

DEVELOPMENT WORK GOES ON AT BOHEMIA

Bohemia, Oct. 15.—Steady development work is going on at the North Fairview mine, under the management of Herbert Leigh. Work will be pushed all winter in the main drift and much free-milling ore blocked out.

Work is progressing nicely on the crosscut at the Twin Rocks mine, and the management expects to strike their fine ledge before Christmas. This ledge shows up eight feet of free-milling ore on the surface, and the present tunnel will strike the ledge at a depth of over 150 feet and is expected to show up some good ore.

Frank Flusher has just finished packing in his winter supply of provisions, and will soon be at work on his claims again. His property lies near Little Rock creek.

The mill at the Oregon Securities is hung up for a few days for repairs. The water is now plentiful for all purposes and the electric power plant is in good shape to stand fall rains.

The sawmill at the Compination mine is being placed in position, and will soon be cutting timber for the buildings which are to be erected at the mine. The mill is small having a capacity of about 1,500 feet per day but is large enough for mine use.

The first work after the mining cabins and millhouse are provided for will be cutting lumber for the flume and a water wheel. The power for the sawmill is a small gasoline engine but power for the ore works will be obtained from an overshot wheel, which gives a very steady power, and is economical in its use of water.

The stockholders of the Le Roy Mining company held the annual meeting on October 4 in Cottage Grove. The former board of directors was re-elected, namely: J. L. Le Roy, Dr. L. W. Brown, C. O. Tubey, W. A. Wann, R. M. Veatch and Henry Veatch. The board of directors afterwards held a meeting and elected J. L. Le Roy president, and Henry Veatch, secretary and treasurer.

NEWS FROM THE LOWER SIUSLAW

The fire apparatus ordered by the council some time ago was brought in by the Roscoe from Yaquina last Friday. It consists of a large hand pump, five hundred feet of hose and a hose cart. Last Tuesday the new fire pump was tried for a few minutes to see how far it would throw water. A line of hose 500 feet in length was laid and a force of men went to working the pump and succeeded in throwing water about 70 feet from the nozzle.

Wednesday morning Dr. Day, of Eugene, and Dr. Edwards, of Florence, performed a surgical operation on Leonard, the two-year-old son of Bruce David, for the relief of a difficulty from which the child has suffered for eight or nine months. The operation was successful and the boy is improving rapidly and it is hoped will soon be entirely well.

When the Roscoe returned from Yaquina last Friday, she brought in a beautiful little gasoline launch for Messrs T. M. Wolf and D. M. Kemp. The young men are very proud of the trim little craft, and no doubt will take many a pleasant trip on board it. It was christened the Pisantipede.—The West.
