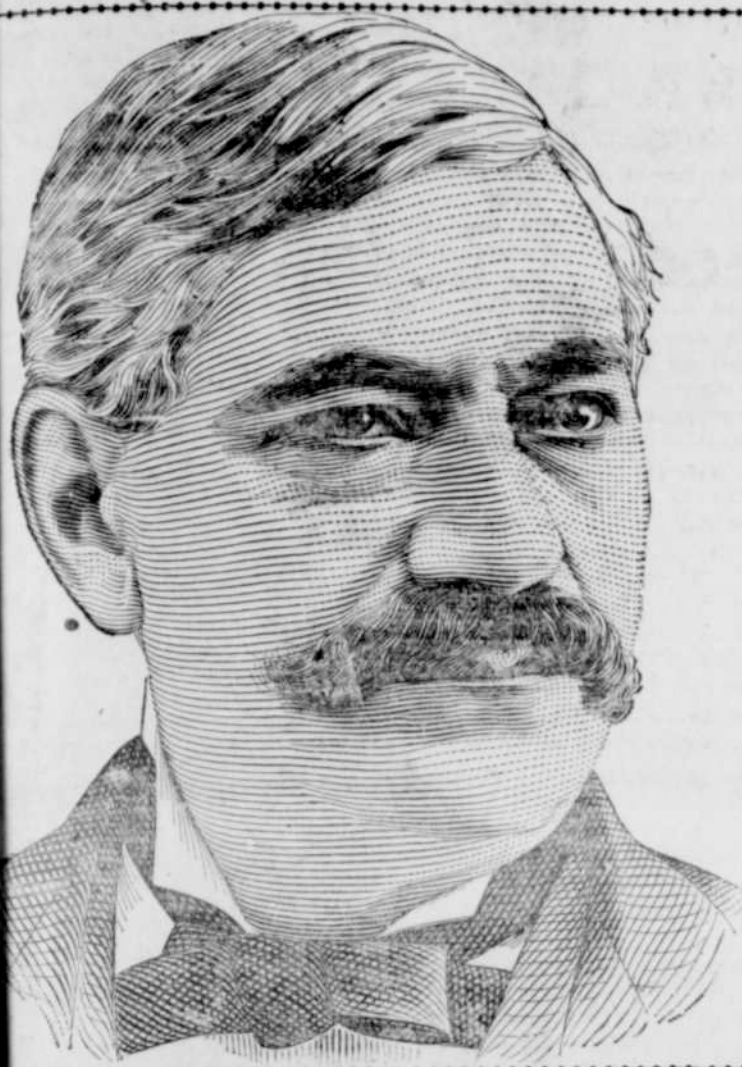

FRANCE ANNOUNCES FATAL ACCIDENT BLOCKADE

Farrow, the real estate agent, soon received a telephone call from Undertaker Holman at the effect that A. L. Huddleston, formerly of Eugene, had been in an accident up the Columbia river. Inquiry was made for a sighting, supposed to be in Eugene. Particulars of the accident were here. It is no doubt happened as the body arrived in Eugene this morning. Huddleston is thought to have been employed in the lumbering districts on the river, and it is probable that he was killed by a falling tree or in a fall.

Washington, Jan. 23.—France will blockade the Venezuelan coast. It is learned that orders have been given at the naval office in Paris for transmission to the squadron, now in the Caribbean Sea. The information is from an unquestioned diplomatic authority here. The blockade will be established within ten days, just as soon as the proper number of vessels can be assembled on the coast of Venezuela. France has three warships within a few days' sail of the coast and two more are about to be sent from Europe. Although Germany, Great Britain and Italy have been informed of the decision, their permission to blockade the ports, upon whose customs receipts they have a lien, has not been asked nor will it be. France considers her political rights to transcend the fiscal rights of other countries. The blockading will be done with the full consent of the United States. France may land troops as a "supplemental remedy."

NEWS FROM NATIONAL CAPITAL

Washington, Jan. 23.—The house committee on interstate commerce has postponed the vote on the rate bills.

Bonaparte has sent the condolences of this government to Brazil on the loss of their battleship.

The president received the statehood insurgeons today and gave them a straight talk in the hope of putting the bill through tomorrow.

Hamilton, chairman of the committee on territories, submitted to the house today the report of the committee favoring the admission of Oklahoma and Indian Territory as one and Arizona and New Mexico as another state. The report of the minority, opposing statehood for Arizona and New Mexico, presented a fight on the bill which opens tomorrow.

WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF

Chicago, Jan. 22.—"God forbid that a son of our martyred president should be here to prosecute citizens of the United States in the manner of this prosecution," fervently exclaimed General John C. Cowen, counsel for the Cudahy Packing Co. in the federal court during the trial of the beef cases this morning. Pointing his finger at Garfield he continued in the same vein. He eulogized the commissioner's father, shaming the son. He arraigned the government for compelling men to testify, then seeking to make criminals of them by depriving them of their constitutional rights.

Paris, Jan. 22.—The Willemstad, Curacao, correspondent of The Times says that after the diplomatic rupture between France and Venezuela and the expulsion of M. Talany, the French chargé d'affaires, President Castro threatened to fire on all French vessels arriving at La Guayra. The situation is excessively serious. Alarm prevails in Curacao, where the semi-official press is exciting the people against the French. President Castro is displaying great activity in sending supplies to garrisons, as well as ammunition to all ports.

New York, Jan. 22.—This city and the entire coast is enveloped in a fog, causing collisions on elevated trains and ferryboats, but none were hurt.

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 22.—The jury has been selected in the case against C. P. Davis, charged with the larceny of \$1400 while he was chief deputy sheriff. The case will be heard tonight.

Roseburg, Or., Jan. 22.—Pursuant to instructions received from Martinez, Cal., Marshal Jarvis last night arrested and took from the train Jesse Langley, aged 47, and Theresa Mayer, aged 14. Langley is charged with felony. When arrested they denied being the parties wanted, but finally admitted they were. The girl says she was not kidnapped, but came voluntarily. They are held awaiting the arrival of the authorities.

Boise, Idaho, Jan. 23.—Crazed by jealousy, Henry Nenebauer, a returned Alaska miner, shot and mortally wounded Ollie Powell, the sweetheart who had rejected him, also Lafayette Gray, his successful rival, Mrs. Robert Gray, the mother and Willie Gray, the sister of Lafayette, in front of the Gray residence at this morning. Nenebauer, who had become wealthy in Alaska, had furnished the money to clothe and educate the Powell girl, and they were to have been married last November. The night before the wedding she ran away with Gray, the pair coming to Boise. Concealed behind a high board fence he shot his victims down as they came from the house, using a shotgun loaded with buckshot. Quickly surrounded by officers he shot himself with a revolver, blowing out his brains.

San Francisco, Jan. 23.—Storms of unusual severity are prevailing throughout the middle West and reports are coming from many sections. There has been a marked fall of temperature in the Middle States and on the Pacific slope. A depression of some depth overlies British Columbia and Washington. Rain or snow has been general from Northern California east and to Alberta in the Northwest province. Unsettled weather is expected in California north of Tehachapi tonight and tomorrow. Storm signals have been displayed off the Pacific coast.

Marseilles, Jan. 23.—The Chinese mail brings an account of the invasion of Tonquin, French Indo China, by the Chinese regulars, who encountered a French force of 400. The Chinese were defeated in a three-hour battle and three hundred were killed and as many wounded. The French lost 16. A Franco-Chinese war is possible.

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 22.—A movement to provide a monthly income for Russian Socialists has been started in this city, and it is proposed to extend it among Socialists of the nation. It is proposed that Socialists in this country shall give not less than 5 cents each per week, this money to be collected through the National organization in this country, and forwarded to St. Petersburg every month.

Seattle, Jan. 22.—Loren Grinstead,

general manager of athletics at the University of Washington, is endeavoring to arrange a three-cornered track meet between the universities of Oregon, Idaho and Washington, to be held in Seattle the latter part of May.

Berlin, Jan. 23.—Prince Louis of Bavaria, today announced that he favors universal manhood suffrage, declaring that the monarchy is safest which is upheld by the people. Court circles in Berlin are offended.

Rome, Jan. 23.—Cardinal Cirillo Maria Gotti, prefect of propaganda, is dying of pneumonia.

Grant's Pass, Or., Jan. 23.—Closing arguments in the Jennings murder trial are being heard today. The case will probably go to the jury tonight.

Washington, Jan. 23.—The Chinese commissioners arrived in this city today and were met by Denby, chief Clerk of the state department. Denby is familiar with the Chinese language and customs. They called upon Root this afternoon and visited the navy and state departments.

New York, Jan. 23.—All the carriages and horses of McCall, the former president of the New York Life Insurance Company, were auctioned off yesterday and netted \$2500.

Klamath Falls, Or., Jan. 23.—The heaviest snowfall in many years has occurred in this vicinity. Stage lines have been stopped. There is six to eight feet of snow in the mountains.

Baker City, Or., Jan. 23.—A heavy snowfall throughout Eastern Oregon is delaying traffic. Snow is six feet deep on the roadbed of the Sumpter Valley line.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 23.—Official circles exultantly announce that the whole Russian empire is quiet with the exception of the Baltic provinces and Caucasus. Witte affirms that the revolutionary mist has been dissipated and expects a prompt conclusion of the foreign loan. Following the placing of the loan Witte looks forward to a definite era of calm and peace.

Coquille, Or., Jan. 22.—One of the pack horses carrying mail from here to Marshfield is the survivor of a 40-foot fall down the mountainside, caused by the bad roads a week ago. It was found the next day, quietly grazing in the fields, and is again on duty. In its fall part of the mail was dislodged and ruined. The remainder, containing paper mail, was lost in the river, which the horse swam. The weather has been extremely rough, and the roads are in a bad shape.

Pittsburg, Jan. 23.—The business portion of Johnstown, the famous flood city, is again suffering from a flood. The cellars under all the buildings in the business district are filled almost to the sidewalks and much merchandise has been ruined.

Paris, Jan. 23.—Germany has recalled the extra troops sent into the garrison on the western frontier.

Chicago, Jan. 23.—Judge Cavanaugh today refused to quash the indictments in the Iroquois theatre case. He held Will J. Davis, the manager, for trial.

Chicago, Jan. 22.—This city is practically isolated by a sleet storm and wires are all down. Communication to the east and south is broken entirely, and the west is nearly as bad. Transportation is demoralized. Elevated trains were entirely stopped in the early hours and the surface lines were not adequate to handle the throngs seeking to reach the business districts. A number of accidents occurred. A crowded suburban train on the Chicago and Western in Indiana was hit by a switch engine and many were injured.

St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 22.—All trains are from one to 25 hours late from the east and west. It is nine below zero and steadily growing colder. All business is demoralized.

London, Jan. 22.—A dispatch from Rio de Janeiro says the Brazilian battleship Aquidaua was blown up today and it is reported over 300 were killed. The ship took fire and the flames reached the magazines.

The accident occurred in port, and the bodies were scattered for hundreds of yards. It is thought that defective boilers caused the disaster.

DORA JENNINGS MURDERED FATHER

Grant's Pass, Or., Jan. 22.—Blanche Roberts, while on the stand this morning in the Jennings murder trial, created a great sensation by testifying that Dora Jennings made a full confession to her of the crime one night while the two girls occupied the same bed at H. C. Perkins' home at Grant's Pass. Dora said that when the family was asleep she put on a

pair of her brother Jasper's slippers and went to the cabin occupied by Jasper and Harvey. Jasper had not returned yet from Roberts and the door was still unlocked. She crept in and slipped out with the rifle. Returning home she lighted the lamp and shot her father. She then hid the rifle in a thicket.

McCLUNG BLOCK DEAL

A few days ago John H. McClung sold to F. E. Dunn his business block on Willamette and Eighth streets for \$35,000, but it seems some misunderstanding exists in the matter and it is probable that the dispute will end in the courts. Mr. Dunn says he purchased the property and paid \$2000 down to bind the bargain. He says McClung gave him to understand the building was free from leases, but upon investigation it is found that Cockerline & Wetherbee hold a lease for five years and will hold the premises during that period, and as Dunn wished the property for his business, it is likely the matter will reach the courts.

THE OTHER SIDE. Mr. McClung is in California and cannot be seen, but it is said that he has stated that he sold the building subject to the lease. The final transfer of the property was to take place March 1st, just after Mr. McClung returns from his California trip.

OTHER COMPLICATIONS. The sale of the property was consummated by C. S. Farrow & Co., of this city, who claim a commission of \$1750 for their work. Mr. Farrow saw Mr. McClung in Portland, but up to the present time Mr. McClung has refused to pay the firm any commission on the transaction, and it is stated the firm will probably sue for the \$1750 claimed.

PLENTY OF MONEY FOR NEW LINE

Brooklyn, N. Y., Jan. 20.—The Oregonian is authorized to state the Portland-Salem Electric Railway syndicate (the Willamette Valley Traction Co.) has completed all financial arrangements and is supplied with large funds to rush the road. Moffatt & White, bankers, of New York, have formed this syndicate, which is composed of men of undoubted strength. Their aggregate wealth runs into hundreds of millions of dollars. Moffatt & White, well-known members of the New York Stock Exchange, of large means, are interested in a variety of enterprises, including the development of the Washington power properties in Spokane.

The new Salem road will be about 10 miles long, will have 70-pound rails, and be constructed in the best possible manner to carry heavy freight and passenger trains at high speed. The bridge over the Willamette river will be a heavy steel structure of the standard required to carry 60-ton locomotives. Construction of the road will be completed by the large railroad & Chamber, engineers, of Portland and New York.

AWAITS PORTLAND FRANCHISE.

An arrangement has been made with the Portland General Electric Company to supply power to operate the railroad. As soon as a franchise in Portland is secured construction will begin from both ends of the line and be pushed as rapidly as possible. As all the money has been raised, the managers of the syndicate only await a satisfactory franchise in Portland to push work vigorously. It is not considered advisable to construct the whole property until the franchise matter in Portland is settled satisfactorily. A new company will be incorporated in Oregon, but a name has not been selected yet.

TO SALEM IN AN HOUR AND A HALF.

Provision has been made to build extensions and branches from time to time, as business may require. No expense is to be spared to make the line a first-class electric road in all respects, and it is intended that regular trains shall make the trip between Portland and Salem in two hours, and it is hoped that rough trains will make the trip in one hour and half.
