Mrs. J. T. Donaldson died at Thurston this morning at 5 o'clock from a tumor of the stomach. She started for Eugene Monday morning to be treated but proceeded only a mile when she became worse and was obliged to stop at the Hastings Hotel at Thurston, where she died. She was 50 years old and leaves a husband and three sons, James, of Portland, George, of Pendleton, and Charles, at home. She also leaves an adopted daughter.

Mrs. Donaldson was an old resident of Lane county and had many friends. She was a member of the Christian church.

W. T. GARROL ALMOST LOSES HIS EYESIGHT

ALLEN EATON FOR REPRESENTATIVE

Petitions are being circulated here and throughout the county among Republicans for Allen Eaton, proprietor of Eaton's book store, for the nomination of state representative. Mr. Eaton is well known in town and the county and it is understood has been urged by some of the best men of the party to enter the race. We know the young man and feel that his appearance will add to the interest of the race which will soon be on. He is a native son, graduate of the University of Oregon, where he gained for himself and his institution considerable prestige, having led in 1902 the Oregon debating team against Washington, when a unanimous decision was given Oregon, establishing her as champion of the Northwest. He is an ardent advocate of right, regardless of the consequences, and if elected will make a good legislator. He edited the first Junior Annual, the Oregon Weekly and is considered among the best speakers that the university has had in its student body. After finishing his work at the university and establishing his business here, he married into a pioneer family, the daughter of Benj. F. Dorris. His platform reads:

"I shall continue my faith in the people and their ability to choose for themselves, and I will work for my party whose principles live and are expressed in the work of Theodore Roosevelt. I will strive for a more just and efficient system of taxation, a more practical school system, stronger support for the state university, better regulation of public corporations, good roads, national aid for Siuslaw, business economy and a progressive spirit in state appropriations and expenditures, and such other laws as will bring to us the best people from this and other nations."

FILTERING PLANT ARRIVES AT LAST

A portion of the Willamette Valley Company's filtering plant for the Eugene water works arrived here this morning. The portion which has arrived consists of a huge iron tank, probably 20 feet long and eight feet in diameter. It has attracted considerable attention at the depot today. A second car with the remainder of the plant is expected to arrive immediately. The plant was built by the Philadelphia Iron Works, and is said to be complete in every detail.

The foundation for the filter has been completed at the site of the new pumping station at the end of East Eighth street and the plant will be at once installed.

HURD AND KYLE GO TO LAW

The Hurd Lumber and Manufacturing Co., of Florence, has begun suit in the circuit court against Wm. Kyle, Christina Kyle and the Florence Lumber Co. for an order enjoining and restraining the defendants from encroaching and trespassing upon the plaintiff's property at Florence and from interfering with plaintiff in the construction of its log boom and other improvements also for \$6700 damages; also a decree compelling defendants to keep their contract for the execution and delivery to the plaintiff of a good quit claim deed conveying to the plaintiff certain tide lands along the Siuslaw river.

This suit is the result of trouble that has existed between the plaintiff and defendants for several years. In 1905, the Kyle's destroyed log boom and other improvements in by O. W. Hurd at his mill. Florence, the Kyle's claiming the land where the boom was located to them and Hurd claiming that the Kyle's had entered into a tract to deed him the land, claiming possession.

Hurd alleges in his complaint that the defendants have repeatedly passed and encroached upon his premises and interfered with his plaintiff in the operation of his mill.
