

JUDGE WM. H. TAFT, CUBA'S NEW RULER



Washington, Sept. 29.—Secretary Taft this morning cabled General Bell:

"Make immediate preparations to send an army of occupation to Cuba."

PROCLAMATION ISSUED BY "GOVERNOR" TAFT.

Havana, Sept. 29.—Secretary Taft issued a proclamation this morning declaring himself provisional governor of the island of Cuba, which was published in an official circular and thousands of copies circulated. The terms of occupation causing general satisfaction being unexpectedly moderate in tone. Taft states that the provisional government is undertaken only on account of the necessities of the situation and promises that it will be maintained purely for the restoration of peace, order and public confidence until a permanent government is established.

The proclamation says that in so far as it is consistent with the scope of provisional government, under authority of the United States, this will be a Cuban government conforming to the Cuban constitution. It also announces that elections for permanent officials will eventually be held and the Cuban flag will be hoisted as usual over the government buildings. All departments will be administered as under the Cuban re-

public but all heads of the departments are ordered to report to Secretary Taft.

Taft signed the proclamation as "Secretary of War of the United States and Provisional Governor of Cuba."

FIRST EXPEDITION.

Washington, Sept. 29.—The first expedition has been mobilized at Newport News, comprising fifty six hundred men.

TEXAS RUSHED TO CUBA.

Norfolk, Va., Sept. 29.—The battleship Texas carrying several hundred fighting men has received rush orders to sail at 3 o'clock this afternoon for Cuba. The Columbia, bearing Secretary Root is expected at Hampton Roads tonight, and the Root party will board the yacht Sylph and proceed to Washington. The Columbia will then coal and proceed to Fortress Monroe and take on a consignment of troops for Cuba.

PRESIDENT ADVISED.

Barnstable, Mass., Sept. 29.—The Mayflower with the president aboard joined the fleet this morning and target practice was soon begun. The fleet is in wireless communication with the shore and the president is full informed of events transpiring in Cuba.

KILLED BY EXPLOSION OF DYNAMITE

Cottage Grove, Sept. 28.—Charles C. Rutan, aged about 35 years, was killed by the accidental explosion of dynamite in the Bohemia mining district yesterday afternoon. He was doing assessment work on George Long's mine on Elephant mountain and was kneeling, holding a stick of dynamite in his left hand, trying to insert a cap and fuse. The explosion came suddenly and without warning and shattered Rutan's left arm and leg and injured him internally. He was carried to the Musick mine, where medical aid was administered, but he died about two hours afterward. He retained consciousness up to a short time before his death.

Several men working with Rutan, including Wm. Reed, had a narrow escape, as they were within a few feet of him, but they were practically uninjured.

The body was brought to Cottage Grove on today's train and shipped to Oshkosh, Or., for burial, the deceased's brother-in-law, J. A. Underwood, of that place, having arrived here last night to attend to the matter.

Rutan was a single man and leaves a sister, Mrs. Underwood, and a mother.

MRS. SPAULDING WANTS DIVORCE

Mrs. Florence Edyth Spaulding has instituted suit in the circuit court against her husband, Alvy L. Spaulding, for a divorce and for the custody of their minor child, Reginald Gardner Spaulding, aged 17 months. They were married in Michigan March 19, 1904. Cruel and inhuman treatment is alleged. Spaulding's last known address was Appleton, Wisconsin. Woodcock & Potter are Mrs. Spaulding's attorneys.

FARMER GOSSER ASKS DAMAGES FOR ASSAULT

(From Tuesday's Guard.)

Fred P. Gosser, a farmer residing four miles northwest of Elmita, has begun suit in the circuit court against George Sweet, Daniel Sweet and Joseph Sweet, for \$6250 damages said to have been incurred as a result of an assault upon the plaintiff by the defendants, the papers in the case being filed by Attorney Lee M. Travis this afternoon. In his complaint the plaintiff alleges as follows:

"That on or about the evening and night of March 8, 1906, in Lane county, Oregon, the said defendants acting together, did break into the residence of plaintiff, and drag him from his couch and drag him out upon the porch, and did then and there purposely, maliciously and feloniously assault and beat plaintiff upon and about his head and body with two large clubs, breaking his leg and mashing the bones of his leg, and thereby inflicted great bodily harm upon the plaintiff.

"That the plaintiff was knocked to the ground several times, and rendered unconscious; that the plaintiff's leg was badly broken and the bones thereof mashed, and large wounds were made upon plaintiff's body.

"That at the time defendants were beating plaintiff as aforesaid they declared to him that they were going to kill him, and put him in great mental agony until he became unconscious."

FOOTBALL CAPTAIN KILLED IN PRACTICE

Princeton, Sept. 27.—In a practice game of football at Lawrenceville yesterday John P. Kennedy, the captain, was kicked in the head. He died an hour later.

BIG MONEY MADE BY SIUSLAW FISHERMEN

(From Thursday's Guard.)
W. L. Fisk, engineer at the Siuslaw Lumber Company's big sawmill at Acme, recently purchased by Wendling and other California lumber magnates, is in the city, having come out for the purpose of getting some of the sawmill machinery repaired at Gross Bros. foundry.

The boiler fronts for the mill which Gross Bros. recently cast were shipped last Saturday, going by rail to Yaquina Bay and from there taken to Acme by steamer. They are said to be finer than anything in that line on the river and they reflect great credit upon the plant which cast them.

Mr. Fisk, in conversation with a Guard reporter last evening, stated that the present run of salmon in the Siuslaw is immense and all the fishermen are making big money. The fish are now averaging from 23 to 28 pounds each, and each boat, handled by two men, brings in on an average of a ton of fish every morning. At 2 1/2 cents a pound, the price paid by the cannery men, the average night's earnings for one boat is over \$50.

The Hurd and Kyle canneries are both in operation, a boat load of Japanese having arrived Tuesday from Coos Bay to work in the latter.

The Hurd sawmill at Florence is now the only one in operation on the river. The Siuslaw Lumber Company's plant is undergoing repairs and will start up again soon. Sauter's force of men is busily engaged in logging at present.

EMIL ETTER DISCHARGED FROM CUSTODY

Judge Bryson, of the justice court, this afternoon at one o'clock dismissed the case of the State vs. Emil Etter, charged with the illegal sale of liquor, upon motion of Deputy District Attorney Williams. The reason for this action is that Harry R. Rinard, the state's only prosecuting witness, who promised to be on hand at the examination, cannot be found. Constable Plank made a 40-mile trip down below Junction last night looking for him but was unable to find him. Rinard is the man who was arrested the other night for being drunk and when searched a pistol was found in his pocket. He claimed Etter sold him the liquor.

REUNION OF THE HOWES IN EUGENE

Brownsville Times: A. P. Howe went to Eugene Monday evening, returning Wednesday. He was accompanied home by his uncle, James Howe of Macon, Missouri, and his aunt, Mrs. America Cochran, of Salem. This is the first meeting of the Howes in more than forty years, the last meeting being in '63, when John M., of Eugene, and A. P. started across the plains with their people for far away Oregon. Mr. Howe is enjoying his visit very much, and while he insists that Missouri is the best place on earth, yet he says Oregon is much better than he expected.

JUNCTION WOMAN INJURED IN RUNAWAY

Junction City, Or., Sept. 28.—Mrs. J. F. Curtis and daughter and Mrs. A. F. Morse, of this place, were out driving their family horse yesterday when the animal ran away, tearing the buggy to pieces and throwing the ladies into a fence corner, breaking Mrs. Morse's arm in three places and otherwise bruising her. Mrs. Curtis and her daughter escaped with a few bruises.

MRS. NICOLLE DIED AT MAPLETON

A telephone message from Mapleton this morning brought the information that Mrs. Nicolle, a well known resident of that place, had just died, but no particulars were received. George Nicolle, her son, and wife, and Mrs. Ed. Bean, her daughter, left shortly afterward to attend the funeral. Besides these the deceased leaves a husband and three other sons, Phil, Jesse and Milton, and a daughter in Portland.

WATERS OF TRIANGLE LAKE FOR POWER

W. S. and Leland Spencer, Seattle capitalists who own considerable real estate in Lane county, including half a block of business property at Junction City, are planning a big electric power enterprise for this county, and looking to that end L. M. Travis, their local attorney, this morning filed with the county clerk a notice of appropriation of 50,000 miners' inches under a six-inch pressure, of the waters of Triangle Lake, 35 miles west of Eugene, on what is known as the Lake Creek road. According to the instrument filed, the point of diversion for the power canal is at the mouth of the lake at the southerly line of section 20 in township 16, south of range 7 west. It will extend to the power house site two miles below. The canal will be 50 feet wide and six feet deep.

RACE TO THE LAKE.
The Messrs. Spencer were in Eugene last evening, leaving on the night train for California. They had been contemplating filing on the Triangle Lake power site for some time past, and learning that other parties were about to make filings on the same site hurried from Seattle, arriving at Junction night before last. At Junction it was learned that the other parties were ready to start for the lake early the next morning and the Spencer Brothers, determined not to be beaten at this stage of the game, engaged a team and started out before daylight. They raced over the prairie and up and down the mountain, and had just posted their notices of location when the other men arrived. The Spencer brothers reached Eugene last evening and Attorney Travis was instructed to be at the clerk's office the minute it was opened for business this morning in order to forestall any efforts of their rivals to make the filings. Mr. Travis found no one else in sight and it is supposed the other parties concluded they were beaten and gave the matter up. It is not learned who they are.

HAVE BIG PLANS.
The Spencer brothers have given out little information concerning their plans, but it is known that they contemplate erecting a big electric plant at the site filed upon for the purpose of furnishing power and light for Junction, Eugene and other valley towns. An electric railway from the valley to the Siuslaw country is also included in their plans for the future.

The site filed upon has for years been considered one of the best in the whole state for power purposes. In the two miles intervening between the lake and the site of the proposed power station there is a big fall and any volume of water desired can be obtained from the lake, which is a comparatively big body of water. The Messrs. Spencer declare that new power can be secured at their new site than is generated at Seattle's famous plant, and that they have a fortune in hand. They say they have interested several other capitalists in the enterprise and it will not be long before actual work begins.

WORK BEGINS ON S. P. MILL NO. 3

The spur from the Wendling branch to mill No. 1 will be finished this week. Mill No. 1 is now cutting between 35,000 and 40,000 feet of lumber each day.
