SENT TO THE ASYLUM.

The man was taken before County Judge Chrisman this afternoon and examined as to his sanity. He was committed to the asylum at Salem and will be taken down tomorrow.

SOME TYPHOID FEVER EXPERIMENTS

Drs. Bartle and Professor Sweetser have just concluded an experiment that proves beyond a doubt that the city water is responsible for our typhoid epidemic. A few days ago the doctors obtained some water from a city hydrant and segregated the germs, inoculating two small guinea pigs with them. One of the pigs was an old one and had a hard spell of the typhoid, but recovered. The other pig died. An autopsy was held on the latter pig and conclusive evidence was found to show that he died from the result of the inoculation.

ANOTHER EXPERIMENT.

The Doctors Bartle have again inoculated three guinea pigs, this time with the city water direct as it comes to the consumer, and these pigs now have well-developed cases of the fever and one will die from the sickness.

A CAUTION.

The doctors say that hope for the abatement of the disease is in boiled water alone, and that none should be so foolhardy or ignorant as to ignore this matter.

MANY NEW CASES.

Yesterday 18 new cases were reported and it is thought as many more exist today. Up to the time of going to press today six new cases have been reported. Nearly all late cases reported can be traced to the city water.

INDOOR TARGET

RIFLES RECEIVED

Companies A and C. O. N. G., have each received from the government a 22-calibre target rifle for indoor practice. A target will at once be placed in the armory and the companies will soon begin indoor shooting.

Note and Comment

If the members of the city council or the new water company think for an instant that the citizens of Eugene

are not in earnest when they ask and demand pure, wholesome water, they are in error. Promises were repeatedly made that a new source of supply for the water system would be obtained that would be satisfactory to the people of Eugene, and further, they intended to have it. The water company is digging new wells, but the location is worse than the present source. The new wells are less than 15 feet from the river bed and in the midst of the most unsanitary conditions that can be imagined. The council is aware of these conditions, yet it does not respond to the voices from the homes of this city. With 100 cases of typhoid and new cases developing daily, several deaths have occurred, and more will follow, it seems to us the height of folly not to attempt to remedy the situation. The Guard fully understands that the new company has only had control of the plant a few days and are much concerned, but the placing of the well for the new water supply does not show good faith. The council last night received a communication from the Fortnightly Club, the women's organization of this city, appealing for help. It is true that Councilman Matlock, supported by three other councilmen, tried to prevent its being ignored by placing it on the table, but the effort failed, and a citizen's petition failed but little better. In speaking of the matter one councilman stated conditions were not as bad as made out by the new-papers. We can easily convince him that he erred. When every physician in Eugene states the conditions as they exist, it is time something was done to give us pure water. The water company has a filter and new pipes enroute. They announce that dead ends will be eliminated entirely. Now if they will eliminate the bad water supply we will have no cause for complaint.

Around the A PUBLIC BUILDING FOR EUGENE

The Commercial Club will meet tonight to discuss the matter of securing an appropriation from congress for the erection of a public building for Eugene. It is probable that a committee will be appointed to communicate with Oregon's representatives in congress looking to such an appropriation.

Salem, not much larger than Eugene, has had its public building for three or four years. Bills have been introduced for public buildings at Baker City, Oregon City and other places in the state, but Eugene has not yet asked for one. We have a population of over 6000 and if we are not entitled to a public building no city in the state outside of Portland is.

The Commercial Club is the proper organization to take up this matter and the Guard predicts that the committee, if one is appointed, will be successful in its efforts to secure an appropriation.

DEATH OF AN EARLY OREGON PIONEER

Died—In Anne, Oregon, on Friday, February 2, 1906, Mrs. Emily Vandenberg, in the 82nd year of her age.

Emily Culver was born in the state of Ohio on March 11, 1824. At the age of 18 years she was united in marriage to John Vandenberg, who died some sixteen years ago. In 1861 she crossed the plains to Oregon with her husband and children and settled on South Coos river near Marshfield, where they made their home for some twenty years. About 1881 they moved to the Siuslaw, and here a few years later Mr. Vandenberg was laid to rest. Since the death of her husband Mrs. Vandenberg has made her home most of the time with her daughter, Mrs. Lindsey.

Funeral services were held Sunday at the remains laid to rest in the Masonic cemetery.

Mrs. Vandenberg left four sons and three daughters.
