

FOOTBALL TEAMS OF SISTER STATES BATTLE TUESDAY

FINAL SCORE—OREGON, 16;
WASHINGTON, 6.

In spite of the rain storm of this afternoon a crowd of 700 or 800 enthusiastic football rooters saw Oregon defeat Washington on Kincaid Field, in this city, by a score of 16 to 6.

It was a game full of punting, and the first half indicated that the teams were about evenly matched, but Oregon showed up much better in the second half.

First half—McKinney made the first touchdown, when the ball had been recovered by Oregon on a blocked punt, six inches from Washington's goal line. Moores blocked the punt. Ten minutes later Washington had the ball down into Oregon's territory by recovering two punts. Boggs, Washington's right end, made a touchdown around the left end, making a forty-yard run. Goal was kicked. Score, first half, 6 to 6.

Second half—Kuykendall in the middle of the half caught a punt and with Chandler's interference ran for a touchdown. Goal was not kicked. About seven minutes before the close of the game Chandler picked up a punt and made a 15-yard run for a touchdown. Score Oregon, 10; Washington, 6.

Final, Oregon, 16; Washington, 6.

Washington's long-lost football eleven and Oregon's patched up team are playing this afternoon the game which will determine in all probability the championship of the Northwest. Washington arrived yesterday afternoon, able to recount any number of tales of floods, washouts and delays. Thursday they left Seattle, but returned Saturday to their home city. Sunday night they got through to Portland.

Coach Place said yesterday that his team when they first left Seattle was without a bruise or scratch. The vicissitudes through which they passed did not impair the fighting worth of his men to any degree.

Oregon, however, is in a bad condition. Latourette and Hug are entirely out and Moulten has a very badly wrenched shoulder.

Coach Bezdek also is not upon the heights of expectancy, for the Washington game coming off this afternoon puts three hard games very close together. He is therefore worrying considerably about the Multnomah battle.

Hundreds of people are in town from different parts of Oregon to see the game. The crowd this afternoon is a large one. The weather is not the best, and the field is very muddy. Fast work will be almost out of the question.

JURY IN ETTER LIQUOR CASE STILL OUT

Judge Harris this morning sentenced Loren and Lawrence Farlow, who had been found guilty by a jury of giving intoxicating liquor to Emma Miller, a minor, to 20 days each in the county jail. They began serving their sentence immediately.

A jury in the Emil Etter liquor case was completed last evening and was as follows: W. P. Cheshire, A. G. Bogart, Nason Harwood, J. F. Minney, J. M. Smigley, J. H. McFarland, Walter Blachley, Levi Berkshire, J. W. Quackenbush, A. T. Bonnett, H. H. Ruth, and T. S. Winfrey.

The state and defense each introduced several witnesses and the principal testimony was as follows: Marvin Martin, who is under a parole sentence for stealing a horse and saddle, testified that he bought a quart bottle of whiskey under the name of ginger ale at Etter's place.

A Mr. Blachley and Steve Southworth said they each obtained a drink of liquor at Etter's place, asking for ginger ale. Southworth said it was intoxicating and did not foam or show any signs of gas.

The defense opened their case by calling Arthur Sloan, employed by Etter. He testified that he never sold liquor, but admitted that some liquor was kept at the place.

Breyer Pleads Not Guilty.
The demurrer to the indictment of Herman Breyer, charged with selling liquor, was overruled and he entered a plea of not guilty this morning.

Jury Disagreed.
The jury in the case of L. Lurch vs. A. B. Atkins and L. C. Scott, to recover personal property, could not agree upon a verdict and the case has been continued for the term.

MERCHANTS ADOPT RULES OF CREDIT

(From Tuesday's Guard.)
The regular meeting of the Merchants' Protective Association was held last evening, at which time the following rules were adopted, to go into effect January 1, 1907:

Motto—Credit where credit is due.

Object—Protection.

1st. To the merchant who may care to extend credit.

2d. To the patron who may care to ask for credit.

Rules—As applied to all collecting:

1st. All accounts are due and payable at the place of business where the credit is given, thirty days after date, or on the first day of the following month, unless other terms are arranged at the time of the deal.

2d. No collector shall be sent out after book accounts, neither will statements be rendered, until account is overdue, and such notice will be evidence of delinquency.

3d. Accounts not paid as per agreement will be closed and no further credit given by any member of the association.

4th. All accounts must draw interest at the rate of eight per cent per annum from the date due until paid. Such accounts to be secured by note.

It is not the wish nor the intention of the association to make credit difficult, but to make credit safe and dispense with the inconvenience and expense of monthly collections.

Manufactories.
Propositions to establish two factories in Eugene, a shoe factory and a paper mill, came up for discussion. The matter was taken under consideration and correspondence with the parties making the propositions will be opened.

**SHIPPING LARGE
AMOUNT OF APPLES**

The Seattle Produce Company's place of business at 64 West Eighth street presented a busy appearance as a Guard reporter visited it this morning. The company is just now shipping a large number of apples and has a big force of girls at work wrapping them with paper and packing them neatly in boxes.

Manager Nathan Smith informed the reporter that his company is today shipping a carload to Montanone to Portland, and making local shipments to Astoria, Hoquiam and other northern points.

The Spitzbergen is the predominant variety being shipped by the Seattle Produce Co., yet there are plenty of the old reliable Baldwins and the Ben Davis. The apples this year seem to be of a better quality than for a number of years past the codling moth and other fruit pests being pretty generally stamped out.
