

ONE MORE ARRESTED FOR LIQUOR SELLING

(From Saturday's Guard.)
Upon an information filed in the circuit court Sheriff Fisk this morning arrested Jake Berger, charged with selling liquor. Berger conducts a place formerly the Reception saloon. This is the last of the arrests at this term of court, and from now till the end if the term the time will be taken up with the trials.

Plead Not Guilty.

Emil Etter, Frank Ware and Chas. Mayhew, previously indicted for selling liquor, entered a plea of not guilty this forenoon.

Farlow Boys Guilty.

The jury in the case of the State vs. Lawrence and Loren Farlow, charged with giving liquor to a minor, returned a verdict of guilty late yesterday afternoon. They will be sentenced Tuesday.

GRAND JURY RECOMMENDS LARGER COUNTY JAIL

To the Hon. L. T. Harris, Judge of the Second Judicial District of the State of Oregon:

We, the undersigned grand jurors for the November, 1906, term of the circuit court of Lane county, Oregon, beg leave to submit the following report:

We have examined into all cases that have been held to answer at this term of court and reported thereon.

We have also examined into such cases as have been presented for our consideration and returned indictments in all cases where there appeared to have been violations of the criminal statutes and sufficient evidence produced to make it probable that conviction can be had in the circuit court.

We have also examined the county offices, records thereof, and the county buildings as carefully as our time would permit and find that the offices are apparently well kept, the officers doing their duty and the records properly kept, but we find that the office rooms of the clerk and sheriff are inadequate for the amount of business done therein. We have the following recommendations to make:

First: We recommend that more cell rooms be provided in the county jail, that the jail be enlarged so that a jailor can live therein, and that the jail walls be lined with steel high enough to preclude the possibility of prisoners digging through the brick wall.

Second: We recommend that the school superintendent be given the present grand jury room and the present rooms of the school superintendent be placed at the disposal of the district attorney and grand jury.

EARLY DAY BARN DESTROYED BY FIRE

The big barn on the old farm known as the Matlock place at Goshen was burned to the ground, together with all its contents, about 4 o'clock this morning.

The barn was owned by Mr. Beckwith and was built in 1865 or '66 by J. D. Matlock, of this city. It was still a substantial structure and would have stood for many years to come. Its cost was about \$1,000.

Mr. Beckwith lost in the fire a blooded bull calf, a large amount of hay, grain and feed, besides some harness and machinery. The building was uninsured, and the loss will fall heavily on the owner.

It is not known how the fire originated, but it is presumed that hobsos slept in the barn over night and in some manner set it on fire.

Lowell News Items.

Lowell, Nov. 17.—We are having rainy weather of late. The river is the highest it has been this season.

The logging camps are laying off and all work at a standstill and will be until more favorable weather prevails.

Farmers are pretty well along with their work, and early sowed grain is looking well.

The night of the 14th we had a very hard wind that fell timber in every direction, the roads being blocked between here and Hazeldele so the mail carrier was compelled to leave his stage and go horseback. Mr. Thomas Biakely says there were 35 trees blown down on his place and smashed down. His fences in several places, and the telephone wire is down in a great many places.

Mr. and Mrs. Lowell, of High Prairie, made a trip to Eugene last week and say the railroad surveys are progressing slowly, as they are in a rough country, covered with heavy brush and timber.

Mr. McCrow has been packing in supplies to the mines on North Fork and says the warm, rainy days have melted the snow on the mountains around the mines and the small streams were all small rivers.

School commenced at Rush Island with Miss Trecher as teacher. The attendance is good.

Mr. Dalt Finley has bought the farm of Dexter Carter and moved to the same. Mr. Carter is living with his family at Mr. Hill's logging camp on the Rolling Riffle creek, south of Rush Island.

William Kelsey and Louis Mathews make regular trips to the surveyors' camps at the Herbert place on North Fork with their freight teams, hauling supplies regardless of the inclemency of the weather.

UP IN ARMS AGAINST S. P. COMPANY

Cottage Grove, Or., Nov. 16.—The car shortage situation has become so pressing that the people of this community have decided to institute a fight against the Southern Pacific Railroad Company. If they still disregard the people's demands to get cars in order that they may be able to market their lumber, poles, piling and farm products an organization is to be effected, consisting of all business men in Western Oregon. Its members will go before the legislature of this state, when it convenes in the early part of January, and in a unit stay there until laws are placed upon the statute books establishing rules that the railroad company must comply with.

To Meet At Eugene.

The Commercial organization of this place has started a move, calling for all business men to meet at Eugene the latter part of this month and there organize themselves into a working body in order to cope with the situation as matters will develop from time to time.

The vast lumbering industry is about to be demoralized in this state, especially in Interior Western Oregon, by the failure to provide cars. It is now estimated that there are from 1500 to 2000 carloads of products ready for shipment. Most of this material is for California and southern shipments. The railroad company has an embargo placed at Ashland and they will not give any assurance when it will be raised so that the cars can be shipped south of that point. With the outlook as it now is all the mills and everything else will be forced to shut down, thousands of workmen laid off, and forcing into bankruptcy many of these concerns that have entered into the various industries.

JUNCTION STREETS TO BE LIGHTED

At a special meeting of the city council Monday evening a contract was entered into with B. F. Howard, manager of the Howard Electric Light Company, to furnish light for the city for a period of five years. The contract entered into is in substance as follows: The Howard Electric Light Co. is to furnish the city with thirty incandescent lights of 15-candle power at 65 cents per light per month to run from early candle-light to midnight, and from 5 o'clock in the morning until daylight, and as soon as practicable to run all night at \$1 per light per month. The contract is to take effect December 1st.

It is the intention of the company to wire the city at once, in order to be ready to turn on the light by December 1st, and as soon as the many private residences are wired, the full night service will be installed, perhaps by the first of the year, or as soon thereafter as possible.

FLOOD IS RECEDING IN NORTH YAQUIMA

Seattle, Nov. 16.—The rains of the past few days have ceased and the Chinook wind has turned colder, the waters of the Upper White river valley slowly receding. The flood waters, however, are still rising, especially at South Park, a suburb of Seattle, near the mouth of the Dumas river. The population of 2000 is at the mercy of the rushing waters. A report has been received that a house at Yellowstone Park was swept down the Dumas yesterday afternoon with several persons in it.

Seattle, Nov. 16.—Homeless and suffering from hunger and exposure and in hourly dread of the rising waters that threaten to overwhelm them thousands of residents of the fertile valleys between Seattle and Tacoma are today in the foothills nearby, with what few effects and provisions they could carry in their hurried flight. Six deaths have thus far been chronicled due to the floods which followed the rapid rise of the rivers of King and Pierce counties. Three met death while trying their utmost to prevent log jams that would endanger the residents of towns further down the valleys of the White and Green rivers.

All the valley towns are under water to a depth ranging from eight to twenty feet. Black, White, Green, Cedar, Stuck, Snoqualmie and other streams having their source in the foothills of the Cascade Mountains are out of their banks and flooding thousands of acres of land, doing incalculable damage. How many farmers' families have lost some members will not be known until the waters subside.

Railroad communications are cut and the towns cannot be reached except by telephone. The waters in many places are up to the second story windows and rescue parties are removing persons from dangerous places.

FLOOD DAMAGE SERIOUS IN IDAHO

Spokane, Nov. 15.—In Idaho the damage from flood is extensive. At Wallace half the town is under water, and business is practically at a standstill in many places. Great damage is feared in the mining districts on account of land slides. The flood appears to have reached its height.

Waters Are Receding.
Portland, Nov. 16.—The high waters of the Willamette valley are receding in most places and the damage from heavy rains and high water has not been heavy. It is expected the crest of the flood will reach Portland tonight or tomorrow but no danger is anticipated.

Spokane, Nov. 17.—A North Yakima special to the Chronicle says the flood is receding slightly, but as it is again raining fears are entertained that the river will rise again. A number of white families along the Toppish are surrounded by water and cannot be reached, as there are no boats. The upper Kittitas valley is a lake. Reports of the drowning of several people cannot be verified. The losses in the Yakima valley aggregate \$345,000.

Situation at Seattle.

Seattle, Nov. 17.—The flood is subsiding and the loss in King county alone is placed at \$1,000,000. It is probable that five deaths will be the limit of fatalities in King county. No trains are moving with the exception of a few spur lines and it will be several weeks before the telegraph and telephone conditions are normal.

CONDITIONS ARE IMPROVING RAPIDLY

Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 17.—The water is rapidly receding but the electric lines between Seattle and Tacoma will not be able to resume for several days and industries along the Puyallup river in Tacoma are in a similar situation. The bridges of both railroad and wagon road are out in every direction and hundreds of Northern Pacific passengers are being cared for here. Transfers are being made by steamer between Tacoma and Seattle, the railroad bridge over the Stuck river being washed away. Many trains are stalled east of the Cascades. Fifteen hundred feet of the trestle went out at Olequa, on the Cowlitz river, between Tacoma and Portland and many other important bridges are too dangerous to use. The railroad company will try to transfer passengers by steamer between Olequa and Castle Rock, but it is doubtful if this stage of the flood whether this can be done.

TWO BOY MURDERERS GET SENTENCES

Thomas Reeves and Hugh Saxon, the Portland youths who killed William Powell, the old pedler, near Cottage Grove one evening last August, and who on Wednesday of this week entered a plea of guilty to the charge of manslaughter, were sentenced at ten o'clock this forenoon by Judge Harris, of the circuit court, Reeves receiving an indeterminate sentence and Saxon the maximum penalty, fifteen years in the penitentiary.

Had Nothing To Say.

At the time fixed for the sentence the court room was crowded with men eager to learn the fate of the two boys. Reeves was the first to receive sentence and when asked by the judge if he had anything to say as to whether or not sentence should

then asked if he had any remarks to make and he replied by calling to the witness stand Dr. Best, of Cottage Grove, to whom the murdered man made a statement before he died. The doctor told of the dying man's last words, including the statement that the smaller boy, Saxon, fired the shot. After a plea for leniency by the boys' attorney, L. E. Saxon, the judge pronounced sentence. Saxon was then told to stand up

THREE MEN KILLED IN A HOLD-UP FIGHT

San Francisco, Nov. 16.—In a fight with robbers in a saloon at Sixth and Brannan streets last night three men received injuries which resulted in death and two others were seriously shot.

Two masked men entered the place in which twelve men were drinking, and ordered their hands up. John O'Connell, a retired and pensioned fire, and in the fight which followed O'Connell was killed, as was Thomas Burke, one of the robbers. Stephen Lynch, a spectator, died of his injuries today.

The police have arrested John Byrne, believed to be the other highman, companion of the man killed.

CUBA WANTS AMERICAN PROTECTION

New York, Nov. 19.—Prominent members of the liberal party in Cuba are said to be preparing a petition to the president and congress asking that on next January the establishment of a permanent American protectorate be made over Cuba. A similar bill will be presented to the Cuban congress. The program will be backed by foreign interests in Cuba.

MORE INDICTMENTS FOR SELLING LIQUOR

The grand jury adjourned today and filed its final report. Before adjournment three more indictments for selling liquor were reported, one against Emil Etter and two additional against Mayhew & Ware. This makes thirteen indictments at this term of court for violation of the local option law.

Not a true bill was reported in the case of Floyd DuBoise, charged with enticing Mabel Conrad away from her home at Marcola for the purpose of entering a house of prostitution.

H. S. French, foreman of a reconstruction crew of the Postal Telegraph Co., was in Eugene today, and reports that the line between Cottage Grove and Springfield has been entirely rebuilt as far as Goshen. The crew will rebuild the line as far as Springfield. From there to Portland new poles and crossarms will be placed wherever the old sticks are rotted.

DEATH OF MRS. CREFFIELD IS MYSTERIOUS

Seattle, Nov. 17.—The autopsy of Mrs. Maud Creffield today failed to reveal the cause of her death. Her heart, lungs, liver and kidneys were normal. Neuritis of the heart may have been the cause of her death, yet leave no indications as to the heart itself. The stomach and small intestine were normal.

Mrs. Creffield died suddenly last evening. She was the wife of "Joe" Creffield, the "Holy Roller" last killed by George Mitchell.

HOW EDWARD BEELER WASKILLED

Full particulars of the death of Edward A. Beeler at Butte, Mont., formerly of Eugene, have been received here. He was working on a new shaft which the Butte & Lake Mining company is sinking. While on a level 400 feet beneath the surface of the ground, the cage that used to haul the men and ore up and down the shaft caught him in a manner and crushed his life out instantly. No one saw the accident but it is supposed that he attempted to climb into the cage while it was moving. The body is now in Eugene awaiting the arrival of the man's mother who has been bound on the Sound.

Mrs. Beeler arrived this afternoon and the funeral will be held at the residence on Oak street, near Fifth tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock, the remains to be interred in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Rev. J. S. McCallum, pastor of the Christian church, will conduct the services.
