

VALPARAISO AT WORK OF REHABILITATION

Buenos Ayres, Aug. 20.—The destruction of Valparaiso is confirmed by advices received here and eleven thousand persons are dead. The Hotel Ingles collapsed, burying all its occupants. This information comes from refugees.

REPORT FROM VALPARAISO.

Valparaiso, Aug. 20.—The fires are dying out because there is nothing more to burn and dynamite was freely used. The city was built much of adobe, and the business district of steel, which made the conflagration less than if built of wood. There are various estimates of the casualties and property loss, none authoritative. The damage is probably above a quarter of a billion.

Every effort is now expended in caring for the refugees and burning the dead. Soldiers patrol the city and the military is in full control, the civil authorities having lost all control in the excitement.

A steamer reports the disappearance of the island of Juan Fernandez, on which Robinson Crusoe sojourned, probably due to seismic disturbances. The fate of the islanders is unknown. Minor shocks continue to the present time, and not a single building in this city escaped damage to some extent. Workmen flee from their tasks of clearing the debris at every slight shock.

It is believed that no damage was done to the north city. The bank of Tarapaca Argentina will probably reopen today and is seeking the managers of other banks to effect an agreement to the policy to pursue.

PRESIDENT CONDOLES.

Washington, Aug. 20.—President Roosevelt today forwarded a message of condolence to the president of Chile.

REFUGEES BRING REPORTS.

Santiago, Chile, Aug. 20.—Five hundred persons are dead at Valparaiso as a result of the earthquake shocks according to the latest advices based on the reports of refugees who reached this city this morning.

The monetary loss at Valparaiso runs into the millions. Six or eight other cities have been destroyed. The railroad, street railway, telegraph and telephone systems are thoroughly demoralized.

The known dead in this city number 20. Madame Mont, wife of Admiral Mont, who was reported killed, is alive but seriously injured.

It is expected that the street railway and lighting systems in this city will be restored today.

OTHER TOWNS SUFFERED.

Buenos Ayres, Aug. 20.—Advices received here are as follows: Los Andes, 18 miles east of San Felipe, and having a population of 5000, was almost totally destroyed. The finest buildings of the town—government house, hotels and public offices—were completely wrecked.

Other towns on the Chilean side of the Andes wholly or partially destroyed are Quillota, with a population of 5000, Llay, with a population of 2500; Illapel, with a population of 5000; Valdivia, with a population of 5000, and San Felipe, having 12,000 inhabitants. Quillota is a mass of ruins and there was great loss of life there.

From Santiago to the Andes every bridge and tunnel on the railway was utterly wrecked and the railway lines torn up.

The shock is supposed to have been caused by the eruption of a volcano near Jenu Los Andes.

It is impossible to estimate the dimensions of the disaster at the present moment, owing to the circuitous route over which the news is received. There is no doubt, however, that the catastrophe was of terrible proportions.

The disaster has caused gloom over the republic of Argentina, and all festivities have been suspended.

Valparaiso, Aug. 21.—The government and people of Chile received President Roosevelt's message of condolence thankfully. The government has ordered the immediate construction of houses of wood and zinc to house the homeless in. Military engineers are repairing the railroad and telegraph lines.

Large parties of convicts who escaped have been committing all sorts of crimes and over fifty have been captured and publicly shot.

The people are returning from the hills. The banks are open two hours daily and the work of restoration is proceeding systematically.

LATEST NEWS OF DISASTER.

Santiago, Aug. 21.—Only now can

the extent of the earthquake damage be appreciated. The majority of the modern houses in this city are unfit for habitation and a special corps has been organized to raze all tottering structures. It is unsafe to walk most of the streets on account of falling debris.

Advices from Valparaiso indicate that the dead number two thousand. The night of August 16 was rendered baleful by the flashing lightning, driving rain, wires and cables snapping as the result of the constant earthquakes, which followed each other in rapid succession. The fire bells pealed, announcing the starting of fires in various parts of the city simultaneously.

The first shock lasted four minutes and fifty seconds, longer than any in the memory of any Santiago citizen. Experts say that the only thing that saved the city from total destruction was the fact that the motion was circular. The principal shock extended from Valparaiso to Santiago and Meripilla, with its centre at Limache. The latter and the towns of Quillota, with ten thousand population, and Llaillai were destroyed.

The quake was foretold, at the naval observatory predicted it two days previous, and the Valparaiso papers printed the prediction the day before it occurred.

MORE SHOCKS OCCUR.

Lima, Aug. 21.—There was a heavy quake at Valparaiso last night and a slight shock here this morning. Huachos as shaken yesterday.

MONEY FROM 'FRISCO.

San Francisco, Aug. 21.—Members of the committee of 40 appointed by Mayor Schmitz to devise ways and means for the relief of San Francisco during the fire of last April, met today to arrange for San Francisco's contribution to the stricken people of Chile. Within fifteen minutes the individual members of the committee had subscribed \$2500.

It was announced that the Canadian Bank of Commerce had already telegraphed to the president of Chile the sum of \$10,000, advanced at the request of the members of the committee.

TWO BARN AT TRENT BURNED

Two barns belonging to Henry Godard at Trent were burned yesterday evening about five o'clock, together with a lot of hay and grain.

Mr. Godard's three-year-old son was playing about one of the barns and struck a match, letting it fall on some loose hay. No one else was there at the time and within a moment the whole barn was a mass of flames. The fire spread to the other barn and to a near by field. The wind carried it rapidly over a considerable stretch of territory and it took the combined efforts of quite a number of men to extinguish it. About 25 tons of hay and 450 bushels of oats in the barns and a large amount of hay in a field were destroyed. The loss is probably \$1000.

MERCHANTS ASK FOR A BETTER TRAIN SERVICE

At last night's regular meeting of the Merchants Protective Association the matter of better transportation facilities for Eugene was thoroughly discussed with the result that a resolution was unanimously adopted asking the Southern Pacific Company to establish a regular and frequent train service, after the Springfield bridge is completed, between this city and Wendling and Natron. The proposition is fully explained in the following, which was presented by M. S. Barker, and a copy of which will at once be sent to the railroad officials at Portland:

"Owing to the fact that the immense storehouses of Eugene being crowded with the latest creations in modern merchandise and modern goods of every known description and the fact that Eugene is now recognized as the greatest marketing and merchandising point in Central Western Oregon, and as people go to very much trouble to reach this market, as for instance by team 30 to 50 miles, paralleling the railroad on account of the railroad having no train service on this particular line, this is doing the merchants of Eugene, as well as the people who trade at Eugene, an injustice.

"The merchants of Eugene are by every honorable means trying to build up trade and to make this city a good live commercial city, and they believe with the co-operation of the Southern Pacific Co. much good can be done to both parties interested. The Southern Pacific Co. will remember that when we petitioned for an extension of the Albany local to Eugene it was done with some misgivings, but it has turned out well for the company and for Eugene. Now if you will give us what we are about to ask for we think it will pay you well, give good accommodations to along suffering public and make the merchants of Eugene happy as well as put dollars in their pockets. And dollars in their pockets means more dollars to your company, as all merchants ship more goods with their new dollars. Now what we want and would like to have very much is, just as soon as the Springfield bridge is completed, a passenger train with the following schedule:

"Leave Eugene for Wendling at 7 a. m. each morning; leave Wendling for Eugene at 8:20 a. m.; leave Eugene for Natron at 9:30 a. m.; leave Natron for Eugene at 10 a. m.; leave Eugene for Wendling at 10:30 a. m.; leave Wendling for Eugene at 12:00 a. m.; leave Eugene for Natron at 1:30 p. m.; leave Natron for Eugene at 2 p. m.; leave Eugene for Wendling at 2:30 p. m.; leave Wendling for Eugene at 3:30 p. m., arriving in Eugene at 4:30 p. m. and remain over night till 7 o'clock in the morning. This would make a run for this train of about 164 miles and it would be well parolized. The schedule outlined above is merely a suggestion and you could best arrange it to suit yourselves, but what we want is a better train service.

"At the present time there are two stage lines and one automobile line operating between Eugene and Springfield to accommodate the passenger traffic between the two points and they are very busy.

"We would also like to have a passenger train on the East Side road, leaving Woodburn at 6 or 7 o'clock in the morning and coming through Coburg and Springfield, reach Eugene at 9 or 10 o'clock in the morning. On its down trip it could leave at 4 or 5 o'clock in the afternoon over the same route. This train would serve a vast number of people who now have poor train service and would put them in touch with Eugene, one of the best supply points in the state.

"The Eugene merchants will do all they can to have the above mentioned train service patronized by way of offering attractive prices on good merchandise, and we think that there is no doubt that these trains will prove profitable to the company."

NATRON-ONTARIO LINE WILL BE BUILT SOON

Burns, Or., Aug. 17.—Attorney W. A. Robbin, of W. W. Cotton's office at Portland, representing the Harriman lines, arrived in Burns today and at once proceeded to file maps of definite location for a Harriman railroad to be built through Central Oregon. He refused to be interviewed, but it was learned, by referring to the maps, that surveys are now complete from Ontario to a point on Crane creek, near the east end of Malheur lake, but from that place the route of the proposed line has not yet been decided upon. It is stated that the line will be built just as soon as labor can be secured. The arrival of the Harriman representative has created great excitement among the people of this isolated section of Oregon.

Drain, Or., Aug. 20.—Grading began on the new Drain-Cos Bay railroad today. The C. E. Loss Company contractors for the first twenty miles of the road, have enough men and tools on the ground to start the work, and more will arrive this week. Five carloads of scrapers, plows and other tools, one carload of powder and two carloads of provisions were unloaded here Saturday and 80 mules were unloaded yesterday. A corral large enough to hold these mules and 125 more, which will arrive Tuesday, has been built in South Drain. Several tons of hay and oats have been bought here and at other points along the river, and plenty more can be had when it is needed.

New York, Aug. 17.—The Southern Pacific this morning declared a dividend of two and a half per cent on its common stock. This is the first dividend ever paid on common and it is stated it will be semiannual hereafter.

Union Pacific dividends are payable to stockholders of record on September 15, and Southern Pacific is payable October first to stockholders of dividend warrants.

Dividends had been expected, as both companies have been showing immense earnings during the past year.

Later the Union Pacific announced a semi-annual dividend of five per cent on common stock and two per cent on preferred. This puts Union Pacific on a ten per cent dividend basis.

Southern Pacific jumped up six and seven-eighths points upon the announcement of the dividend.

New York, Aug. 18.—There is adverse comment on E. H. Harriman's course for withholding the announcements of dividends. An enforced statement of the decision was made at 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon, and was held for the New York stock exchange, rather than London, which would have had the first action on Friday morning.

RAILROAD WORK AT KLAMATH FALLS

Klamath Falls, Or., Aug. 17.—Work on the California Northeastern Railroad grade at this end of the road commenced today. The Adams dredge this morning was taken to the scene of operations, about a mile south of town, where a channel 30 feet wide is being dredged east to the line of survey, about a quarter of a mile distant. When the dredge reaches the survey the grade will be built across the marsh to the vicinity of the depot grounds near Hot Springs Addition. The dredger is in charge of Foreman Meyers, who will push the work with all vigor.

LOSS OVER MILLION, MAY BE MORE

Springfield, Ill., Aug. 18.—Examiner Jones reports that the Milwaukee Avenue Bank shows at least \$1,000,000 lost unquestionably on forged paper and nearly \$500,000 of doubtful assets.

MAIL BOXES MUST BE MADE OF IRON

Washington, Aug. 16.—Postmaster-General Cortelyou's order, which goes into effect on August 1, permitting patrons of rural delivery to make their own boxes or to have them made to order, provided such boxes are so constructed as to fall within the requirements of the department, seems to have been misunderstood. Misleading comments have appeared stating that farmers can now whistle down their wooden boxes to make a rural mail post box in any way they choose.

The order of the Postmaster-General provides exactly the contrary. All boxes must be made of galvanized sheet iron or sheet steel of certain specified dimensions. Wooden boxes are regarded as neither secure nor weather proof within the requirements of the department, and all such boxes now in use will be gradually eliminated from the service.

Minneapolis, Aug. 16.—The national G. A. R. encampment elects a commander and selects the place for the next encampment today. Brown, of Ohio, leads for Tanner's chair, Ireland is likely to be the next chaplain chief.

After the preliminary business today Commander Tanner made his annual address. He said in part:

"Despite the fact that nine thousand deaths occurred the past year, leading me to expect a decrease in the G. A. R. last year, the increased membership was thirty-five hundred. During the last year, while the public conscience has been outraged by the exposure of corruption in high place, the minutest investigation reveals the fact that not one veteran of the civil war is among the fallen and guilty. The G. A. R. responded royally to the appeal for funds for the relief of San Francisco. 'I hope Memorial Day will be kept sacred and desire that all work for the suppression of ball games, races and other sports on that day.'"
