YOUNG BOY MET TERRIBLE DEATH IN FIELD

(From Wednesday's Guard.)
Yesterday evening between five and six o'clock Vinton Baker, aged twelve years, son of Drew S. Baker, was killed on the Robert Pattison farm, three miles northwest of Eugene, on the Irving road, by being run over by a disc harrow.

The boy, who had made his home with Mr. Pattison for some time past, was engaged in harrowing a field quite a distance from the house during the day. About six o'clock those at the house noticed his team alone in a different part of the farm. Supposing that the team had run away from the boy and seeing him nowhere in the vicinity John Pattison set out to look for him. He soon found his lifeless body lying near the harrow, the horses having broken loose. The body was terribly cut and bruised and covered with blood, indicating that it had been dragged and run over by the harrow. A brachial artery in the right shoulder had been severed and the boy evidently bled to death from the wound.

Coroner Gordon was notified soon after the body was found, and he made an investigation of the death, coming to the conclusion that it was purely accidental, hence no inquest was necessary.

The boy's father, who resides in the vicinity of Junction City, was telephoned for and he arrived upon the local last night. The funeral will be held tomorrow forenoon at the Pattison residence, with interment in the Luper cemetery.

greater ratio of actual to traceable results.

One stream has flooded the Canadian Northwest with American brains and brawn; another, cleaving to Uncle Sam, has sought its destiny in the great Southwest and California, while yet another and smaller has made its way to the Pacific Northwest, where it has been absorbed. The greatest of these has responded to the greatest call.

"In Spokane, where we keep the closest possible check, we have had approximately 5000 direct inquiries within the past six months. We have answered them and have followed them up. We have received hundreds of letters from intending settlers, telling when they would arrive and revealing facts concerning their circumstances, and I have personally met many of these who have redeemed their words. Others, and they are many, are thoroughly determined to come and are only awaiting until they can dispose of property and business interests to do so. The great majority of these are farmers—the people we need if we are to build prosperous towns and cities.

"These results are gratifying, and they convince us that we are doing good—but the unidentified results are those that are our greatest achievement. Unfortunately we will not receive the credit due us for these. Our people are enthusiastic—cocksure that our country must grow, regardless of advertising campaigns, and they are right. ARRESTED FOR VIOLATING THE FISH LAW

Milton A. Nicolle was tried before Justice of the Peace D. E. Severy at Florence last Tuesday on the charge of violating the state fish law by fishing for salmon in the Siuslaw river above Mapleton on August 27. The following jury was called: E. H. Anderson, Ivy Morris, Otto Shradet, Robert Lynch, F. E. Raymond and John W. Tanner.

After a large number of witnesses had been examined the jury retired and soon returned a verdict of not guilty. Joe Morris, Jr., appeared as attorney for the state and J. E. Barnes for the defendant.

Another complaint was immediately filed by T. A. Stear as water bailiff, charging Nicolle with fishing without a license. He was arrested and pleaded not guilty and the trial was set for a later date.
