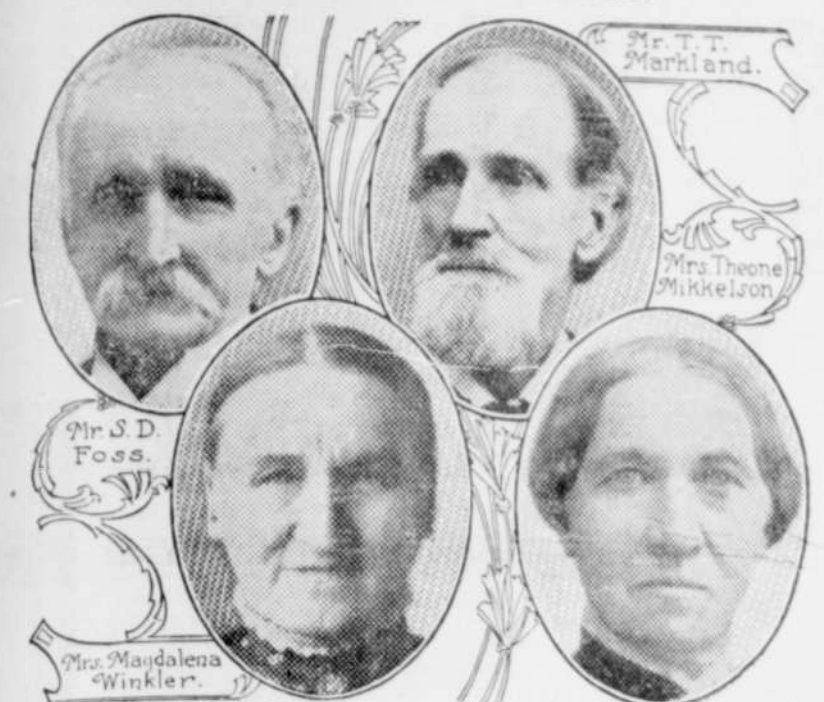

BREEZES FROM THE SIUSLAW BAY

The fishermen thought a few days ago that the best part of fishing was over for this year but a new run of silver salmon made its appearance here Wednesday and the canneries crews have all they can do to take care of the fish.

A bargain was made a few days ago by which W. Wells sold his ranch below the mouth of Lake Creek for the sum of \$3000. Part of the purchase money was paid down and a further payment of \$500 is to be made within thirty days.

The schooner Oakland which left San Francisco about two weeks ago bound for the Siuslaw, came up to the mouth of the river but as the bar was very rough, the vessel could not come into the river. She remained there several days watching for an opportunity to cross the bar, then headed for Coos Bay.

We are informed that the Gardiner people are agitating the matter of opening a wagon road around Five Mile Lake so teams can go that route all the way from Gardiner to Glenada. At present there is a wagon road from Glenada by way of Maple and Middle Creek to Five Mile Lake. Travellers have to cross the lake in a boat then follow the road from there to Gardiner.

By opening the road around the lake, a distance of some four or five miles, it will give a land route through the hills all the way from Glenada to Gardiner.—The West.

BRING BAKER'S REMAINS BACK TO OREGON

J. W. Geary Post, G. A. R., of this city, at its regular meeting Saturday night, passed the following resolutions:

Whereas, Colonel Edward D. Baker, an honored citizen, an eminent statesman and a gallant soldier of Oregon, was killed in battle in defense of the Union at Balls Bluff, Virginia, October 21, 1861; and

Whereas, Nearly half a century has elapsed since that tragic event and at which time he was serving the state of Oregon in the United States senate with signal ability; and

Whereas, His remains are now lying in an obscure and neglected grave in the state of California; therefore be it

Resolved, That the coming session of the legislature of Oregon be requested to pass an act providing for the removal of Colonel Baker's remains to Oregon, there to be buried, and that a suitable monument be erected to commemorate his memory and services; and be it further

Resolved, That the legislature of the state of Oregon appropriate from the general fund a sufficient amount to carry into effect the object of these resolutions; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be placed in the hands of each member of the legislative delegation from Lane county and that they be urged to use every honorable means to secure the passage of a bill in conformity with the intent of these resolutions.

PORTLAND MARKET REPORT.

Portland, Or., Nov. 1.—Fall products are unusually plentiful and command good prices this year. Nuts alone are below a normal crop, though prices on the commoner kinds have not advanced materially. Black walnuts and hickorynuts are in fairly good supply, likewise chestnuts. These good, old-fashioned firsides companions sell readily, despite the fact that they are to be obtained in country districts for the trouble of gathering. English walnuts, almonds, pecans, filberts and ground nuts are selling in large quantities, with some varieties a trifle higher priced than last season. The almond crop in California is not any too heavy this year, and price will be advanced soon, according to advices received by the trade.

LIVESTOCK SITUATION.

On account of the rather poor quality of sheep in part of yesterday's receipts the yards were not cleaned up. About 300 head remain unsold today, and it is not likely they will move at the quotation.

Cattle receipts of several loads also dragged, butchers claiming quite a lull in their business at present. Market slow.

Hogs continue very strong, and the light receipts were snapped up.

GOOD TRADE IN LATE VEGETABLES.

The last addition to the good line of late vegetables is "delicate" squash, the fine variety much in favor at this season. Price named today is 2¢ per pound.

Celery is in good supply and quality is first class. Cabbage is still in oversupply. Tomatoes are losing in quality, but receipts keep pretty well up to requirements.

BRIEF NOTES OF THE TRADE.

It is said that Horst purchased about 500 bales of hops yesterday at valley points with 15¢ the top price. Demand continues only for cheap and best grades. Dressed meat receipts are somewhat more liberal, especially in veal. Demand good at former price.

Sweet potatoes are firm for crates,

but socks are dull on account of quality.

Apples are moving quite freely, with prices along the street for fancy ranging between \$1.25 and \$1.50. Cheap grades from 50¢ to \$1 a barrel.

PRUNE SITUATION.

Prunes that were shipped early from Oregon and Washington are now arriving in the East, but the stock is practically all deliverable to buyers, who placed early orders, and is going directly into consumption. Discussing the shortage in the crop and its effect on contracts, the New York Journal of Commerce of October 26 says:

It is stated by competent authority that three-quarters of the Washington crop and about half of that of Oregon was destroyed by the rains and subsequent hot weather in September. During that period 20s and 30s were practically eliminated and many packers whose orders called for deliveries of these sizes have been unable to meet their contracts.

Commenting on the situation a representative of a prominent commission house said: "Those who have received shipments made prior to the damage done to the crop are lucky, and are getting a stiff premium on the prices they paid. The goods bought for early shipment are now being widely distributed. There have been no shipments to speak of since the damage to the crop became known, and there are now practically no offerings for shipment from the coast."

Creamery butter continues to pile up and the surplus stocks are now so heavy that the trade is alarmed. Local trade is quite good at 30¢ for best creamery, but the outside demand is nominal.

Egg prices are held firm today with sales at 32 1/2¢ and 3¢ a dozen, with transactions at both figures. Receipts are fair again, but the movement is good.

The future of the poultry market is very much in doubt at this time. Receipts just about equal the demand.
