## COAST AND EASTERN INCORPORATED

The company charter provides that it may operate steamboats on the waters of the north Pacific ocean and may extend its lines into Washington, California, Idaho and Utah.

### A BILYEU TURNS REPUBLICAN

A Linn county political tradition was shattered yesterday, says an Albany dispatch of Monday, when Otto Bilyeu, of Scio, registered as a Republican. It is the first instance on record when a member of this pioneer family enrolled as a Republican, and no change could have made so much surprise in local politics.

In early days the Bilyeu family settled in the country known locally as "the forks of the Santiam," lying between the North and South Santiam rivers. Its descendants are numerous and the family has taken a prominent part in upbuilding the country, and especially in political affairs.

It has been tradition that a Bilyeu never voted anything but the Democratic ticket. Not only was this true of those who bore the name Bilyeu, but of other branches of the family. There are perhaps half a hundred voters of that family in Linn county, and they have always been Democrats. Among the members of the family who have attained prominence in Democratic state politics are Hon. W. R. Bilyeu, of Albany, who has several times represented Linn county in the legislature, and Hon. Lark Bilyeu, of Eugene.

Otto Bilyeu, who has broken the family tradition, is registered in the South Scio precinct. He gives his occupation on the registration roll as a laborer, and is 25 years old.

## INVESTIGATIONS BY FORESTRY SERVICE

Cottage Grove, Or., April 10.—G. M. Homans, special agent of the forest service, has returned from a five days' trip to the forest reserve along Frank Brice creek. He is investigating conditions in the reserve relative to the sale of the mature timber. He thinks he has arrived at a value of the timber that will be satisfactory to the department. Several bids have been made on the reserve timber in quantities of from 200,000,000 to 600,000,000 feet.

G. M. Ingram, also of the forestry service, who has been in the reserve in the vicinity of the Bohemia mines estimating timber and mapping, came out Saturday and goes from here to the McKenzie river. Mr. Ingram says he has never seen any hand along the McKenzie which would be more valuable for agriculture than for its timber.

## ED HANSON WILL MOVE HIS STORE

Ed Hanson, the popular clothier, has decided to move to his own building shortly on Ninth street, just east of the Titus block. There is much speculation as to who will occupy the Matlock building, to be vacated by Mr. Hanson, it being considered the best corner in Eugene.

Mr. Matlock says he has several good offers for a lease on the building, but is in no hurry about it.

Junction District Convention Held at Union School House April 6 and 7

The Junction District Sunday School Association met at Union school for its annual convention April 6 and 7.

The convention was called to order at 7:30 Friday evening by O. Bennett, president of the association. Devotional service was held for a half hour, and then the convention listened to a very able address by Rev. N. J. Harbit, of Junction City.

Saturday morning the convention was opened with a song service by the Olive Sunday school. A very cordial address of welcome was made by D. K. Lathy, and responded to by Wm. Pitney, of Junction City.

Several important questions were taken up by the convention and in the discussions that followed it was plainly evident that we have some splendid workers in the district who are very much in earnest in Sunday school work. The teachers all take a deep interest in their work in the classes.

"Children's hour" was conducted by Rev. Baker, Mrs. Bushnell, of Junction City, and Miss Ollie Warden, of Irving. Quite a number of children from Junction and Irving took part in the exercises.

There are thirteen schools in the district, all but two reporting. In the schools reporting there are 497 scholars and 72 teachers, showing a slight decrease from last year's report, due chiefly to slack methods of enrollment. Amount expended by the schools, \$133; for state and county work, \$4.71.

A splendid dinner was served on the grounds of the schoolhouse, such a dinner as only Oregon Sunday school women know how to get up. The people of Union did everything in their power to make their guests comfortable, in fact they set a pace that will be hard for future conventions to keep up with and better still, a Christian spirit was noticeable in every act.

Orrin Bennett was again chosen president of the association and J. M. Day secretary and treasurer.

The convention will be entertained by the Sunday school workers of Smithfield next year.
