

AMERICANS BATTLE WITH MEXICAN MINERS

Orleans, June 2.—A special from Bisbee, Arizona, says Colonel W. C. Greene was killed at Cananea, Mexico, last night. Governor Yezzel is on the scene with Mexican troops, but the shooting continues from both sides. It is believed that about fifty have been killed, many of them being Mexicans.

U. S. TROOPS ARE ENROUTE.
Washington, June 2.—Major Watts reports from Bisbee to confirm the news of the starting of troops for the Mexican border to aid the Americans attacked at Cananea last night, and asking for further instructions, has been received by the war department. Secretary Taft and Chief of Staff Bell are consulting regarding the matter.

The state department has also received Consul Galbraith's dispatch stating that the Cananea situation is serious and that federal help is absolutely essential. The war department is holding troops at the border, as the state department says they cannot

cross the line without Mexico's consent.

SCENE AND CAUSE OF BATTLE.

Cananea is the location of Colonel W. C. Greene's great mining camp, and is 45 miles south of Naco, Arizona. The trouble seems to have grown out of the demand of miners for a raise from \$3.50 to \$5 a day, and an outbreak has been brewing for some time. Yesterday afternoon the Mexicans are said to have opened fire on the American employees and officials, who are in sympathy with the mine management, and many were killed. The Americans were greatly outnumbered but bravely resisted the enraged Mexicans, a sanguinary battle ensuing. George McDonald, manager of the lumber department, and his brother were among those killed early in the action. It is said that the town has been burned, the Mexicans blowing up the house of Americans with dynamite. The late dispatches place the name of Colonel Greene in the list of those killed.

HEAVY LOSSES REPORTED IN EASTERN OREGON

Walla Walla, May 31.—A quarter of a million dollars, it is believed, will not cover the damage done in Walla Walla county alone, caused by yesterday's terrific floods, and when all reports are in it may be found that the loss will reach half a million. The damage to the residence and business districts of the city will not total over \$300,000, the principal damage being to garden and fruit tracts, alfalfa and hayfields in the Toucheta, Lowden and Walla Walla valley districts. Bridges and roads have been destroyed and the loss of business to manufacturing concerns, forced to close down through the wrecking of the power plant of the Northwestern Gas & Electric Company, will be very large. The whole Walla Walla valley is under water and the loss to farmers is enormous. Many bridges on the lower Walla Walla, Toucheta and Tumulus are out. In many places the channels of the streams have changed.

DAMAGE VERY GREAT.

Pendleton, May 31.—The floods are subsiding today. Six blocks of the levee were washed away and thousands of residents of the city compelled to leave their homes. The property loss is great. Many families of farmers are camped in Pendleton. The O. R. & N. Railroad is the heaviest loser, and there will be no trains for a week. The two power plants furnishing light and power for the surrounding country were destroyed. Houses were seen floating down stream and many are left homeless and destitute by the flood.

LOSS AT WESTON.

Weston, Or., May 31.—Fifty thousand dollars is the amount of damage here by the flood. Four bridges are gone. Water works pipes are broken and the city is without water. Three stores are in the creek, having been undermined.

Pendleton, June 1.—The total estimate of the flood loss in Unadilla county and to stock in the mountains will amount to nearly \$2,000,000. The stock loss has been heavy and it is impossible to determine its extent at this time as owners cannot get into many localities. Every hour brings new reports of greater damage. Dead sheep have been seen all along the streams in the mountains, herders finding it necessary to abandon them to escape themselves.

The damage loss at Pendleton will amount to over \$50,000. The west end of the city is full of pools of water, and many homes cannot be entered for some time. In the low places water has settled near the levee, ruining gardens and homes.

TRAIN ROBBERS GET LONG SENTENCES

Vancouver, June 2.—After being out twenty minutes the jury at Kamloops returned a verdict of guilty against the Canadian Pacific train robbers. Judge Irving sentenced Miner and Dunn to life imprisonment and Colquhoun to 25 years.

BOMB-THROWER UNDER ARREST IN MADRID

Madrid, May 31.—King Alfonso and Princess Ena were married at noon today at the Sagrario church in the presence of a thousand persons from the chief countries of the world. Cardinal Sanchez, Catholic primate of Spain, assisted by high primates, performed the ceremony.

DODGED THE BOMB.

Madrid, May 31.—A bomb was thrown at King Alfonso and Queen Ena today. Both escaped unhurt. The bomb was thrown from the balcony and killed two horses hitched to the king's carriage and a child. A boy was arrested in connection with the affair.

Madrid, June 1.—A high police official states that the bomb thrower during the wedding procession has been arrested and has confessed. He is now in the Madrid jail. King Alfonso was so close to death that a ribbon on his coat was torn by a splinter. Fourteen are dead as a result of the explosion and General Weyler is injured. Queen Victoria is indisposed today as a result of the bomb throwing, and the crowds are participating in the festivities half-heartedly.

Alfonso's attendants are to attend the victim's funerals.

TWO ATTEMPTS MADE.

London, June 1.—Local anarchists state that two attempts were made to assassinate King Alfonso and bride Thursday. The first bomb failed to explode in the church.

ENGLISHMAN ARRESTED.

Madrid, June 1.—An Englishman named Robert Hamilton has been arrested as an accomplice of the would-be assassin and the crowd tried to lynch him. Hamilton was identified as the man on the balcony with the bomb thrower.

Madrid, June 2.—Robert Hamilton, the Englishman arrested on suspicion of being an accomplice of the anarchist bomb thrower, was released this morning. He proved to be a tourist. A reception has been substituted for the state ball today.

ANTI-IMMUNITY BILL PASSES THE SENATE

Washington, May 31.—The senate today passed the anti-immunity bill to prevent further defeats in the courts similar to that the government met in the beef trust prosecution.

A bill for federal inspection of all meats offered for interstate or foreign commerce was introduced in the house today.

RETURN TO CAPITAL.

Washington, May 31.—President and Mrs. Roosevelt and party returned this afternoon on board the Mayflower. The trip was without incident.
