

CITY COUNCIL TRANSACTS BUSINESS

(From Thursday's Guard.)
An adjourned session of the city council was held last night with all members present except Mayor Wilkins, who is out of the city.

Street committee reported grading and graveling of Atherton avenue, East Sixth and West Twelfth streets had been completed and work accepted.

Petition of Quimby et al to vacate fractional alley running north from West Fifth street between Willamette and Olive, denied.

Petition asking city to pay for sprinkling business streets denied. Mumme Bros. were paid \$2000 on East Eleventh street sewer contract. The sewer is nearly completed.

Petition for sewer on north side of West Fourth street from Lincoln to Lawrence referred.

Deed of A. K. Patterson for two acres of land across river for dumping ground for \$405 accepted.

Alton Hampton was allowed \$100 as payment of damages to his buggy which was ruined in collision with a pile of sewer dirt.

ORDINANCES.

Ordinance passed levying assessment for construction of sewer in alley between Willamette and Olive streets, extending south 500 feet from West Twelfth street; for construction of sewer in alley between West Eighth street from Jefferson street west two blocks; for the improvement of alley between East Seventh and East Eighth street, from Park street east to Pearl; for improvement of East Seventh street from High street to the mill race; for improvement of West Fifteenth street from Willamette street west one block and for alley in block one, Whitney's addition.

Ordinance passed establishing grades in West Sixth street, between Willamette and Olive streets.

A plumbing ordinance was introduced and laid over on second reading.

Ordinance passed licensing firms selling or giving away trading stamps. License is \$50 a quarter and fine of from \$50 to \$200.

Ordinance passed requiring owners or occupants of property to remove all signs and signs for intoxicating liquors. It is made the duty of the marshal to order the removal of such signs, and to remove signs if such notice is disregarded. Fine for failure to remove sign may not exceed \$25.

CEMENT SIDEWALKS.

Ordinance introduced requiring stone, artificial stone, asphalt or cement sidewalks in the district bounded by a line extending along East Fifth from Willamette to High street, thence south to East Thirteenth street, thence west to west side of Willamette street, thence north to the south side of West Eleventh street, thence west to the west side of Lawrence street, thence north to the north line of West Fifth street, thence east to Willamette; also along both sides of East Eleventh street from High street to the S. P. railway, opposite the university.

The ordinance was laid over to the next meeting.

WOMEN HIRED TO GET EVIDENCE IN EUGENE

A good story of how two women from Portland tricked a number of men in this city into making them believe that they (the women) were "good fellows" and secured evidence that may lead to their indictment for violating the prohibition law, is beginning to leak out.

A little over a week ago two buxom women arrived in Eugene on the southbound train and enquired of persons at the depot as to the location of a well-known sporting house. They secured rooms and then began their work. They made the acquaintance of quite a number of men about town, so the story goes, and on several occasions "went the rounds" with them, drinking beer and other "soft drinks," and having a general good time. It now turns out that the women were in the employ of the Anti-Saloon League, or the Law Enforcement League or whatever it is, at Portland, and that they will testify before the grand jury where they got the liquor and who sold it to them. It is needless to say that the women have left the city.

SURVEYORS' WORK NEARLY COMPLETED

Within 30 days surveys of the Oregon Coast Eastern railway from Portland to Coos Bay will be completed. The company now has five crews in the field, and as soon as the line is located from the Portland city limits to Coos Bay the entire force will be thrown into the work between Coos Bay and Eureka.

No trouble has been encountered by the engineers in securing an admirable route free from sharp grades or curves. The maximum grade of the entire line is less than one and one-half per cent. The road will approach Portland by way of Cornelius Pass. W. J. Wilsey, who is directing the preliminary work from offices in this city, returned a few days ago from St. Louis, where he went to confer with Baker & Crabtree, who represent the eastern investors. The nature of matters considered at the conference is not for public discussion, but Mr. Wilsey said his latest instructions are to push the preliminary work with all possible speed and prepare for beginning construction at the earliest date.

The Oregon Coast and Eastern Company's preparatory work has occasioned a great deal of speculation by the general public, and much anxiety on the part of existing railroad companies. The secret of identity of the real backers of the enterprise has been well kept, and it is said not a person outside of the Portland representative of the syndicate knows whether the Santa Fe, and Goulds, the Northwestern or none of them is back of the road proposed. It is only known that there is a steady flow of money from the East into the local coffers, and that \$5000 to \$10,000 per month is being spent to carry on engineering and right-of-way work.

The company maintains a large force in eight or ten offices in the Stearns building, five crews of surveyors in the field, and a large number of right-of-way men, and is carrying on work throughout the coast counties and the country lying between Tillamook and Portland.—Journal.

TOM LAWSON ATTACKS SYSTEM IN USUAL STYLE

Boston, Aug. 23.—Thos. W. Lawson, in an open letter, opens his batteries on the Rockefeller, Rogers and Harriman clique for their Pacific railway stock coupe. He says:

"Unmindful of warnings the fool section of the people swarmed to answer the call of the system. Their fifteen thousand miles of railroad were built by the people, maintained at the people's expense. With the growth of the country the roads became great money makers. Instead of turning the profits back to the people in the shape of reduced rates the system pumped water into their stocks until they had money for their requirements for interest and dividends to all."

ELECTRIC RAILROAD TO ROSEBURG

Roseburg Spokesman: The Spokesman is informed that the electric railroad that is building up this way from Portland and that is to reach Salem, Albany, Eugene and Cottage Grove, now has its eye on Roseburg, and that parties representing that company have been to this place looking over the situation, and that they are desirous of making heavy investments here for the purpose of forwarding their project. It is also reported that their ultimate terminus is Coos Bay and that they propose to go from this place over the most direct route to that place.

SCLDIER BOYS HOME FROM ENCAMPMENT

Major Geo. O. Yoran and staff and Companies A and C, First Separate Battalion, O. N. J., arrived home from American Lake on the Cottage Grove local last night, after having spent ten days in camp with a large body of regular troops and the National Guard of four states.

The boys all report having a good time, the camp duties being less arduous than they were two years ago, and the "hikes" being less frequent. Barring a slight epidemic, due to bad water obtained at Chehalis on the way to camp, the Eugene boys escaped sickness or accidents of any kind, and they all look better than they did before they left, having a sun-burned complexion.

There is no complaint to make in regard to the rations, the quartermasters having learned by past experience the way to secure the proper provisions in sufficient quantities to satisfy the men.

The Eugene boys won distinction in the maneuvers and the First Separate Battalion handled itself in a highly commendable manner.

The state rifle team to compete in the national shoot at Seagirt, N. J., which includes Private Raymond Perdue, of Co. A, left for the East immediately after the encampment.

Circus Aftermath

The press agent of the circus, who made his headquarters at the Guard office, estimated the crowd in the big tent at 15,000. In Portland, where the tent was crowded to its utmost capacity, there were 22,000 present. Judging from the way the seats were filled here the press agent's guess was a little short of the actual number present.

Several crosswalks were broken by the heavy circus wagons.

A large crowd watched the loading of the circus on the cars last evening. There were four trains, the last one leaving about eight o'clock.

The restaurant and hotel keepers all feel good over the receipts of the day.

PURCHASES 400,000,000 FEET OF MCKENZIE TIMBER

Guard readers have doubtless noticed the record of many recent transfers of timber lands in the upper McKenzie river country to Charles H. Chick, Constantine Morton and Everett P. Lewis. These gentlemen reside at Grand Rapids, Mich., Mr. Chick having been in Eugene for several weeks past attending to the transfer of the land.

Mr. Chick in an interview by a Guard reporter today, stated that he and his associates had already purchased 400,000,000 feet of standing timber up the McKenzie and expect to secure 6,000,000,000 feet in the state. For business reasons Mr. Chick did not care to state the number of acres already purchased, but an estimate can be made when it is known that the timber will cut all the way from 3,000,000 to 10,000,000 feet to the quarter section. The price being paid is said to be the highest ever given for timber lands in Lane county.

The purchase of these lands is being made principally for investment purposes, although Mr. Chick expects some time in the future to erect saw-mills in the vicinity of the land or perhaps at Eugene, and bring the logs down by rail.

Mr. Chick has spent the greater portion of his life in the timber business and has amassed a comfortable fortune. He has personally examined more timber than any other man in the United States. He has examined several million acres in Mexico, in Canada, in every state in the Union where timber grows, and in Cuba, having been in the latter country immediately prior to his coming to Oregon. He will remain in Eugene for some time to come, continuing to buy lands until he has secured enough to suit himself and associates. He promises the Guard additional particulars about his purchases within a few days.
