WORK ON LINE RESUMES AT ONCE

Although the street committee of the Portland city council has acted favorably on the franchise asked by the United Railways Company and turned a deaf ear to the inducements offered by the Willamette Valley Traction Company, a minority report, favoring the latter organization in the fight for Front street will be made to the council when recommendations are made by the street committee and the fight for the Front street franchise promises to go merrily on for some time. However, whatever will be the issue, the Willamette Valley Traction Company proposes to keep at work, and the construction gangs ordered to stop work pending the street committee's decision have been sent back to work, and the Portland-Salem line will be rushed. Not only that, but the Willamette Valley Traction Company now announces for the first time the construction of a road from Salem to Eugene, work on that extension to start as soon as the Salem division is half completed. This will make the length of the Willamette Valley Traction Company's line out of Portland 125 miles. From Salem the route will be along the east side of the river, through Albany to Eugene, where a bridge across the Wilmette will be necessary.

CONSTRUCTION COMPANY INCORPORATES.

The Willamette Construction Company has just been incorporated by the backers of the Willamette Valley · Traction Company to build the line from Portland to Salem and later to Eugene. This organization has contracted to build the Salem line to the south end of the city within 18 months. Bids have been asked and received for rails from the Pennsylvania Steel Company, the Carnegie Steel Company and the Lackawanna Steel Company, and the contract will be awarded this week. The bids give prices on 7500 tons of 70-pound rails.

Bids have also been received from the Westinghouse people and the General Elect ric Company for four 600 horsepower electric locomotives and eight Pullman vestibuled passenger coaches, 60 feet long, with smoking compartments. The passenger care will run under their own power and the locomotives will be used for freight trains. The locomotives are the first to be operated in the North
