Salt Lake City, Nov. 23.—Joseph F. Smith, president of the Mormon church, today pleaded guilty to the charge of unlawful co-habitation in the state district court and a fine of \$300 was imposed by Judge Ritchie. President Smith made a lengthy statement to the court explaining the attitude of the authorities of the Mormon church in relation to polygamy and polygamous co-habitation. The charge against Smith was preferred by Charles Mostyn Owen, who has been active in the crusade against the Mormon authorities and was based upon the recent birth of Smith's forty-third child, born to his fifth wife. Joseph Fielding Smith, head of the Mormon church, who was arrested a few days ago on the charge of living unlawfully with five wives, was a witness before the senate committee on privileges and elections in the Smoot case. He at that time expressed his belief in the principle of polygamy and admitted having a plurality of wives. President Smith recently returned



JOSEPH F. SMITH. from a trip to Europe and on his arrival in Utah was informed of the birth of his forty-third child. President Smith is of patriarchal appearance. He was born in 1838 and married his first wife forty years ago. He was elected president of the Mormon church in 1901.

It shows the railroad corporation had paid the three fines in one case and in reality the individuals had not been punished at all. Lane wanted this evidence to show that under the present law it is impossible to reach the officers of the company in a personal manner.

TWO BIG DEALS IN LANE COUNTY TIMBER

It is a dull day in Eugene when a new timber land deal is not reported. The latest is a purchase by the Drew Lumber Co., of Mascoutine, Iowa, of some of the finest timber land in the state, situated mainly in township 15, south of range 2 east, partly in Lane county and partly in Linn. This tract lies adjoining the Gate Creek tract bought by this company last spring. It was owned by N. Haskell Withee and associates, of LaCrosse, Wisconsin, who purchased it several years ago for speculation. The price paid by the Drew people is not made public, but it is understood to be in the neighborhood of the highest price yet paid for Lane county timber.

This sale was made through Henry Turrish, the Eastern representative of the purchasers, and Attorney S. D. Allen, their local representative. The deal has been pending since last August, and Mr. Allen has worked hard for its consummation. The purchasers of this tract express themselves of the belief that it is one of the best bodies of timber on the coast, and are well satisfied with their buy. Mr. Allen today filed for record at the county clerk's office eleven deeds covering the Lane county portion of the tract and eight deeds have been sent to Linn county for record.

H. C. MAHON MAKES BIG DEAL.
Thirty-five Thousand Acres So I'd to Syndicate of Capitalists.
H. C. Mahon, of this city, one of the best known timber land brokers on the coast, announced last evening the sale of about 35,000 acres of timber land in the western end of Lane county, extending from the Benton county line on the north to the Douglas county line on the south, and all tributary to the Siuslaw river. The land is purchased by a syndicate of capitalists headed by a well-known Portland citizen, whose name is withheld from publication by request. This syndicate intends to purchase between 50,000 and 75,000 acres in western Lane, and Mr.

Mahon has been successful in securing 35,000 acres of it, the deeds for the land being at present in the First National Bank of this city, and the remaining acreage is now nearly all under his control. Among the principal holdings which have been disposed of are the following: T. G. Pendricks, tract of 3500 acres; Edwin Hobson tract of 1440 acres; H. E. Armstrong tract of 1440 acres; W. H. Butterfield tract of 1280 acres; pool held by Marion county people, 3360 acres; pool held by Linn county people of 1920 acres, the Temple tract of 1440 acres. The balance of the purchases has been of individual holdings in tracts of from 80 to 1200 acres each. These tracts are in scattering localities, but include a great portion of the timber belt in the western end of the county. While the price paid for this land is not as high as McKenzie timber land brings, it is considered very good, the average being about \$12.50 an acre. Mr. Mahon has been working assiduously on this deal for a long time and he is naturally well pleased that it has been consummated so successfully to all parties concerned.

BIDS FOR RAILROAD TIES ASKED FOR

The Willamette Valley Co. has a notice in today's Guard asking for bids to furnish the company 10,000 sawed railroad ties to be delivered in Eugene, the bids to be received up to Dec. 15. The ties are to be used in the construction of the Eugene-Springfield electric railway and the Eugene street railway system, the work of which will, it is said, begin early in 1907.

It is understood that the company has ordered the steel rails and the cars for the line and they will be here when needed. The company no doubt intends to comply with the terms of the franchise, which require construction work to begin early next year.

STANDARD STOCK GOES STILL LOWER

New York, Nov. 23.—The stock of the Standard Oil Co. sold at \$500 on the curb today, the lowest price in years. The stock at this price shows a shrinkage in market value of more than \$624,000,000 since the high price of January of this year.
