

HARRIMAN SAYS BUILD DRAIN ROAD

Portland, May 24.—E. H. Harriman has given orders by wire to the Portland officials of the S. P. Co. to construct immediately a road eight miles in length from Drain to Marshfield. The road will form the northern portion of a new coast line between San Francisco and Portland.

The Harriman interests and President Foster, of the California Northwestern, have in the latter road the southern end of the proposed new line. These same interests are also preparing to extend the California Northwestern from Willits to Eureka, while between Eureka and Marshfield Harriman has had for a couple of months surveyors looking over the ground.

The Drain-Marshfield road has been permanently located almost its entire length, but the maps and field notes were lost in the San Francisco fire, so that the engineers were compelled to return to Drain and begin over again. It was thought that this incident might delay the commencement of a full construction work, but Harriman's orders indicate that everything is to be hurried forward as far as possible.

PERKINS IS NOT GUILTY OF LARCENY

New York, May 25.—George W. Perkins intended no crime and committed no crime when he contributed the New York Life policy holders' money to the Republican campaign fund, according to the decision of the appellate division of the supreme court today. Perkins was charged with grand larceny, but was discharged today. The decision is also a victory for District Attorney Jerome, who was opposed to prosecution of the insurance officials.

RAILROADS HAD FAVORITES.

Philadelphia, May 25.—Further evidence of the manner in which the Pennsylvania railroad employees secured stock in coal mining companies was disclosed in the hearing today. P. H. Large, assistant coal freight agent, detailed the allowances the road made to some mining companies, while others complained fruitlessly of their neglect.

CASSATT COMING HOME.

Philadelphia, May 25.—It is officially stated that President Cassatt, of the Pennsylvania railroad, sailed from Europe Saturday for home. The recent revelations of grafting by officials of the company is responsible for his sudden return.

RAILROADS AND STANDARD.

Cleveland, May 25.—Frank Retter, head of the National Refining Co. and National Pipe Line Company, was a witness before the interstate commerce commission hearing today. He told of the winning fight made by the Standard Company and its pirate companies. He said that the railroads in behalf of the Standard, delayed their shipments for months.

PRESBYTERIANS ARE UNITED IN ONE CHURCH

Des Moines, May 24.—The Cumberland branch of the Presbyterian church passed out of history today when Moderator Corbett officially established the union of the Cumberland with the Presbyterian church. Both church boards will act together until next year, when actual consolidation will occur.

The assembly today adopted plans for the union of all denominations and churches on special temperance lines. The Unitarian church alone was excluded by the insertion of the word "divine" in the list.

The assembly also celebrated the two hundredth anniversary of the first assembly in America. Messages from all parts of the world were read.

Yesterday the assembly finally compromised the controversy over Dr. Henry Vandkye's book of forms by striking out everything that would indicate that the book was authorized.

Des Moines, May 25.—The Presbyterian assembly has wired President Roosevelt and the senate a resolution in which they ask them to declare Smoot's seat vacant and "help remove a treacherous menace to our free institutions."

Plans are being made for a federation for temperance work, disregarding the church and creed.

SOUTHERNERS NOT READY.

Green Bay, Wis., May 25.—The Southern Presbyterian assembly decided to postpone consideration of closer relations with other Presbyterian churches until next year.

LOS ANGELES SPORTS FEEL AWFUL SORE

Los Angeles, May 26.—The sporting public awoke this morning with a dark brown taste in its mouth as a result of last night's fight fiasco. It will be many days before the followers of the boxing game recover from the shock, and condemnation of Herrera's action is general. A movement has been started to have him blacklisted in every reputable boxing club in the country. Nelson and Nolan are the sorest pair of men in town today, but the unanimous approval given them for the stand they took is some balm to their wounded feelings and their pocketbooks. Jeffries' published statement this morning in which he lauds Nelson to the skies is particularly pleasing to the little Dane, who, on account of his refusal to permit Jeffries to referee the Britt-Nelson fight had not stood well with the ex-champion.

Nolan today made a demand for the \$1000 forfeit deposited by Herrera to make weight. It is likely that Herrera will meet this demand with a claim on Nelson's \$1000 forfeit for his appearance.

Los Angeles, May 26.—There was no fight last night between Battling Nelson and Aurelia Herrera, because the latter claimed the scales were out of order, and would not weigh in.

After a half hour's argument Jacobs, Herrera's manager, sent him to dinner. After that he refused to allow the Mexican to weigh in. Nelson offered to go to the baths to weigh, but Jacobs declined.

Jacobs issued the following statement: "I had Herrera at McCarey's (manager of the club) office before six o'clock. I tried to balance the scales, which, by the way, were scales Nolan (Nelson's manager) brought in from Nelson's quarters, but could not do so. They were six or seven pounds off. We argued and squabbled until 6:15, when I sent Herrera to eat. After that I would not consent to weigh in. I claim the weight forfeit and appearance money because my man was in the ring at 8:30. I lived up to the articles and don't think we are to blame for the fiasco."

Nolan said: "We found the scales out of order. I wanted to go to the baths to weigh, but Herrera refused. I then stated I would claim the weight forfeit and went back to the baths. Nelson came into the ring as you saw and made a proposition to fight Herrera at 140 pounds. Nelson wanted to satisfy the crowd."

REMOVING 'FRISCO RUINS ON BIG SCALE

San Francisco, May 26.—The railroads are rapidly completing their plans for the removal of debris on a large scale and many tracks are already laid through the burned district, a large force of employees being organized. The action of the insurance companies in permitting their policyholders to remove the debris, together with the announcement of a three-dollar rate per car, removed the last obstacles to cleaning up. Each day brings the announcement of the proposed erection of many new buildings in the burned district.

The number receiving free rations has been reduced to sixty thousand. Ten food stations have been closed, leaving sixty in operation, and about four thousand are being fed at soup kitchens.

NO RAISE IN TAXES.

In an interview today Mayor Schmitz said there would be no advance in the tax rate and that the one dollar limit would be rigorously preserved. Municipal expenses will be reduced to the lowest possible figure and the yearly appropriation of each department of city government will be reduced to practically one-third, and the salaries of all city employees will be apportioned on that basis.

Boise, Ida., May 26.—Clarence Darrow, the great criminal lawyer of Chicago, employed by the miners of Illinois to assist in the defense of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone, charged with the murder of ex-Governor Stansbury, arrived in Boise this morning.
