

RAMSEY DEALS BLOW TO GOULD'S TERMINAL COMBINE

St. Louis, July 14.—Joseph Ramsey, Jr., former president of the Washash and former general manager of the Terminal Association, struck the Goulds, who ousted him from his position a few months ago, a terrible blow this morning when he appeared as the federal government's star witness in a suit to dissolve the terminal association as a trust. Ramsey swore that a combine was formed by the Terminal Association, Merchants Bridge and Wiggins' Ferry companies to control rates and regulate business. He said that Wiggins' ferry was purchased to stifle competition and that the Alton bridge was bought and abandoned to close all entrances to the city except by the combine's gates.

Ramsey testified that seven lines were involved besides the Gould lines.

DRYFUS M ODSITLY AWAITS ASSI GNMENT

Paris, July 14.—The Official Journal today published the decree of Dreyfus' reinstatement and promotion, and the inscription of his name on the list of Chevaliers of the Legion of Honor. Dreyfus remains quietly in his apartments awaiting assignment to his regiment, when he will receive his sword and don his uniform.

The scene of tumultuous disorder which marked the enactment yesterday of the law restoring Alfred Dreyfus to the army was followed by a bloody duel last night in which Under Secretary of State Sarant was dangerously wounded by the sword of M. Pugliesi Conti. The duel assumed the aspect of a veritable combat between the government and the opposition, as M Sarant's seconds were Ministers Clemenceau and Thomson, while M. Pugliesi Conti's were M. Milleroye and General Jaquet, who were drawn from the elements which bitterly resisted the government's rehabilitation of Dreyfus.

TRAINMEN ARE KILLED IN FREIGHT WRECK

Ashland, July 14.—Freight train No. 222 was wrecked this noon, being ditched near Clawson. Engineer Stager and brakeman Lockerman were fatally injured and Fireman Wiley and others of the crew severely injured. Stager is dying and Lockerman is dead. It is supposed to have run wild and jumped the track. All traffic is tied up.

WOODCOCK HOME FROM PORTLAND

Attorney A. C. New York, July 14.—Before sailing today for London to attend the Inter-parliamentary peace conference, John Sharp Williams said that he believed President Roosevelt intended to be candidate in 1908. He believed he was just playing politics so that the nomination would be forced upon him.

CANNON IS BEING LOADED.
Washington, July 14.—A letter from Speaker Cannon, who was expected to be visiting at his home at Danville, Illinois, orders 22,000 of

PRICE OF LEMONS ON THE INCREASE

Portland, Or. July 14.—Lemons are breaking all former price records on account of their extreme scarcity. The hot weather has created an enormous demand for lemons all over the country and prices are already over double what they were at the start of the season. Lemons that formerly sold for \$3 a case at wholesale are now being fought for by the dealers at \$7. At retail the fruit is selling some places as high as 60c a dozen and still the demand far exceeds the supply. A short crop in Sicily this season caused the eastern cities to order heavier supplies than usual from California growers.

ARONAUT SAILS OVER WINDY CITY

Chicago, July 14.—Horace Wild, in the airship Eagle, today successfully sailed over the tallest buildings of the city down town and alighted on a roof at Center and Erie streets. He was up over two hours.

This is the first time an aeronaut ever succeeded in sailing over the business district.

ENTIRE FAMILY IS MURDERED

Charlotte, N. C., July 15.—The family of Isaac Lyrlly, a prominent planter of Barber Junction, Bowen county, was practically exterminated at midnight last night. Isaac Lyrlly, a son aged 10, and Alice Lyrlly, a daughter aged 5, were brained with an axe as they slept. Mary and Adelle Lyrlly, aged 14 and 9, respectively, who were sleeping on the second floor of the home, escaped the wholesale slaughter which was visited upon the balance of the family. Suspected of being guilty of the crime, five colored tenants on the Lyrlly farm have been arrested and jailed. They are Mitchell Graham and wife, Jack Dillingham and wife and John Jordan. All of them protest their innocence, but the circumstantial evidence against them is strong.

PRESIDENT HAS NO PLAN FOR MEDIATION

Oyster Bay, July 14.—It was announced here today that no suggestion as to the method of mediation to insure peace in Central America will be made by this country, unless overtures come from either Guatemala or Salvador. The president is ready to co-operate with Mexico on any feasible plan, and in extending the offer of mediation he suggests no program to be followed.

WIRELESS STATION ON PACIFIC COAST

Washington, July 16.—The navy department is making contracts for the establishment of wireless telegraph stations on the Pacific coast. The first will be at Cape Flattery and five others will be placed as soon as possible. Sixty thousand dollars will be spent on these stations.

JUDGE STANDS BY LAND FRAUDERS

Los Angeles, July 15.—For the first time since they were called into the federal courts on an indictment for alleged conspiracy to misappropriate public lands, found against them by a jury in Portland, Oregon, the eight accused business men of Los Angeles scored a point against the government yesterday. Circuit Judge Ross granted their application for writs of habeas corpus and continued the cases until July 25.

MAJOR DREYFUS HAS BEEN ASSIGNED

Paris, July 16.—Major Dreyfus has been appointed to a command in the Twelfth regiment of artillery.

A local paper says that Dreyfus will prosecute Mercier, one of his bitterest antagonists, and open the entire case again in the court of assizes.

Miss Stella Armitage, who has been teacher in the high school for the past year and was elected for the coming term, has been chosen as teacher in the Portland high school. She has resigned her position here. Miss Armitage is a graduate of the University of Oregon with the class of 1903, and her home is near Springfield.

C. S. Freeland, the civil engineer in charge of the work of building the S. P. Co.'s bridge across the Willamette at Springfield, was today appointed administrator of the estate of Walter F. Smock, who was drowned in the river at Springfield July 7. Smock left personal property valued at \$150.

Washington, D. C., July 14.—The government is using its good offices to prevent an actual declaration of war between Salvador and Guatemala. Dispatches today indicate so serious a situation that Acting Secretary Baron called Minister Merry, at Guatemala City, to use his influence with the respective governments to prevent a continuance of the hostilities now in progress. Ambassador Thompson of Mexico was also ordered to request the cooperation of the Mexican government. Merry cables that fighting is now in progress. It is believed here that Salvador's forces have been divided and the Guatemalas are in pursuit of the two fleeing columns.
