DUGAN & MILLERS' STORE ENTERED BY BURGLARS

(From Monday's Guard.)

Dugan & Miller's second-hand store was entered by a burglar last night and about \$250 worth of goods stolen.

The burglar entered the store through a rear window, climbing upon the sill and lowering the upper sash. E. R. Black, an employee of the firm, was the first to discover that mischief had been done. Shortly after he entered the store to open business this morning he noticed that the rear door was unlocked. Immediately afterward he saw an empty ring tray on the floor near the door, the thief having taken it out of the show window in front and emptying the gold-plated rings it contained into his pocket. An examination revealed the fact that 84 rings, eight gold-plated watch chains and two good revolvers, all valued at about \$250, were taken. The burglar left his muddy footprints on the window sash and on a coil of rubber hose just inside the window. He unlocked the rear door from the inside and made his exit that way.

Officers Working.

Immediately after the robbery was discovered Chief of Police Farrington was notified and he at once began to work on the case. After an examination of the premises and after securing a description of the goods stolen he telephoned the officers up and down the line to look out for the robbers. As yet he has no clue to their identity. Dugan & Miller offer a reward of \$25 for their arrest.

Portland Market Report.

Portland, Nov. 29.—Turkeys, live and dressed; ducks and chickens continued up to today to come in quite heavily, but dealers generally reported a good demand. Dressed turkeys were bringing about the same price quoted for some days with fancy birds a shade stronger. Market yesterday, 20@21c, with every probability of holding through the day.

The big retailers picked large stocks yesterday and this morning, and with pretty good outside orders; this morning and sales locally in moderate volume, the opinion is held among commission houses that little trouble will be met with in getting stocks down to normal by tomorrow evening.

The leading retail markets report a much heavier sale of turkeys yesterday than on the corresponding day last year. Retail prices ruled around 25c per pound for common to good, up to 28@30c for fancy young turkeys.

City Creameries Advance Butter.

Some of the city creameries advanced the price of their first-grade butter yesterday to 32½c, but the other leading concerns did not announce the advance till this morning. Tuesday being their regular day for issuing price-current. The quotation is now held by practically all the city creameries, with the buying price of butter fat 31c. A very heavy trade north was interrupted just when an advance was contemplated. Now that the railroads are in shape to handle this outside demand, it is feared that, together with some fall-off in the market, natural to the season, the market will be heavy.
