SIX ITALIANS MURDERED AT MINNEAPOLIS

Police Heard the Fight and Seven Murderers Escape

Bodies of Victims Were Hacked to Pieces by Knives--There Is no Trace of the Propetrators of the Crime

Minneapolis, Minn., March 28.—Six Italians were murdered here in a hotel on Tenth avenue, south, last night. The police heard the fight. Eight men ran from the building and the officers thought the trouble was at an end and left. This morning some one entered and found four bodies hacked to pieces by knives, and in the basement found two more bodies. There is no trace of the murderers.

Nine men rented the house two months ago, and their movements were mysterious. The victims evidently fought for their lives. The deed was not for robbery, as a box was found containing \$500 in Italian coins and a check in favor of Nicoli Demtri. A grip bearing that name contained expensive robes of a priest of the Greek Catholic church, also French, Italian, Greek and Turkish passports. Other grips belonging to I. Arseo, Demtri, Dakod, Caponi and Cami Yeny were found, containing Greek Catholic priestly garments.

Seven Greeks have been arrested for connection with the murders.

WATERLOO IOWA HAS A BIG FLOOD

Waterloo, Iowa, March 28.—The Cedar river rose seven feet this morning and has flooded the entire business district, causing \$100,000 damage. The levee has broken and the Y. M. C. A. building, stores and residences are flooded. Hundreds are homeless. The railroads are under water and all roads are blocked. Over \$100,000 damage is reported at Cedar Falls, Iowa. It is believed the worst is over.

SCANDALOUS CONDITIONS OF CONSULAR SERVICE

Washington, March 28.—The president today bared to congress the scandalous conditions of the consular service. John Goodnow, former consul general at Shanghai, and Robert McWade, former consul at Canton, were made the subject of official complaints. There are 82 charges against Goodnow in connection with the collection of claims. McWade is charged with issuing and raising Chinese certificates.

JOHNSTOWN PENNSYLVANIA HAS BIG FIRE

Johnstown, Pa., March 28.—Fire this morning destroyed three business houses in Main, Bedford and Clinton streets, and damaged others. The loss is \$600,000. The Swank Hardware Company, occupying a six-story building, was the main loser.

BRISTOL HOLDS HIS POSITION

President Decides Favorable to Oregon's U. S. District Attorney

Notifies Senator Fulton He Is Convinced Bristol Was Not Guilty of Intentional Wrong Doing

Washington, March 28.—President Roosevelt has decided to again appoint W. C. Bristol U. S. District attorney of Oregon. He notified Senator Fulton of his decision this morning and stated that upon full consideration of the case he was convinced that Bristol was not guilty of intentional wrongdoing in writing the letter upon which the former nomination was withdrawn. Fulton says he will not oppose the confirmation. It is believed the judiciary committee of the senate will take a stand against the confirmation.

SEARCH FOR ALLEGED EXPLOSIVES

Pocatello, March 28.—Up to noon today the search for the alleged concealed explosives in an abandoned sawmill described in the confession of Steve Adams, failed to reveal anything important. Workmen digging over the ground found nothing.

BILL UNCONSTITUTIONAL SAYS KNOX

Washington, March 28.—Senator Knox in a speech on the rate bill this afternoon said: "The Hepburn bill is unconstitutional. A judicial review of all the controversies is a right wrested from courts centuries ago. The court permits the function of a balance wheel between contending passions and policies. This right is now established and whatever disguise they come. It is incomprehensible to me why persons should advocate a bill so clearly unconstitutional and refuse to permit explicit provision for a judicial review."
