

MINING STOCK EXCHANGE AT PORTLAND

Herbert Leigh, the assayer and mine owner, returned last night from Portland where he went on business connected with mining properties in which he is interested. He told the Guard today of a new mining stock exchange which is to be opened in Portland within the next few days. The exchange is located on the first floor of the Commonwealth building at Sixth and Ankeny streets and has elegant quarters. The membership is composed of a large number of leading bankers and business men of Portland and will be operated upon a strictly legitimate basis as regards the listing of stocks. A committee will make a rigid examination of the condition and status of all properties before allowing them to be listed. The exchange will be brought up to the standard set by the mining exchanges of San Francisco, Los Angeles and Colorado Springs and will be conducted along similar lines. It will be a great benefit to the mine owners of Oregon.

A MINERS' ORDER.
Mr. Leigh while in the city became a member of the Stopers of the World, an order for mining men and similar to the Hoo Hoo, the lumbermen's order. Stope No. 1, or the grand lodge, will be located at Portland and it is intended to organize subordinate stopes all over the world. The order already has a large membership, including many leading mining men, business men and bankers of Portland. The membership is restricted to persons interested in mining and members of mining supply firms who have dealings with them. A subordinate stoper will probably be organized in Eugene within a short time. The order has a sick benefit and accident insurance feature, the policies being underwritten by four of the principal banks of Portland.

WHEAT DROPS A CENT A BUSHEL.

The wheat market is 1c a bushel lower today for both old and new crop.

The decline is not due to any improvement in crop prospects here, but to constant breaks in the markets both in the east and in Europe. But a small amount of trading is reported at the new flour.

For the new-crop flour the prices have considerably stiffened of late.

The price of wheat, even with today's decline of 1c, is higher than when first contracts on the new crop were made by at least 2c per bushel. Some small amount of foreign business was reported today on a basis of \$3.15 for old-crop flour, but for the new crop the price is about 5c higher than that amount. New-crop flour opened this season at \$3 a barrel for exports.

REPORTED DURST SELL HOPS LOW.

Special information believed to be reliable, comes to The Journal that M. H. Durst, the big California operator who secured consignments of hops in this city, has sold 1,000 bales in London market at 11c. The report cannot be confirmed. Reports from New York received this morning state that the crop there is looking better than at any time in recent years. Continental crop advices are considerably better than a week ago. No new transactions in contracts are reported.

LIGHT PEEL OF CHITTIM BARK.

According to handlers, the peel of chittim bark this season is the lightest in recent years. The low price offered and the heavy supplies carried over from the previous two years by speculators is the cause. Demand is quite fair from the east, but prices are inactive.

BLUE RIVER ROAD PETITION GRANTED

One of the first matters to come up for consideration by the county commissioners' court which met in regular monthly session this morning was the petition to open the Lucky Boy road leading to the Blue River mines to public travel. The petition being drawn in the proper form and everything being regular, it was granted and the county road viewers Geo. Fisher and P. J. McPherson, and County Surveyor C. M. Collier were ordered to make a survey of the road and assess the damages. The viewers are at present at work somewhere in the western end of the county and just as soon as they return will be sent to Blue River.

It will probably take two weeks to complete the surveys and draw the necessary maps. After the work is finished a report will be made to the court and an official order will be made at the September term declaring the road a public highway.

The petition was signed by nineteen freeholders and 25 prospectors and owners of mines not yet patented and others whom the proposed road will benefit.

DESCRIPTION OF ROAD.

The description of the road as appearing in the petition, is as follows: Commencing at the northeast end of Main street in Watt's addition to Blue River City in section 21, township 16, south of range 4 east; thence running in a northeasterly direction following what is known as the Lucky Boy road as near as may be to get a good road to the Lucky Boy mining property; thence northeasterly on the most practical route to the top of the ridge near the Badger mine; thence northerly and easterly on or near the top of the ridge to the Great Northern Mining property and there ending. Also commencing at the top of the ridge near the Badger mine, where the proposed road turns easterly; thence westerly and southerly on the most practical route to Durango Flat and to connect with county road No. 435, known as the Gate Creek road.
