Lowell, June 19.--Barter Young,

the Cascade range.

the Booth-Kelly Company is now pass-
ing Rushisland.

The late wind and heavy showers
are causing the heavy grain to fall.
Early grain is in the boot and is easy
lodged and will no doubt be hard to
save for either hay or grain.

The logging camps along the river
above Lowell have all closed down for
the present and most of the men have
gone on the drives. The Charley
Williams drive is two miles below the
Lowell ferry. The logging donkey is
being moved from the Grant Hyland
place over to Winberry, following
the Winberry trail from Rushisland.
Jasper Hills is superintending the
work.

There has been quite a number of
teams passing through here, bound
for Eastern Oregon, some bound for
Klamath Falls to locate on lands in
the irrigation districts and some to
take homes on government lands open
for settlement.

The Rushisland school, five miles
up the river above Lowell, will close
the 22d with a program of exercises.
Miss Grace Sailor is the teacher.

REGULAR TERM OF CIRCUIT COURT IN SESSION

charged with assault and battery
upon the person of Wm. F. Oshorn,
landlord at the Hoffman House, on
March 4, 1906. The following jury
was chosen: I. E. Earnest, A. L.
Hinkson, John Strome, J. W. Gault,
M. B. Stone, M. J. Harper, Homer
Fisk, D. B. Proctor, Chas. F. Cox,
E. L. Gum, T. J. Duckworth and
N. Ruth.

The jury returned a verdict of
guilty.
