AGED PIONEER WOMAN

DIED THIS MORNING

Mrs. Abigail A. Hemenway, one of Lane county's pioneer women, died at the home of her son, Volney Hemenway, Sr., at 504 High street, this forenoon at 11 o'clock. The cause of death was extreme age. She would have been 92 years old on November 7th of this year. She came across the plains from Iowa in 1853, settling about two miles west of Junction City in Lane county, residing in this vicinity continuously since. She leaves the following children: Volney, of Eugene; Frank, of Hadleyville; Ansel, of Goshen; Dr. Stacey M., of Klamath Agency, and Ellen Haskins, of Dusty.

An obituary will be published later. The funeral will be held tomorrow forenoon. The cortege will leave the residence at 10 o'clock and the services will be held at the grave in Oak Hill cemetery.

COUNCIL VISITED BY THE CITY'S BUSINESS MEN

When the city council was called to order by Mayor Wilkins last night the room was filled with representative business men who had gathered to urge the necessity of immediate action on the proposed ordinance granting a franchise for an electric street railway in the city.

Before beginning with the business of the evening Mayor Wilkins extended an invitation to any one present to address the council. Professor John Straub was the first to speak. He stated that very few of the citizens knew much about the provisions of the proposed franchise and suggested that it be published in the papers.

D. E. Yoran, president of the Merchants' Protective Association, who has been foremost in creating an interest in the electric railway matter, as well as in all matters pertaining to the city's growth and welfare, made the speech of the evening. He urged immediate action on the part of the council and suggested that better things could be done for the city if the council would get down to a harmonious working basis.

R. A. Booth favored a competing railroad but wouldn't like to see a street railway built now. He said the city is not yet large enough for it, and that the building of the tracks would mar the appearance of our beautiful streets.

W. K. Scarborough and M. Svarverud spoke in favor of the street railway.

Councilman W. W. Calkins took occasion to state some objections to the proposed franchise and intimated that he didn't believe that the Williams Valley Co. intended using the franchise themselves if they secured it.

As stated in last evening's Guard, it was not the intention of the council to act on the franchise last night and such was announced by Mayor Wilkins. After the business of the council was completed an adjournment was taken till Tuesday evening, June 19, at which time the franchise will be further discussed.

BUSINESS MATTERS.

A petition for an arc light at Fifteenth and Willamette streets was read and referred.

The contract for street sprinkling was laid over for explanations.

A petition for grading and graveling Garden street, in Fairmount, was read and granted.

The matter of paying the freight on the old fire apparatus to be exchanged for a new chemical engine was discussed and it was agreed to pay half the amount.

The matter of collecting the city's share of the county road money collected was discussed. City Attorney Bean reported that he had put in the claim to the county court, which promised to look into the matter. The attorney was instructed to institute suit against the county in the circuit court if the claim is not allowed.

DONATION OF BOOKS.

The following resolutions were read:

"Whereas, J. W. Geary Post No. 7, Department of Oregon, G. A. R., owns two sets of the official history of the Civil War; and

"Whereas, The city of Eugene now possesses an up-to-date fire proof library building; therefore be it

"Resolved, That J. W. Geary Post No. 7, department of Oregon, G. A. R., donate to the city of Eugene one complete set of volumes of the official history of the Civil War."

THANKS TO THE CITY.

"Whereas, The citizens of Eugene on the occasion of Memorial Day, May 31, contributed in so many ways to the success of the occasion, not the least of which was the liberal display of the national colors in decorating their buildings and giving us their presence at the various exercises; therefore be it

"Resolved, That J. W. Geary Post, G. A. R., extend a vote of thanks to all our citizens for their assistance and sympathy upon that occasion.

"Resolved, That we desire to especially thank Mayor Wilkins and Chief Farrington and other city officials for keeping the circus off Willamette street during the hours the G. A. R. was using it for their parade.

"Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be furnished to the press of Eugene."

The gift of the books was accepted with thanks.

Governor Chamberlain will have the appointment of a circuit judge in the Tenth judicial district to succeed Supreme Judge-elect Eakin, whose term does not expire until July 1, 1908. Among the candidates mentioned are Thomas H. Crawford and Tamm Oliver, of Union.

WILL LOCATE BLUE RIVER ROAD WITHOUT DELAY

Efforts will at once be made to locate a county road from Blue River City to the mines. A petition, in the usual legal form, has been prepared and will at once be sent to Blue River to be signed by property owners along the road. This matter is in charge of A. S. Powers, who is acting under the direction of the Merchants' Protective Association. His son, Glenn Powers, who conducts a store at Blue River, will circulate the petition.

As before stated by the Guard, the plan is to locate the road where the Lucky Boy company's road now is, only extending it beyond the Lucky Boy mine to accommodate the other principal mines in the district. The county court will appoint viewers who will assess the damages, as in the case of opening a new road. The court could not purchase the road outright, as the Lucky Boy people have no title to it except to that portion which extends through their own land.

Articles of incorporation of the Kelsey Mining Co. were filed with the county clerk today. The incorporators are John W. Buoy, Albert Wood and C. M. Sherer, and the capital stock is \$500,000, with offices in Eugene. The objects are to do a general mining business.

It is understood that this corporation is formed to work some copper deposits near Creswell. Several Eugene men are interested in the project.
