his address, in which he dwelt upon the peace between Russia and Japan, he said it was with unbounded satisfaction he was able to second President Roosevelt's successful efforts.

Houston, Nov. 28.—A subterranean volcano has broken loose in the Humble oil field and formed a crater one hundred feet in diameter, swallowing the derrick and machinery. The eruption hurled tons of earth and rock into the air.

Annapolis, Nov. 28.—Dr. James D. Gatewood, naval surgeon, reported the result of the Branch autopsy in the Meriwether courtmartial this morning. The autopsy showed that Branch died from a clot of blood on the brain. All the organs were sound except a slight affection of one kidney. Dr. Gatewood gave his opinion that repeated flat blows might have caused the clot, but more likely a fall to the floor.

Ashland, Or., Nov. 22.—The Southern Pacific has brought its well-boring plant here from Roseburg and will

begin boring a deep well in the Ashland yard near the roundhouse. It will be a test if artesian water can be had here and the project is therefore regarded with general interest. A good supply of water can be had at reasonable depth, but the well will be carried down several hundred feet with the hope to tap an artesian flow.

New York, Nov. 23.—Copper rose today to the highest figure since 1901. Lead rose 10 points.

Albion, Ind., Nov. 23.—A B. & O. freight train and a gravel train collided today near here and five trainmen were killed.

Copenhagen, Nov. 23.—King Haskin VII and Queen Maud departed today for Norway. They were given a great ovation.

Washington, Nov. 23.—Minister White has been appointed to represent the United States at the Moroccan conference. Minister Gunmero will also be present.

Milwaukee, Nov. 23.—J. M. Doesberg pleaded guilty to offering a supervisor a bribe of \$1000 for a vote on a contract, and was fined \$1000 and costs.

Boston, Nov. 23.—Daniel J. Hurley, captain of the Harvard football team, is dangerously ill from a blood clot on the brain. Dr. Nichols, in charge of the athletes at Harvard, says an operation will be necessary.

London, Nov. 23.—Tonight the sole topic of conversation is the possibility of the Balfour cabinet resigning. The ministry was summoned to meet tomorrow, and it is thought the meeting will be followed by a stupendous announcement.

Washington, Nov. 23.—The government will appeal from the decision of its appraisers at San Francisco, which would admit Japanese sake as a manufactured article instead of a still wine. If the government loses it will have to refund \$500,000 to the importers.

Annapolis, Nov. 23.—In the Meriwether trial today Zigmeyer, the executive officer of the training ship, stated that on the ship's cruise last year regulations were posted on deck which stated that fighting was prohibited in the navy. New York, Nov. 23.—The Jews on the east side today are mourning for the victims of the Russian massacres. Over 6000 persons passed through the streets of the Ghetto in a mourning parade behind a band with muffled drums playing funeral dirges. Letters from the survivors of the Russian Jews were read, all declaring that those who survive now envy those who are dead.

Salem, Or., Nov. 23.—The city council at the regular session last evening passed the ordinance granting a franchise to the Automatic Telephone Company. The ordinance as passed requires the company to pay the city \$10,000 in cash for the franchise, and when the exchange is completed and in operation the company must pay the city annually 3 per cent of the gross income.

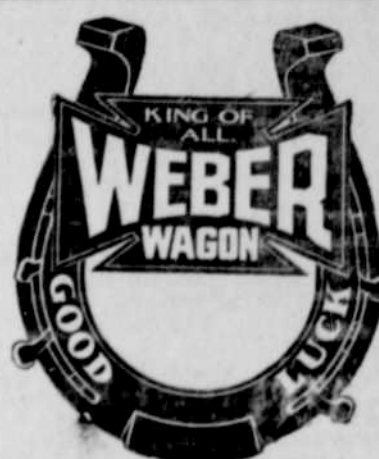
