NEW PRIMARY LAW SEEMS EXPENSIVE

The primary nominating election on April 20th is conducted just the same as the general election, which follows as before, on the first Monday in June. The election expenses chargeable to the county are thereby doubled up, as the primaries are supplied with ballots, stationery, etc., just as the judges and clerks are paid at public expense. The new law adds considerably to the work of the county clerk's office. County Clerk Lee must send out supplies to each of the 50 precincts of the county before April 20th, the supplies consisting of the following articles: One package containing white ballots for the Republican party. One package containing blue ballots for the Democratic party. One package containing colored ballots for the Democratic party. One package containing colored ballots for the Republican party. One package containing two poll books, 10 tally sheets and 25 official seals. One package containing three pens and penholders, five indestructible copying pencils, three bottles of ink, three blotting pads, two needles and string, one stick sealing wax and six brass chips. One package containing the ballot box and key. The contents of most of these packages are enclosed in heavy manila envelopes, 12x18 inches, all of which have to be endorsed by filling in a number of blanks. All paraphernalia and red tape must be furnished at the expense of the county to place in nomination men in the leading political parties on the 20th of April.

That was a wonderful old man, Henry G. Hadley. The writer will never forget the story of his early manhood as told by him two summer days during a long drive. He started life as assistant to a shrewd New England peddler, driving one of two wagons. That was some seventy years ago, and during the several seasons thus employed he practically covered all the new great states west of New York state. He saw Chicago a struggling, misshapen town with less inhabitants by several thousand than Eugene. He had a fund of experiences, and their narration made a long, hot and dusty drive seem short. Ninety two years! A great old age, especially when comparatively few of the best of them were clouded with the mental and physical weaknesses incident to advanced years.

Did you ever note how a contested city election needlessly excites men and strains even firm friendships? The presidential election is nothing compared with it for genuine interest.
