Political Advertising

The Oregon Press Association wisely decided that its members should charge for political advertising, which is just. For years the press of Oregon has given gratis all political advertising. But now the press has unanimously decided that this advertising must be paid for, just as other reading or display advertising is paid for.

The decision of the association is sound and the politician finds himself able to secure space if he wants to foot the bill, and the printer accepts the money for the good honest work he performs.

It will be noticeable hereafter in Oregon that the candidate that uses printer's ink judiciously and freely will get the business just as the live, wide-awake merchant does who knows the value of advertising.

In this way, too, the candidate can talk directly to the voter at less expense than under the old method, and the public will have a better opportunity to judge a man by his articles than under the old stump campaign method of the past.

Some before at this time of year has that infallible test of financial conditions, bank clearances, shown up better. Of the hundred or thereabouts of cities with clearances shown only three show a decrease from the same period last year, the percentage of increase for the whole country being 35 per cent. and 20 per cent. without New York. That this decidedly better tone in monetary affairs is not the result of politics or prospective legislation is conclusively shown by the fact that without an exception the Dominion of Canada cities show better, 28 per cent. representing their gain.

In three northern provinces of Japan 700,000 of the three million population are already on the pauper list resultant from the failure of the rice crop the past season. There was too much rain and too little sunshine, and when harvest came there was nothing but shriveled heads. Perhaps it was akin to the crop failure here one season, when an excessive spring rainfall was followed by hot weather, and then rust came sapping the beautiful appearing fields of grain and filling the heads that looked plump enough with shriveled grain, in few instances worth the harvesting. Seed wheat went to fancy prices the next seeding season, much of it being shipped from California, the usual mixing of varieties in the mills, the only considerable supply of old wheat left, precluding its use for seed.

LAND DECISION IN FAVOR OF OLSON

The general land office at Washington, D. C., has handed down a decision in the case of Ole Olson vs. Abraham L. Kelly, involving the ownership of 100 acres of timber land in township 17, 4 east, up the McKenzie, in favor of Olson.

In March, 1900, Olson, who lives at Astoria, made final proof and payment on the land. In 1901 the entry was cancelled on account of some error of Olson's in making final proof. Olson's address was not known and he knew nothing of the cancellation. In 1902 Kelly filed on the land and advertised to make final proof. Olson's friends saw the advertisement and notified him. He filed a protest against granting Kelly final proof but Register Bridges and Receiver Booth of the Roseburg land office decided in favor of Kelly. The case was appealed to the general land office and the decision of the Roseburg office was reversed. L. E. Bean was attorney for Olson in the case.

WANTS COMMISSION ON SALE

W. E. Gilbert, a timber broker, has begun suit against J. H. Chambers, a well-known sawmill owner of Cottage Grove, for the payment of a commission of \$50 for the sale of the Deanna sawmill.

Gilbert alleges in his complaint that in October, 1905, the defendant employed him to find a purchaser for his sawmill and about 1000 acres of timber land. The price for the property was fixed at \$35,000, and Gilbert was to receive five per cent of this for his work. He alleges that he was successful in securing buyers for the property in the persons of Russell, Rogers & Co., of San Francisco, who in October, 1905, began negotiations for its purchase and completed the deal during the present month, but the defendant refused to pay the commission.
