## CORNELL CLUB HOUSE BURNED WITH HEAVY LOSS

Ithaca, N. Y., Dec. 7.—The beautiful Chi Psi fraternity house at Cornell University burned this morning. O. L. Schmuck, of Hanover, Pa., jumped from a third-story window and died of his injuries. Three Ithaca volunteer firemen were killed fighting the flames and three students are at the infirmary at the point of death. It is believed that several other persons were burned to death.

The fire started at 8:30 in the kitchen and gained considerable headway before any of the student's awakened. In an upper room were 27 students. It was impossible to escape by the way of the halls and windows were sought as a method of egress. Many of them jumped to the ground and several of them were seriously injured.

In addition to the three volunteer

firemen four students lost their lives according to latest reports. The firemen were all prominent in this city: A. S. Robinson, attorney and graduate of Cornell; John Rumsey, hardware dealer, and Esty Landon, a salesman, were caught under a falling wall and killed. The students were: O. L. Schmuck, of Hanover, Pa.; F. W. Grelle, South Orange, N. J., and W. H. Nichols, of Chicago, and J. M. McCutcheon, of Pittsburg, the latter a well-known football player. Schmuck lost his life in trying to rescue his chum, Nichols. The cause of the fire is unknown. Loss, \$200,000.

Paris, Dec. 10.—The press has unanimously recognized the extreme gravity of the religious issue presented by the pope's intemperate attitude. Many papers predict a veritable religious warfare. The government's calculations have consequently been upset, and new legislative authority may be necessary to enable it to cope with the situation. The militant Catholics seemingly have with joy the prospect of victory which will compel the closing of churches and attendant excitement of religious passions. M. Jaures, socialist leader, professes belief that the vatican has deliberately determined to test the strength of the party of reaction in an effort to overthrow the republic.  
Premier Clemenceau is quoted as saying:  
"If the church elects to have its will have it; but the world will bear witness that the vatican is foreign power trying to dispute the authority of the French government."  
The government is making preparations to cope with the situation, but is keeping them secret, evidently waiting to see whether any considerable proportion of the clergy revolt. The cabinet, however, maintains a resolute front.
