

JUDGE WALTON RESIGNS

Portland, Jan. 16.—After almost 30 years of service in connection with the upbuilding of the state university at Eugene, Judge J. J. Walton, one of the original incorporators and for 12 years a regent, today resigned his position as secretary of the board of regents at its annual meeting. L. H. Johnson, steward, was elected to succeed him. Mr. Johnson will also continue as steward, but will draw only the salary of the secretary. Judge Walton has been connected with the school since 1876.

OFFICERS ELECTED.

The board re-elected the following officers: President of board, R. S. Bean, Salem; treasurer, S. B. Eakin, Eugene; members of executive committee, C. A. Dolph, Portland; S. H. Friendly, Eugene; J. C. Ainsworth, Portland.

The members of the board present at the session were: Judge R. S. Bean; Eugene; C. A. Dolph, Portland; N. L. Butler, Dallas; J. C. Ainsworth, Portland; William Smith, Baker City; F. B. Holman, Portland; M. A. Miller, Lebanon; J. W. Hamilton, of Roseburg, was the only absent member.

SALARIES REDUCED.

The report of Steward Johnson shows a balance of \$850 in the treasury, due largely to the reduction of salaries last year. When the fall term began it was decided to reduce all salaries of \$1000 and over 15 per cent. That was done to prevent a deficiency in the treasury. The professors affected were given a certificate for the remainder, and an attempt is to be made to induce the next legislature to reimburse them.

The annual report of President Campbell shows the attendance to be larger than it was last year.

President Campbell was authorized to take steps in the next legislature in the purchase of a 20-acre tract of land adjoining the present campus, and which is used as an athletic field. It is owned by H. R. Kincaid.

The regents will hold their next meeting at Eugene in June.

Judge Walton's letter of resignation was as follows:

Eugene, Oregon, Jan. 15, 1906.

To the Honorable Board of Regents of the University of Oregon:

Gentlemen:—The board of regents was organized on the 7th day of April, 1873, with the following named members: Matthew P. Deady, R. S. Strahan, L. L. McArthur, J. M. Thompson, George Humphrey and T. G. Hendricks, who were appointed by the governor of the state, and W. J. J. Scott, Ben. F. Dorris, who were elected and appointed by the Union University Association. Only three of that number are now living, T. G. Hendricks, Ben. F. Dorris and myself.

Judge Strahan and Judge McArthur were not present at organization of the board. Judge Deady was elected president of the board, and held that position until his death in 1893. I was elected secretary of the board and have held that position continuously to the present time, almost thirty-three years. During this time I have held the position of regent for twelve years.

The first year after the school opened I was paid a salary of \$150, and the succeeding eight years a salary of \$300 per year when in justice the salary ought to have been \$1000, for during this time the attendance at the university was from 250 to 300 pupils who paid tuition quarterly, and it required a great deal on the part of the secretary. For the succeeding sixteen years I was paid a salary of only \$400 per year, when it ought to have been \$1000, at least in proportion to the salaries paid the other employees. For two years I was paid a salary of \$600 per year. The university has always been in want of money for running expenses and betterments. That fact I knew and never sought or asked for even a fair salary. I had a great desire to see the university succeed and advance, and I did the work willingly for a pittance of a salary. The work kept me busy to do it and my own work, and many, many times it required me to work long in the night. Thus by my work in this long service I have been able to save for the university, and it has gone into the betterment of the institution, over \$15,000. During all this time the regents have purchased for office furniture for me a case to hold papers in at a cost of \$45, and a letter press at a cost of \$25. I do not mention or refer to these matters to complain in any way, but on the contrary it is a great joy to me to realize that I have been able and permitted to do this work to aid the university.

I desire to tender my heartfelt thanks to the board of regents for the

uniform courtesy and kindness shown me during this long service. I shall always take a deep and abiding interest in the university, and do all in my power to promote its advancement.

My work is done. I tried to do it faithfully and well. I herewith tender my resignation as secretary of the board of regents.

There is a break in the line between here and Acme, on the lower Siuslaw, and it is impossible to get any information as to the effect of the storm on shipping on the river.

A schooner is reported ashore south of the mouth of the Siuslaw, but nothing can be learned about it.
