

TIDAL WAVE AND HURRICANE IN HONDURAS

Mobile, Ala., Oct. 22.—The steamer Harald, fruit laden, brings news of a terrible West Indian hurricane which visited the towns of Rustan, Tela, Utilia, El Provenca and Colorado in Honduras, October 12. Many vessels were wrecked and buildings damaged. The loss to owners of fruit plantations is over a million dollars. A tidal wave accompanied the hurricane and swept everything before it.

MR. FRIENDLY'S ADDRESS IN COMMERCE BULLETIN

Remarks by the Hon. S. H. Friendly, Eugene, Oregon, at Oregon Development League Convention.

However, during these few days we shall devote our time not to that which is best for your part of the state or for mine, though it concern Oregon's prosperity. We shall ask ourselves just two questions—What are Oregon's greatest needs? What requires our immediate attention?

Gentlemen, we are here to work together. May our efforts meet with success.

EX-SENATOR BURTON BEGINS JAIL SENTENCE

St. Louis, Oct. 22.—Ex-United States Senator Burton arrived this morning and surrendered himself to the United States marshal to begin his six months' sentence in the Iron county jail at Ironton, Mo. He was accompanied by his wife and little niece, who will live at Ironton during his incarceration. Mrs. Burton affectionately placed her hand upon her husband's arm and said:

"I was never so proud of you, dear husband, as I am now."

Burton was convicted of receiving pay for services for private individuals before the postoffice department while a United States senator. The sentence was imposed by the federal court at St. Louis and the supreme court denied a rehearing.

LOCAL OPTION DECISION AT SALEM

Salem, Oct. 19.—That cities have no power to enact charters that conflict with the local option law was the decision rendered today by Circuit Judge George H. Burnett in the Coquille saloon case, which he tried in Coos county some time ago. This is a sweeping defeat for the saloon, for if the decision is affirmed by the supreme court it will destroy the last hope of the liquor interests to circumvent the local option law.

So far as we have heard, John C. Beck heads the list in the number of fish taken in one night's catch. Last Sunday he took between eight and nine hundred salmon out of his nets, as a result of their being in the water over night.

Walter Sadley and T. J. Boren came home a week ago from a trip to Junction, having helped J. M. Nichols drive out a band of cattle. Mr. Sadley informs us that while crossing the ridge between Maple creek and Sweet Creek on their way out, a portion of the bank on a grade caved off, precipitating some of the cattle to the canyon below. Fortunately none of them were seriously injured by the rough experience.—The West.

ELECTION AT COTTAGE GROVE FAVORS SALOONS

Cottage Grove, Or., Oct. 21.—The city election held Saturday authorizing the city council to amend its charter in favor of the saloons carried by three votes. No attempt will be made to open the saloons until the supreme court decides as to whether the local option is a criminal law or not. Should the supreme court reverse Judge Burnett's decision on this point there would have to be another city election before saloon licenses could be granted.

WILL OF CONRAD WIDMER PROBATED

The last will of Conrad Widmer, who died at his home west of Eugene, Aug. 25, 1906, was admitted to probate Saturday afternoon. The instrument was executed Aug. 10, 1899, in the presence of J. J. Walton and N. E. Markley. It provides as follows: That all just debts be paid; that be divided his son, George C., shall be given \$800 for the reason that he has remained at home and helped work the farm; that all the rest of the property be equally divided between his four children, Joseph M., George C., Margaret and Gertrude. Joseph and George are named as executors. The estimated value of the property is \$8000.

After the ceremony and attendant festivities the newly wedded

pair drove to Ashland and will leave on the early train tomorrow for Eugene, where after November 1st they will be at home to their friends at 354 East Fourteenth street.

The bride, a charming and worthy young woman, is a graduate and former teacher at the Southern Oregon State Normal school at Ashland, and her very many friends in and out of that institution join in a well wishing incident to the occasion. Mr. Keeney is a prominent young business man of Eugene, holding a good position in one of the banking institutions of the university city.
