

RUSSIAN CAPITAL IN PEACEFUL CELEBRATION

St. Petersburg, Oct. 30.—The morning of the first anniversary of the proclamation of the imperial manifesto giving Russia legislation passed in St. Petersburg without any disorder being reported. The streets are decorated with flags and church services were held, but fear of being involved in trouble kept many people within doors, the students being conspicuously absent. Large forces of infantry and cavalry were distributed throughout the city.

Rowdies at a fire last night cut the hose and began plundering, but were dispersed by troops, who fired a volley into the air.

At noon today a special edition of the Official Gazette, containing an imperial ukase granting full religious freedom to "Old Believers," was issued. Certain concessions are granted and changes made in the church laws.

QUIET AT WARSAW.

Warsaw, Oct. 30.—Up to noon today the city was quiet. The streets are patrolled by troops.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 30.—Eight persons, arrested in connection with the robbery of \$188,826 from Cashier Hermann, of the custom house on October 27, and tried by courtmartial, were executed today.

MRS. EDDY IS WELL AND STRONG AT HER HOME

Concord, N. H., Oct. 30.—A representative of the Associated Press, who interviewed Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy, head of the Christian Science church, at her home at Pleasant View today, found her voice clear and strong, with no evidence of decrepitude or weakness.

The New York World last Sunday asserted that Mrs. Eddy is no longer the head of the Christian Science church, but a mere puppet in the hands of designing schemers, who have control of her large fortune.
