THE IDAHO MURDER SENSATION

Each of the Prisoners Charged With Assassinating Steunenburg Date of Preliminary Examination Set For February 27th—Prisoners Allowed More Liberty but no Newspapers

Caldwell, Feb. 21.—Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone were arraigned before Judge Church this morning. Each is charged in the affidavit with exploding a bomb by which Steunenburg met his death. The defendants each are charged with murder. They refused to plead and asked for an immediate preliminary hearing, which was set for February 27th. The demand of the defendants that the prosecution produce the names of its witnesses was overruled by the court. The defendants' attorney alleged the affidavit was insufficient as it charged the individuals with being present at Caldwell and committing the crime, when they were out of the state. It contained not a word charging conspiracy. The prisoners demanded to be allowed more privileges in the penitentiary, which was granted, except that the request for a newspaper was refused. They were committed without bail and taken back to the penitentiary this afternoon. The miners of Silver City discovered a detective working as a miner and mobbed him, and he narrowly escaped being lynched.

Explosive Machine Dissected
Denver, Feb. 21.—An infernal machine which was found "planted" under the gate of the residence of Chief Justice Gabbert was dissected this morning and found to contain a sufficient amount of explosives to kill 100 people.

SEVERAL LIVES LOST IN A LANDSLIDE

On Southern Pacific Company's Track Near Redding, Cal.

Engines Had Been Derailed When Slide Came Down Mountain, Burying Train Men, Passengers and Tramps

Redding, Cal., Feb. 21.—The first section of southbound passenger train number 15 ran into a slide a half mile above Delta at nine o'clock last night. The head engine was hurled from the track and down an embankment and the second engine was derailed on the embankment side. While the crew and several passengers were extricating an injured tramp a second big slide came down, covering the party

at work. Engineer Denny Freed, Fireman Peters, one mail clerk and two tramps were killed. Three passengers are missing and it is believed they are under the mass of earth.

Redding, Feb. 21.—Late reports state that Fireman Peters and the mail clerk have been found injured, but alive. Two passengers are still missing. Engineer Freed and three tramps are dead.

GARFIELD CONTINUES HIS TESTIMONY

Chicago, Feb. 21.—Garfield continued his testimony in the packers' plea for immunity this morning. He emphatically reiterated that he did not in any way promise immunity. He said he did tell the packers he would use the profit and loss accounts in the aggregate, so as not to attack them individually in that quarter.

COUNCILMAN CHAMBERS GUILTY

Ogden, Utah, Feb. 21.—The jury in the case of Fred F. Chambers, president of the city council, charged with taking money from the treasury unlawfully, returned a verdict this morning of guilty. The trial of other councilmen will now be started.

MRS. MORRIS' ARREST WAS JUSTIFIED

Washington, Feb. 21.—Dr. Minor Morris made public today the correspondence with the president regarding the recent expulsion of his wife by force from the White House. Morris demanded a public apology. Secretary Loeb at the direction of the president replied that the president had made an investigation of all attendant circumstances and concluded that the woman's arrest was justified. He said that force was used only just such as was necessary to make the arrest effective.
