

Portland, Nov. 21 .- A special dispatch to the Evening Telegram from Hood River, Oregon, tells of a flend ish attempt made Saturday night to blow up a train on the Mount Hood railway. Twenty sticks of dynamite were placed on the track, but owing to their frozen condition failed to explode when the train passed over it. Twenty-five passengers and the crew were on the train.

The company has offered a reward of \$500 for the apprehension of the guilty persons, but so far no clue has been found.
