

## MATCH WORKS FOR CITY OF SPRINGFIELD

Within a very short time, says Thomas P. Duffy, Springfield will have a large match factory, as a building for that purpose has been leased and the machinery necessary for the operation ordered and expected to arrive at any time. Mr. Duffy is an expert match maker, having had many years' experience in some of the largest factories in the country. He says that he has had a great deal of encouragement and has already contracted his entire output to two wholesale firms. The capacity of the factory was not limited but it will require from 12 to 15 girls to do the work. A contract has been made with the Willamette Valley Co. for electric power to run the motor and all the latest machinery will be installed. The factory will manufacture nothing but strictly high-grade matches and expects to get the raw material from Cedar Flats.

The News was reliably informed this week that Emil Etter, the gentleman who purchased the J. L. Clark property on Main street, will soon start the erection of a fine two-story building on the west corner of the block. The building will have two large store rooms. One will be occupied by the postoffice and the other, we are informed, has been leased for a term of five years for a general merchandise store.

The News was informed this week that a two-story building would soon be erected on the corner of Seventh and Main streets, the dimensions being 30x50 feet. We are unable to learn who will occupy the building or who is the owner, but J. R. Chezem has the contract and work will be commenced at once.

Another fine residence for Springfield will be erected by Banker Hy Stewart on the vacant lot south of his second street residence. Judging from Mr. Stewart's plans the cottage will be one of the neatest and most conveniently arranged in town.

Dan Humphreys informed the News this week that by November 10 he would again be engaged in the blacksmith business. He has leased the building on Second street, opposite Henry Stewart's residence, and is now fitting it up for a shop.

C. E. Russell shipped a car of pines from Springfield Monday. He reports having dried about 75,000 pounds this season. His dryer is heated at Thurston.—News.

## MINING NEWS FROM COTTAGE GROVE

The Black Butte Quicksilver Mining Company has got the 150 tons of freight wagoned from the Cottage Grove station to the mine. Work at the mine is progressing finely and the tramway from the upper to the lower level will be in place soon. A gang of fifteen Japanese laborers were taken to the mine to work on the outside. The material for the furnace is on the ground. The capacity of this plant will be fifty tons per day, but it will be increased to 300 tons.

At quitting time at the Champion mine, Bohemia, last week, just as the men were climbing out of the car, it started on its return to the tunnel. The men jumped but the car on the other track was near at hand, so there was some lively dodging. As it was four were scratched, and Fred Ryan seriously hurt. ## LANGDON CASE IS BEING HEARD BEFORE SEAWELL

San Francisco, Nov. 2.—Argument on the restraining order brought by District Attorney Langdon to prevent Abraham Ruef from taking possession of the office of district attorney and to defeat the action of the board of supervisors in ousting Langdon and appointing Ruef to the office are being heard before Superior Judge Seawell today. Two separate answers to the complaint were presented, one on behalf of Ruef and the other on behalf of the board of supervisors.
