SINSLAW SALMON PACK LARGEST IN HISTORY

The fishing season just closed has been the best on the Sinslaw for 20 years, if not the best since the fishing industry was established here. This is no idle boast, but is shown by statistics that have been carefully kept since 1887, says the Florence West.

Previous to that time a cannery had been operated here for two or three years, and afterward the business of salting salmon was carried on here for several years, but no accurate statistics of the amount of fish packed are to be obtained. However, in the summer of 1887 three canneries were established here, and the business has been carried on every year down to the present time. This year there has been a cold storage plant and two canneries operated here, and they were unable to handle the fish as fast as the men could catch them.

This year Avery & Gibson, who operated the Hurd cannery, have packed about 7,000 cases. Wm. Kyle & Sons Co. have about 8,000 cases of canned salmon. At their cold storage plant this company have put up about 150 tierces, each holding 100 pounds of fish. In addition they have about 200 barrels of salt fish. Nels Christensen salted nearly 100 barrels of salmon and a number of other parties also have smaller quantities.

It is difficult to say what proportion of the exceedingly large run of fish this season is due to the work of the hatchery, as all the rivers up and down the coast for a considerable distance were greatly favored in this respect this year. Even on streams where no efforts at artificial propagation have been made, there is an unusually large catch. But there are two facts which indicate that a considerable proportion of the increase is due to the hatchery work: One is that until within two or three years past the efforts at artificial propagation have been confined almost entirely to the Chinook salmon. The other is that the number of Chinooks caught in this

river has been steadily increasing in proportion to the other kinds of salmon for several years past, and this year the proportion is much larger than ever before.

JUDGE HARRIS FINES JAKE BERGER \$250

ACTION TAKEN AT COTTAGE GROVE

The following resolutions were adopted by the Commercial Club of Cottage Grove recently:

Whereas, God has given our great state boundless natural wealth and blessed us with resources from which to draw the sustenance for the world.

And Whereas, The general government in congress assembled saw fit when our state was young and needed facilities for development, to grant certain corporate interests large tracts of land covered with the timbered wealth of the state, as a subsidy to build a railroad along the western side of the state; and

Whereas, By such grant and the building of such railroad, the said corporation has virtually pledged itself to foster the development of the territory tributary to its rails; and

Whereas, A great lumber industry has grown up in this territory, and whereas a large number of people are now dependent upon the lumber industry for a livelihood; and

Whereas, the action of, and the attitude of, the aforesaid corporation is such as to discourage and ruin the lumber business; and

Whereas, The general welfare of the country is dependent upon the lumber business;

Therefore we, the members of the Commercial Club of Cottage Grove, Oregon, in regular meetings assembled, do hereby resolve that it has

become necessary for the legislature of this state to enact such railroad legislation as will compel the Southern Pacific Railroad Co., the corporation above referred to, to transport promptly products of the state as they are offered to the said Southern Pacific Railroad Co. for transportation.

And we would favor and urge you, as our representative in the legislature of Oregon, to present to the said legislature a reciprocal demurrage law similar to those in effect in other states, a maximum rate law, and a new tax law which will cover the timber of the state held by individuals or corporations and regularly assessed at values far below its market price or what it would bring at sheriff sale.

We, therefore, ask you to give these measures your earnest attention and diligent support at the next session of the legislature.
