THE FIRST SCHOOL- HOUSES OF EUGENE

An Early Pioneer Tells of the First Institutions of Learning Built Here

Editor Guard:—The Native Daughters have recently met to discuss the matter in regard to the early historic places in the city of Eugene, especially the first schoolhouse, which was built by Prior F. Blair, one of Oregon's well-known and highly respected pioneers of 1847. He crossed the plains amid all the hardships and exposures incident to a trip of that period, but reached Oregon in safety, took up his claim and made a beautiful home amidst all discouragements of a pioneer life, now left as a true and noble work of an honest and good man, sacred to his memory. This schoolhouse served as a courthouse and for divine service, as well as public amusements. It was located near the corner of Green's grocery store, and during the court session under the branches of that sturdy old oak tree assembled the jury.

In this first school of Eugene the teachers were as follows: Thomas Katin, H. Dade, Bobby Jourdin Macy. The next was a private school conducted by a Professor J. H. Rogers. During his teaching and time the noted Columbia College was erected upon College Hill, which is now seen as one of the most beautiful places surrounding our fair city. This college of learning was taught by the following noted teachers of that day: Professor Rhyman, Revs. Pinkey and Dickey Henderson, assisted by Miss Hettie Stevens. During this time the school on the Skinner hill was built. The first teachers were a Mr. Cornelius and Mrs. Gen. Odell, followed by others. This state is ment given by an early pioneer.

INSPECTION BILL PASSED HOUSE AS APPROVED BY TEDDY

Washington, June 19.—The meat inspection bill passed the house today. It authorizes an annual appropriation of \$3,000,000 to pay the cost of inspection and will contain no provision for the levy of an assessment to make up any deficiency in the amount available for this work, as suggested by Mr. Cowan, representing the Texas cattlegrowers and later urged by the president. The court review provision is stricken out, and "in the judgement of the Secretary of Agriculture" is out of the bill, as well as the provision waiving the civil service in the appointment of inspectors for one year.

The bill now meets the approval of the president.

MATTERS IN CONGRESS.

The house committee on interstate and foreign commerce has authorized a favorable report on the bill authorizing St. Louis to build a free bridge over the Mississippi river.

The house passed the bill appropriating \$2,000,000, mostly for rifle practice.

WOODMEN MONUMENTS UNVEILED SUNDAY

The Woodmen of the World and Women of Woodcraft held joint unveiling ceremonies yesterday at the monuments which they have erected over the graves of several of their deceased neighbors in the two Eugene cemeteries.

The ceremonies, which were held in the afternoon, first took place at the Masonic cemetery, where Neighbor Melissa C. Scott is buried. The Woodmen and Women of Woodcraft then drove back to the I. O. O. F. cemetery, where the monuments over Neighbors Sarah F. Wright, Ella Philippi, J. S. Stiles, R. C. Huston and Lew Powers were unveiled.

The services were beautiful and impressive. The Women of Woodcraft used only the ritualistic work of the order, but the Woodmen, in addition, were addressed by Attorney J. M. Williams, who spoke eloquently.

AGRICULTURAL BILL.

This morning Congressman Wadsworth reported the agricultural appropriation bill as approved by the president and it was referred to the committee of the whole on state of the union.

SHAW WILL HELP.

Secretary Shaw discussed with the senate finance committee the financial situation of San Francisco today. Shaw promised he would afford all the relief possible in the depleting of government funds.

ANOTHER BILL PASSED.

This afternoon the house passed a bill giving the state of California to schools five per cent. of the amount received from the sale of government lands. California has about one million acres involved and is the last state to receive benefits from public land sales.

LOCAL FIRE INSURANCE COMPANY

The Merchants' Protective Association at its meeting last night further discussed the matter of organizing a mutual fire insurance company among the business men of this city. As stated in last Friday's Guard, this action is the result of the recent advance in the rates in Eugene. A committee, consisting of W. G. Griffin, G. D. Linn, and Alton Hampton, was appointed to arrange for organizing such a company and report to the association on some time next week.

By organizing a local mutual company the merchants can secure insurance very much cheaper than at present and the money on the policies will all be kept at home. The members of the association are quite sanguine of the success of the enterprise.

WILL ADVERTISE CITY

It was decided by the association to contract with the Pacific Monthly the popular magazine published at Portland, for a page of space to advertise the city and county. D. E. Yoran, A. T. Cockerline and Geo. T. Hall, Jr., were appointed as a committee to look after the matter and to ask the Commercial Club to act with the association and help bear the expense.

MAY NOT MOVE FACTORY.

The committee recently appointed to investigate the railroad freight rates on the products of the Ingham vinegar factory reported that Mr. Ingham had secured from the company a very satisfactory rate and that Mr. Ingham says he may not move the factory away, as has been announced.

Sewell Smith and Walter Ross, who have just returned from Klamath Falls, where they have been engaged as millwrights in the erection of a big sawmill, have been ordered by their employers, Tatum & Brown, of Portland, to hold themselves in readiness to go to Marcola soon to work on the three mills that the S. P. Co. is going to erect in that vicinity.

PETITION TO ACQUIRE LUCKY BOY ROAD

The petition for opening the Lucky Boy road as a county road has been prepared and will at once be sent to Blue River for signatures. It is necessary to secure the signatures of at least twelve freeholders. The matter will come up before the county court at the August term.

As will be noted in the petition, the plan is to join the Lucky Boy road with the Gate Creek road, making a belt line. Teams going in by one route can go out the other if they prefer. The description of the road is as follows:

"Commencing at the northeast end of Main street in Watt's addition to Blue River City in section 21, township 16, south of range 4 east, thence running in a northeasterly direction, following what is known as the Lucky Boy road, as near as may be to get a good road, to the Lucky Boy mining property; thence northwesterly on the most practical route to the top of the ridge near the Badger mine; thence northerly and easterly on or near the top of the ridge, on the most practical route, to the Great Northern mining property and there ending. Also commencing at the top of the ridge near the Badger mine, where the above proposed road turns easterly on the most practical route to Durango Flat and to connect with county road No. 435, known as the Gate Creek road. The intention of this petition is to locate a county road on the most practical route giving access to all the principal mining properties in the Blue River mining district, Lane county, Oregon."
