ROOSEVELT'S MESSAGE STIRS UP CALIFORNIA

Washington, Dec. 4.—President Roosevelt's reference to the San Francisco school situation in his message was received with great dissatisfaction in the house, who assert that no treaty rights have been violated in excluding Japanese from the public schools attended by white children. Representative Hayes stated that if any treaty of the United States prevents California from running its schools as it sees fit that treaty is clearly unconstitutional and should not stand. A meeting of the California delegation will be held to discuss the San Francisco situation. The suggestion of Roosevelt in his message that naturalization be extended to the Japanese is also extremely distasteful to the California delegation in the house.

ELECTION EXPENSES IN GREAT BRITAIN

London, Dec. 1.—The parliamentary return of the "official" expenses of candidates at the recent election shows that it cost 670 members of parliament \$5,334,290 to obtain their seats, an average per vote of 98 cents. The sums privately dispersed would make a substantial increase in the total, judging from the evidence of some of the bribery trials which followed the elections.

GENERAL NEWS NOTES.

In McDonough county, Ill., three banks conducted by C. V. Chandler have closed their doors because of lack of funds. The cash of the concerns is tied up in lands and bonds. A force of constabulary under command of Major Murphy surprised the camp of Pablo, the chief of the Pulajanes, on the island of Samar, at daylight yesterday, November 30. Eleven of the Pulajanes were killed and the chief's son and nine of his band were wounded.
