As yet no new bark has been brought to this market and the probabilities are that the 1906 peel will be very light.

CHAMBERLAIN RE-ELECTED BY DECISIVE VOTE

Portland, June 5.—Governor Chamberlain has carried the state by a decisive majority. His list of counties includes Multnomah, where in a count of 11,000 votes he has a lead of 408. This ratio means an 800 majority. He has also carried the following counties: Clatsop, 200; Multnomah, from 100 to 500; Union, 600; Wasco, 250; Umatilla, 100; Josephine, 100; Douglas, 200.

All the Republican candidates in Multnomah county except Stevens are elected by big majorities. The Republican legislative ticket won by a vote of three to one.

"Chamberlain is re-elected by a plurality of from 2000 to 5000," said State Chairman Sweek, of the Democratic committee. "His vote was far heavier than we expected, exceeding our estimates everywhere. Many counties we had conceded to Withycombe were carried by Chamberlain."

BOURNE WINS SENATORSHIP.

Gearin ran far ahead of his ticket, but the popular endorsement has gone to Bourne.

The Republicans have elected both congressional candidates, Ellis by a large majority in the second district and Hawley by a greatly reduced party vote in the first district.

The entire Republican state ticket, with the exception of Withycombe, is elected by a large majority. In some precincts Benson for secretary of state got two votes to Withycombe's one.

MAJORITY INCREASING

Portland, 2:30 p. m.—Chamberlain's majorities are increasing and will total 4000. Late returns show that he carries Yamhill, Linn, Tillamook, Marion and Columbia.

Multnomah county, incomplete, gives Bourne, 6580; Gearin, 5717; Chamberlain, 6882; Withycombe, 6253; Stevens, 6635; Word 6530. The country districts are increasing Word's lead.

Benton gives Withycombe 300 plurality.

BROWNELL IS BEATEN.

Oregon City, Or., June 5.—Chamberlain has carried Clackamas county by 150.

G. W. Brownell is defeated for the state senate by Hedges, Dem.

CROOK FOR CHAMBERLAIN.

Prineville, June 5.—Chamberlain carries Crook by 150.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE BEATEN.

Woman suffrage is defeated in the state. The local option amendment is also defeated.

DOUGLAS COUNTY RESULTS.

Roseburg, June 5.—County is close on governor. Bourne carries Jackson and Douglas counties for senator.

On the county ticket the Democrats elect Agree, clerk, and Wonnocott, judge; McChallen, Republican, is re-elected sheriff.

RAILROAD COMPANY OWNS COAL STOCK

New York, June 5.—Vice President Rosseter, of the New York Central railroad, admitted that his company owned stock and bonds in the soft coal mines, before the interstate-commerce commission hearing this morning.

Senator Stone made a vindictive attack upon President Roosevelt in the senate Saturday. He arraigned the president as a political coward, afraid to come out boldly against trusts and corporations that contributed millions to the Republican campaign funds.

The Dalles, Or., June 3.—As the result of a series of heavy rains this afternoon, culminating in a severe cloudburst at one point, three bad landslides have occurred on the O. R. & N. roadway, in consequence of which there is another blockade of traffic, although a large force has been sent to the scene of the disaster.

Topoka, June 4.—Senator Burton resigned today after a conference with Governor Hoch.

Madrid, June 4.—The body of Manuel Morales, the would-be assassin of King Alfonso, was buried today.

The capture and suicide Saturday night at Torrejon de Ardos of Manuel Morales, the chief suspect of the bomb outrage against King Alfonso and Queen Victoria, adds another dramatic chapter to the events surrounding the royal wedding.

HORRIFYING CONDITIONS IN PACKING HOUSES

Washington, June 4.—Horrible revelations, almost beyond belief, are made in the special report on Chicago packing house conditions by Commissioners of Labor O'Neill and Reynolds, of New York, submitted to congress today by the president.

In his message accompanying the report President Roosevelt described the conditions as revolting. He urges immediate and drastic legislation according to the Beveridge amendment.

The report is not nice reading, and the statement is sickening. It shows that the packers generally have displayed a disregard, not only of the common rules of sanitation, but even of decency. The report says that the stockyards pavements are mostly of brick filled with manure and refuse, not properly cleaned, slimy and malodorous when wet and dusty when dry. Stock which has died enroute is thrown on a platform in the yards.

MEAT REVOLT IN GREAT BRITAIN SPREADS RAPIDLY

London, June 2.—The British press is devoting much space to the revelations regarding American meat packers and appeals are made to the people to support home industry and restrict the sale of American canned goods. Orders for large consignments of American canned meats have either been cancelled or reduced.

The Times today made a bitter attack on the "Yankee meat bosses."

HELEN GOULD BRINGS SISTER TO AMERICA

New York, June 2.—Miss Helen Gould, of New York, is a passenger on board the steamer Deutschland, bound for Paris. Miss Gould is on her way to Paris to meet and bring back to America her sister Anna, Countess de Castellane, whose divorce troubles have interested the fashionable sets of two continents.

SENATOR BURTON HAS QUIT AT LAST

Washington, June 2.—Senator Long and Representative Curtis, of Kansas, expect word from Kansas today. Senator Burton has presented his resignation from the senate to Governor Hoch, who it is expected will appoint either J. S. Dean, former district attorney, Roscoe S. Stubbs or "Dave" Mulvane, the national committeeman.

STATEHOOD AGREED TO.

Washington, June 2.—The statehood bill conferees reached a final agreement and signed their report this afternoon.

"JIM CROW" KNOCKED OUT.

The rate bill conferees have agreed to eliminate the senate "Jim Crow" amendment.

GAMBLER CANFIELD CREATES SENSATION

New York, June 2.—Richard Canfield, the gambler, has purchased for \$20,000 a residence on East Fifth street, one door from E. H. Harriman's home, and the fashionable neighborhood is much stirred up. It is said that John D. Rockefeller owned the property. It will not be used as a gambling house.

JOHN MITCHELL WILL NOT RESIGN

Indianapolis, June 2.—The national executive board of the miners' union in the anthracite field was summoned to meet here Monday for a reason that is unknown. The rumor that President Mitchell is to resign is scouted by members of the union.

CYCLONES SWEEP LONE STAR STATE

Fort Worth, June 5.—Grayson county, Texas, was swept by a cyclone last night. It began fifty miles north of Sherman and traveled northeast. Houses were wrecked and people took refuge in storm cellars.

C. H. Pickett will close out his grocery and hardware store here and move to Springfield, where he will conduct a similar business. The change will take place in July.

SENATOR GORMAN DIES SUDDENLY OF HEART FAILURE

Washington, June 4.—Senator Gorman died here at 9:16 today of heart failure. He had been ill several weeks, but death was unexpected. The burial will take place at Laurel, Maryland, probably next Wednesday.

(Arthur F. Gorman had been for years a leader in the national senate, and one of the leaders of the Democratic party. For two years past he has been gradually dropping out of national attention, due largely to failing health. He was born in 1833.)

SENATE ADJOURNS.

Washington, June 4.—The senate adjourned at 12:10 out of respect to the memory of the late Senator Gorman.

WASHINGTON, JUNE 4.—The United States will not enter into an international compact for the obliteration of anarchists. Congress would doubtless pass such a law, but the difficulty is that the country has no national police to enforce it.

MRS. STANFORD'S WILL ATTACKED BY HER NIECE

San Francisco, June 4.—Charging the late Mrs. Jane L. Stanford with deliberate fraud and conspiracy, a suit was filed this morning by Annie F. Stanford, daughter of Asa Stanford, brother of the late Senator Leeland Stanford, against the executors of Mrs. Stanford's will. It is claimed that the senator entered into an agreement to pay \$1000 a month to Asa Stanford and also to give him \$500,000 in shares of the Central Pacific railroad. When the senator died he addressed an envelope to Asa with the stock, but Mrs. Stanford is alleged to have withheld it from its rightful owner.

FREE METHODISTS MAKE APPOINTMENTS

Salem, Or., June 2.—The Free Methodists annual conference closes Sunday, having been in session since Wednesday, under the presidency of Rev. Alexander Beers, president of the Seattle Seminary.

CON SULLIVAN DEAD

Con. Sullivan, superintendent of the Corvallis & Eastern, died at his home in Albany at 3 o'clock Saturday morning.

The day before he made a trip to the front on the road. During the evening he complained of feeling badly, and his stepson, Charles Fox, rubbed his limbs to relieve him. About 3 o'clock Mrs. Sullivan, whose room was adjoining, heard him make a noise which seemed unnatural, and hastening to the room found him lying over the footboard in a prostrate condition. He died soon after. Dr. Davis was called but too late for assistance. His death was evidently from heart trouble, with a complication of troubles. He was 49 years of age.

The Shiron estate will rebuild the Palace Hotel in San Francisco at a cost of \$2,500,000. The old building will be largely duplicated.
